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
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

Following is a list of items that the owners have to address, and then resolve. Not the Board of Supervisors, but the residents who are property owners:

- 4. A new water plant is required as well as a sewer upgrade. They need to address the fact that allowing gray waters to enter the lake will only cost the owners more money. #### Camp Berryessa Receives Seed **Funding**; Seeks Major Grant

The local Mead Foundation has awarded a \$50,000 grant to the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District. The District has submitted an application for a \$1.5 million grant/loan to the State Coastal Conservancy for construction of the camp. Local supporters are being asked to write letters of support.

Camp Berryessa, to be located at the site of a former Boy Scout campground on Putah Creek at the north end of Lake Berryessa, will be the only public campground in Napa County focused on outdoor environmental education when completed.

A combined federal and state environmental review of the proposed camp is expected to be finished in the next few months. Once the review is complete, the park district and the Bureau of Reclamation, which owns the camp site next to Lake Berryessa, will be in position to sign a no-fee, long-term land use agreement giving the park district the right to construct and operate the camp.

The projected total cost for the initial development of the camp is \$1.7

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

#### Polar Bears as Political Pawns: President Obama sides with George Bush!

Actually the title of this article is a bit misleading. The Obama administration is actually just sticking with a George W. Bush-era decision by the Fish and Wildlife Service to deny polar bears endangered species status. Both Obama and Bush simply support the scientific evidence that polar bears are not an endangered species. The Fish and Wildlife Service defended the previous administration's decision to give the polar bear the less-protective "threatened" species designation, a move that will frustrate environmentalists who hoped for the stronger protection as an "endangered" species under the Endangered Species Act.

Even the present "threatened" status applied to polar bears is questionable, and not primarily based on any population data. In fact, the population of polar bears seems to be either stable overall or increasing. Their numbers are not large - around 22,000 overall — which means that their status is certainly worth watching. But the main reason for trying to place them on the threatened list was to argue about global warming, not polar bears.

Polar bears have become the poster children in the fight against global warming – even the Toyota Prius is being promoted by a scientifically-silly but heartwarming ad showing a polar bear hugging a Prius owner. He would have eaten the Prius owner!

A more reasonable analysis comes from the book "Cool It" by Bjorn Lomborg. Lomborg is considered "controversial" in the environmental community because he actually applies careful analysis to environmental problems.

What various studies have really told us is that of the twenty distinct subpopulations of polar bears, one or possibly two were declining in Baffin Bay; more than half were known to be stable; and two subpopulations were actually increasing around the Beaufort Sea. Moreover, it is reported that the global polar-bear population has increased dramatically over the past decades, from about five thousand members in the 1960s to twenty-five thousand today, through stricter hunting regulation.

We hear vastly exaggerated and emotional claims that are simply not supported by data. Yes, it is likely that disappearing ice will make it harder for polar bears to continue their traditional foraging patterns and that they will increasingly take up a lifestyle similar to that of brown bears, from which they evolved. They may eventually decline, though dramatic declines seem unlikely.

But 49 bears from the Hudson Bay population are getting shot each year, and this we can easily do something about. Thus, if we really want a stable population of polar bears, dealing first with the 49 shot ones might be both a smarter and more viable strategy than using polar bears to try to enact radical greenhouse gas emissions.

The argument in Lomborg's book is simple:

- 1. Global warming is real and man-made. It will have a serious impact on humans and the environment toward the end of this century.
- 2. Statements about the strong, ominous, and immediate consequences of global warming are often wildly exaggerated, and this is unlikely to result in good policy.
  - 3. We need simpler, smarter, and more efficient

solutions for global warming rather than excessive if well-intentioned efforts. Large and very expensive CO2 cuts made now will have only a rather small and insignificant impact far into the future.

4. Many other issues are much more important than global warming. We need to get our perspective back. There are many more pressing problems in the world, such as hunger, poverty, and disease. By addressing them, we can help more people, at lower cost, with a much higher chance of success than by pursuing drastic climate policies at a cost of trillions of dollars.

These four points will rile a lot of people. We have become so accustomed to the standard story: climate change is not only real but will lead to unimaginable catastrophes, while doing something about it is not only cheap but morally right. We perhaps understandably expect that anyone questioning this line of reasoning must have evil intentions. Yet Lomborg thinks-with the best of intentions-it is necessary that we at least allow ourselves to examine our logic before we embark on the biggest public investment in history.

