BROWN VETOES BILL

As reported by A Bill to reduce "excessive and needless government regulation of our lives and businesses" has been vetoed

by Governor Jerry Brown.

Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Woodland), author of Senate Bill 479, said to-day, "I am outraged that the Governor has clearly put himself in opposition to common sense and resonableness in state regulations. He has definitely sided with the self-serving burea-

uracy.
"i introduced this bill because I wanted to make sure that any time a state agency proposed a regulation, it would fully examine the cost. We've all had first-hand experience with bureaucrats who, with amazing arrogance, have pushed for regulations without the slightest interest in what impact they would have on consumer prices, business costs, or even whether they were cost-effecti-

ve," said Nielsen. Senate Bill 479 would have required state agencies to conduct an economic analysis of proposed regulations before those regulations were enacted. The analysis would contain a statement about the criteria used to determine the economic impact of the proposed regulation as well as a description of the problem addressed by the regulation. Also, alternatives to the proposed regulation, the financial impact and all the options and the reasons why the particu-

HOW YOU CAN HELP SCHOOL CHILDREN

FROM THE CALIFORNIA TEACHERS ASSO-CIATION COMES THIS PLEA: DEAR EDITOR:

This is an open letter to your readers telling them how they can help the school children in their community.

In the recently-passed state budget, public schools received a zero increase in funding. In effect, due to the expected rate of inflation, that means a five to seven percent cut in programs and services on top of those that have already been dropped or curtailed because of Proposition 13.

Many schools will have fewer courses in reading, writing, higher math, foreign languages, the arts, vocational education . . . you name it. Discouraged veteran teachers, who can get higher wates in business and industry, will leave the classroom. This will contribute to our growing teacher shortage, especially in math, the sciences, vocational, special and bilingual education. Some school districts may go bankrupt and have to close the schools before the school year is completed.

I believe most Californians are unaware that we are now spending 10 percent below the national average on our public schools. We rank 48th among the states . . . second from the last . . . in the percent of personal income we spend on the schools. Our pupilteacher ratio is an embarrassing highest in the nation.

OUR CHILDREN, WHO ARE OUR MOST VALUABLE RESOURCE AND OUR BEST INVEST-MENT DESERVE BETTER THAN THEY ARE GET-TING. THEY ARE THE NEW GENERATION OF SCIENTISTS, MATHEMATICIANS, TECHNICIA-NS, MANAGERS AND SUPPORT PERSONNEL WE MUST EDUCATE IN A NEW HIGHLY-COMPETITI-VE WORLD OF HIGH TECHNOLOGY IF WE ARE TO MAINTAIN OUR NATION'S ECONOMY, POL-

ITICAL AND MILITARY STRENGTH. When the Legislature reconvenes in August, the California Teachers Assoc-

iation will be pushing for an increase in school funding and the necessary taxes to finance it. We are looking at oil severance taxes and any other revenue-raising means, such as the socalled "sin taxes."

Please join us in urging the legislators to increase the funds for schools, even if it means increasing taxes. Point out to them that they have a responsibility to see that the schools have the necessary funds to provide quality education for all children. That's why they were elected, to make such "hard decisions" if they are necessary for our protection, the health of our economy, our political freedom

and a better quality of life. The issue is very clear: The legislators can neglect the schools and our children or they can "bite the bullet" and vote for our children. Sincerely,

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



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They are buses of various sizes and descriptions, put into service by operators who offer "bargain" rates for 24-hour turnaround trips to Las Vegas or Reno or South Shore. Many of the vehicles operate without required Public Utilities Commission or Interstate Commerce Commission Authority. Many are mechanically deficient . . . some with hazards serious enough to ground them when they are inspected. And some are driven by persons improperly licensed, and who sometimes exceed limits on number of hours they can legally stay at

All of this became evident last year as impending deregulation of trucks and buses resulted in new operators entering the business, particularly such attractive markets as the one-day, over-and-back trade to Nevada.

"It wasn't unexpected," Highway Patrol Commissioner Glen Craig said recently, as he analyzed the problem and the CHP's initial response . . . roadside inspection of buses. The Highway Patrol's Inland Division spearheaded two such inspections, one in March and one in May. Both were highly productive . . . which "could be counted as unfor-

tunate from the public point of view, because the safety problem is real, and it will require continuing CHP emphasis," Craig said.

The first inspection dealt with 38 buses. Thwenty-two were put out of service because of serious brake problems, or such deficiencies as loose lug nuts, excessive air loss, or broken wheels. A total of 112 violations were noted; 32 citations were issued. Thirty-four buses were inspected the second time.

Eleven were placed out of service. Thirty citations were issues; 97 violations were observed.

Both of these inspections took place on Interstate 15 east of Barstow. Arrangements were made by CHP to have repair service available upon call for any bus operator who desired, thus holding the down time to a minimum. No bus was delayed over 40 minutes . . . even those placed out of service. CHP public affairs officers participated to advise passengers why the buses had been detained.
Success of these operations re-

sulted largely from the coordination of participating agencies, each with an interest in safe operation. Participants included the Public Utilities Commission, Department of Motor Vehicles, Interstate Commerce Commission, both Federal and State Departments of Transportation, and the Federal Bureau of Motor Carrier Safety.

All of these plus charter service representatives have also joined in a task force, chaired by the CHP's Matt Mattoon, the motor carrier supervisor in San Francisco, which has the responsibility of developing future strategy to deal with the problem of bargain charters.

The task force was formed early this year after Craig wrote the Public Utilities Commission to propose a joint approach. Craig says the task force has two long-range goals, "convincing the charter operators that we are serious, and evolving legislation to help solve the problem if that appears to be app-

Craig says he is "convinced we also need additional inspections, given the results of these first two pilot projects. He says "we probably will move into periodic use of roadside inspections, probably on I-80 and U.S.

50 in northern California, and perhaps at major tourist attractions which attract charter party buses.'

He pointed out that many charter bus owners "conduct responsible operations, with properly maintained buses. They have been totally supportive of the inspections. Our intent is to identify unsafe buses, correct deficiencies, and prevent them from reocurring." Potential users of charter party buses who wish to check on the status of any carrier can do so by calling the Public Utilities Commission.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This article in no way reflects on the bus tours which have gone, and will go in the future from here. Burl Landes assures us that his bus, or buses, are fully inspected and his hours at the wehel, etc. - everything is all legal and uptodate in every way. Also, you will note if you have gone on any of these trips the bus is almost brand new - at least the one on most recent trips. 