We need to remind ourselves that our ultimate goal is not to reduce greenhouse gases or global warming per se but to improve the quality of life and the environment. We all want to leave the planet in decent shape for our kids. Radically reducing greenhouse-gas emissions is not necessarily the best way to achieve that. The data analysis in "Cool It" shows that it actually is one of the least helpful ways of serving humanity or the environment. Read a longer version of this article at:

#### Polar Bear Facts

Polar Bears are the most recent of the eight species of bears, probably having evolved from brown bears around 200,000 years ago. Today, 25,000 to 40,000 polar bears roam the Arctic.

Polar bears are the world's largest land predators. The largest polar bear recorded is 1,002 kg (2,210 lb). A Prius weighs 3,000 pounds. Male polar bears may grow 10 feet tall and weigh more than 1400 pounds. Females reach seven feet and weigh 650 pounds. In the wild polar bears live up to age 25.

Their maximum running speed is 40 kph (25 mph), but polar bears quickly overheat when they run, and therefore do it rarely.

Polar bears use a combination of body language and vocalizations to communicate. For example, head wagging from side to side often occurs when polar bears want to play.

In winter, polar bears clean themselves with snow instead of water. They rub their head in the snow, push forward on their stomachs, and roll on their back.

Female polar bears usually give birth to five litters during their life span. They usually only have two cubs. The babies are much smaller than human babies when they're born. They are the size of a rat and weigh little more than a pound. They can grow to full man size in a year if they have lots of food.

Despite what we think, a polar bear's fur is not white. Each hair is clear hollow tube. Polar bears look white because each hollow hair reflects the light. On sunny days, it traps the sun's infrared heat and keeps the bear warm at 98 degrees F. Polar bears are so well insulated that they have to move slowly to avoid overheating.

Polar bear fur is oily and water repellent. The hairs don't mat when wet, allowing the polar bears to easily shake free of water.

Due to her hard work, and that of friends and family, a fascinating view of local history has taken shape in the Spanish Flat Village Center at Lake Berryessa.

And as Carol said the other day, "But I want to tell you ...every time I'm there something magical happens. I wanted to tell the story of the town and valley as it was before everyone scattered to the winds due to the dam and filling of Lake Berryessa. But now it seems as if the scattered threads of the tapestry are coming together again."

People keep coming to visit, returning pieces of history for the exhibit - whether they be stories about valley life, photos of people and events, or actual physical mementos like an old school desk from the Monticello School.


But one day a few months ago a visitor came by who was responsible for one of the most fundamental elements of Carol's life – her very existence!

#### A Tale of Mothers and Daughters

As Carol tells the story, it was another fascinating day at the exhibit, explaining the various historical treasures to some visitors. As usual, Carol asked them if they had ever visited the old town and did they have any stories they remembered. Betty said

that her husband, Frank, had visited Monticello many times as a young man and was sitting right outside.

Frank was unable to enjoy the exhibit because he was 94 years old and could no longer see. Carol sat

next to him and asked if he remembered his visits those many years ago. He was a bit brusque at the start and claimed he didn't remember much, but warmed up to Carol as she explained her mission to preserve the history of Monticello.

He then seemed to remember the past as if it were yesterday. He began to tell a story that profoundly affected Carol. As he got into the story Carol says, "I got goose bumps over my entire body. I

focused in on everything he said and the way he said it as if my life depended on it – and it did!"

Frank was 94 years old. He lived in Vacaville had been a carpenter who came to Monticello to work in the 1930's. "I worked hard at an early age, not like the young nowadays!" He had also been a cowboy and often came to the big rodeos in Monticello. One day he and some friends had come from Vacaville to lower Putah Creek down by Big Rock, the swimming hole and resort that is now under water at the mouth of the Narrows, to go swimming. It was a place that many people would come to swim and camp in those days.

He recalled that he was perched up on some rocks overlooking the river when heard people yelling and screaming. They were just pointing and waving their arms. As Frank tells the story, "I realized that I was the one who would have to try to pull her out. I jumped in off the rocks, skinning my stomach and chest on the bottom of the river. The water was murky, but I could see her hair floating around and grabbed her lifeless body and pulled her to the shore. When I put her down on her stomach she started spitting up water and crying. I was kind of mad at the people who were closer but didn't jump in – I don't know why they didn't."

As the little girl came back to life and people crowded around her, Frank thought they were family so he just swam back across to his car and headed home to Vacaville without telling anyone his name.

Meanwhile Carol had tears welling up in her eyes and started asking questions as soon as Frank paused: How old were you? "Oh, about 17." How old was the little girl? "Oh it was so long ago — maybe 11 or so." Carol's quick calculation made that 77 years go. She gently put her hand on Frank's shoulder and told him a story of her own.

Carol's mother, Ruth McGinnis, had had a profound experience as a child and often related it to her family as they were growing up. It seems that Ruth's family also went to Big Rock on Putah Creek to camp and swim. Once when Ruth was about 11 she snuck away from camp to go out to a raft in the river.

The day before she had also snuck away but had been able to walk out to the raft.

This time the raft must have moved to deeper water because when she tried to put her foot down to go out farther, there was no bottom and she fell. She panicked and began screaming for help while flailing around and gulping

water. As Ruth relates the story, she would go under and come back up again, yell for help, then sink. She recalls being too tired to stay up and realized she was drowning! She remembers slowly going to the bottom and drifting down the river. Her last recollection was her head and shoulder hitting the bottom.

Then she awoke on the shore with a young man looking down at her!

The funny ending to this story, which will make us all think about what we have and haven't told our parents, is that Ruth NEVER TOLD her mother that she had almost drowned that day. Carol's mother, Ruth, had never told her mother, Dorothy Borges, (Carol's grandmother) because Ruth had snuck away from the family and didn't want to admit she had been "bad".

The sad ending to this story is that Carol was planning to have her mother meet Frank after all these years, but when she called him two months later she found out that he had just passed away.

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

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



#### **New Year Traditions Around the World**

"Auld Lang Syne" was written by Robert Burns in 1741 and literally means 'old long since,' or 'days gone by.' This song is traditionally sung in many begin. countries at midnight on January 1st, signaling the beginning of the New Year.

First city to celebrate - Sydney, Australia, hosts the first major New Year's Eve celebration each year.

Ball lowering celebration atop One Times Square in the USA was held on December 31st, 1907 and is now a worldwide symbol of the turn of the New Year, seen via satellite by more than one billion people each year.

The original New Year's Eve Ball weighed 700 pounds and was 5 feet in diameter. It was made of iron and wood and was decorated with 100 25-watt light bulbs.



Baby New Year Tradition - The tradition of using a baby to signify the New Year was started around 600 BC by the ancient Greeks, who, at the start of a year would carry a baby around in a basket. The purpose of it was to honour Dionysus, the God of Gifts in Shoes - In Greece children leave their shoes Fertility and symbolize his annual rebirth. This custom is still practiced in parts of Greece.

Hogmanay - The New Year in Scotland is called Hogmanay. Some people in Scotland follow a ritual that appears quite strange, but it actually has a

great significance. One can find barrels of tar set on Carrying a Suitcase - In Venezuela, Argentina, fire and gradually rolled down the streets in the villages of Scotland. This ritual symbolizes that the old year is burned up and New Year is going to at midnight. Some people may even carry it around

Burning "Mr Old Year" - In Columbia, Cuba and Puerto Rico families stuff a life-size male doll with things and then they dress it up in old clothes donated from each family member. At the stroke of midnight, this "Mr Old Year" is set on fire. This is done New York Times Square Celebrations - The first with the simple belief that a doll thus stuffed have New Love - Apparently, in Mexico, wearing red bad memories or sadness associated with them, and that the burning of these will help one to do away with past unhappiness and usher in happiness in life with the coming year.

> Eating Noodles - Late on the evening of December 31st, people from Japan might eat a bowl of buckwheat noodles called "toshikoshisoba" [year-crossing noodles] and listen for the sound of the Buddhist temple bells, which are rung 108 times at For that reason, the Dutch believe that eating midnight. The sound of these bells is said to purify the listeners of the 108 sins or evil passions that 'plague every human being'.

the clock strikes midnight (one each time the clock chimes) on New Year's Eve. This peculiar ritual originated in the 20th century when freak weather conditions resulted in an unseasonable bumper harvest of grapes. Not able to decide what to do about so many grapes at Christmas time, the King of Spain and the grape growers came up with the idea of the New Year ritual.

by the fireside on New Year's Day, which, incidentally, is also the Festival of Saint Basil in Greece, with the hope that Saint Basil, who was famous for his kindness, will come and fill their shoes with

Bolivia, and Mexico, those with hopes of travelling in the New Year carry a suitcase around the house the block to ensure travelling at greater distances.

Wearing new slippers - In China, many people wear, in the new year, a new pair of slippers that were bought before the new year, because it suggests stepping on the people who gossip about you.

underwear on New Year's Eve is said to bring new love in the upcoming year.

Foods - It was thought that one could affect the luck they would have throughout the coming year by what they did or ate on the first day of the year. It is still held, for example, in some regions that special New Year foods are the harbingers of luck.

donuts on New Year's Day will bring good fortune. The hog, and its meat, is considered lucky because it symbolizes prosperity. Cabbage is another "good luck" vegetable that is consumed on New Year's Eating 12 Grapes - In Spain people eat 12 grapes as Day by many. Cabbage leaves are also considered a sign of prosperity, being representative of paper currency. In some regions, rice is a lucky food that is eaten on New Year's Day.

> Black-eyed peas - Many parts of the USA celebrate the new year by consuming black-eyed peas. These legumes are typically accompanied by either hog jowls or ham. Black-eved peas and other legumes have been considered good luck in many cultures.

Berryessa is laughing about how long it is taking to redevelop the demolished Lake property owners who have been severely hurt by the Bureau of Reclamation's destruction of five resorts had hoped for Reclamation, describing them as intellithe rapid redevelopment of those resorts so the desperately-needed recovery could begin. Unfortunately, this does not appear to be the case.

Pensus re-opened two resorts last year (Lupin Shore and Chaparral Cove) with minimal services. So far this year the most visible sign of progress has been the removal of non-native vegetation at Chaparral Cove and Lupin Shores.

Pensus has announced the re-opening of Foothill Pines (the former Spanish Flat) on Memorial Day, although there may be no boat launching until the demolished launch ramp is replaced. Apparently it is taking some time to get the required permits.

Each of the three Pensus resorts will have tent and RV camping with new concrete picnic tables and BBQ/fire rings along with improved restroom trailers.

Per their web site Pensus is also taking reservations for Surface Dry Storage at Lupin Shores and Chaparral Cove.

Although Pensus provided a new development plan to Reclamation in November, 2010, it has yet to be approved. The new Pensus plan includes wet slips at Lupin Shores, but they are their pricing structure to move forward with actual dock installation.

#### Berryessa Highlands Rate Increase

Berryessa Highlands residents will pay sharply more for basic services in the coming months, a measure intended to help put district finances are elected and installed, and asks that back in order.

#### The Napa Valley Wine Train - Not Just For Tourists!

If you're like me you've driven Highway 29 between Napa and St. Helena hundreds of times without actually seeing the beauty of the Napa Valley. Driving takes concentration and the Valley sights go by mostly unnoticed in our peripheral vision. I've often seen the Wine Train while driving and wondered what that experience at the McKinstry Street Station in would be like.

On a beautiful sunny Sunday a few weeks ago I finally had my chance to find out. My son, Evan, and I rode the Napa Valley Wine Train – and it was great! I recommend it to local folks who've never tried it – and bring your friends. Although some may feel it's a bit pricey, consider it a "special occasion" event. After all, cost is relative. For example, skiing at Heavenly Resort in Tahoe now costs \$90 a day!

The Wine Train tracks were originally built in the 1860s to bring guests to the hot spring resort town of Calistoga. While the track to Calistoga no longer exists, much of the rest of the route of the Napa Valley Wine Train is unchanged. I enjoyed riding on trains in the past but had not done so in decades. There is something special about riding a vintage train past the vineyards of Napa Valley.

Our Gourmet Lunch Express Experience (\$99) had two seatings. We were sched-



uled for the second seating so we began our adventure heading North to St. Helena with very tasty appetizers and drinks in a comfortable lounge car with cozy seats and large picture windows. The service is excellent. Friendly waiters describe the outside sights while serving great food and drink.

The view out of the west side of the train is slightly more picturesque than

the east, which looks across the highway. We started out in our lounge car facing east, but when we moved from the lounge car to the dining car they did seat us on the opposite side of the train, facing west, so we got the full viewing experience.

Guests are invited to explore the train and we did - visiting the kitchen car to see our chefs in action, the wine tasting bar, and the observation deck at the rear of the train to enjoy an unobstructed view of the valley.

The Wine Train provides a relaxing three-hour, thirty-six mile roundtrip with fantastic views and incredible



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food. The antique train has two engines, two kitchens on board, and a collection of early 20th century rail cars that are pure Americana. The vintage 1915-1917 Pullman dining and lounge cars and the 1952 Vista Dome car have been lavishly restored.

The Wine Train begins its journey Napa with a short complimentary wine tasting seminar in the comfortable pre-boarding lounge. The train then travels north to St. Helena, where the locomotive disconnects from the north facing side of the train



and reconnects to the south facing side of the train in preparation for the return journey. Unfortunately, you're not allowed off in St. Helena.

The boarding process is simple, friendly, and efficient with no time wasted. The staff seems to be having a genuinely good time making your experience the most pleasant possible.

If you're interested in a less expensive (\$49.50) experience during the warm season, you can ride in the wood-paneled first car - great views and you can open the windows to feel and smell the spring and summer air. 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

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#### The Scientific Basis for Astrology

The ancient zodiac is not affected by Earth's wobble. Has the zodiac really changed? Is your personality different? What about your soul mate's? And what about your future?

Some horoscope readers were shocked to hear that, after a life of assuming they were romantic, easygoing Libras, they actually were practical and intelligent Virgos! But it turns out that rumors that the zodiac is off by a month are largely much ado about nothing. That's a relief for believers because adjacent astrological signs are considered to carry opposite personality traits.

The Star Tribune of Minneapolis ran a short story about how the Earth's axis has shifted enough over the past few millennia to offset which zodiac constellations go with which months. #### Berryessa: Fishing the Northeast Side

This article is written to help bass anglers increase their catch when fishing Lake Berryessa and the angler that has never fished Berryessa before. The northeast side of Berryessa contains many small submerged creek channels, minute compared to the many other creeks that are found throughout the lake. With their small bays, the bass use these creeks to migrate into their feeding grounds.

The bays maybe on the average from 5ft to 8ft with outside area between 12ft to 25ft, gradually tapering off into a flat area or bowl. What I have frequently observed is anglers fishing the NE area too shallow, consequently catching only 10% of the potential bass in the area. I will explain in detail how to catch a much larger percentage of the bass that are present at the time you choose to fish.

#### Depth Finder

When using a depth finder, look for irregularities on the bottom and grass beds. The grass beds in question are formed during low water conditions or clear water conditions when the sun can penetrate down creating a growth. This is what I call a secondary grass line. Once I have located the above described area I will parallel the main bank in 10 to 12ft of water looking for any kind of clumps of grass or a break line of 2ft.

When I come to a creek channel I always check and see what the difference in depth is between the flat area and the center or side's of the creek. Two feet is fair, three feet is good, four feet is exceptional. At 3ft, I will definitely stop and fish it, looking for clumps of grass with my Depth Finder. I will further watch the depth finder as the water becomes deeper until it turn's to a flat bottom with no sides.

There are only four rigs needed to fish NE Lake Berryessa: (1) Texas Rig with 10lb McCoy Fishing Line (Mean Green). (2) a Gary Yamamoto five inch Hula Grub on a 3/8 to 3/4oz football head. (3) a Mojo Rig with 6lb McCoy with a swival, using a 12inch leader at the end a No. 2/0 hook (Gama EWG works well), dressed with a GY twin tail grub. (4) A suspended jerk bait for "ripp'in" like a Luckycraft Pointer SP Clown. My favorites are the Texas Rig 3/16oz brass with glass and the Mojo Rig. With these rigs you can cover all depths throughout a water column of 10-14ft and be confidently in full contact with your bait.

With the Texas Rig, I shake with a Ivino SP-20 spade tail. This tells me how active the fish are. If I find the fishing slow and I know there are more fish there, I come back with a Mojo Rig, dressed with a Black & Silver flake grub using a sweeping motion with my rod. The sweeping motion is subtle but steady, simulating a swimming shad, and then dying on the fall. Both techniques are done at a depth of ten to fourteen feet.

If I find fish in this water column I then move in to shallower water with my "ripp'in" rod looking for feeding fish. Catching the 10% that are there, be alert for any detail such has a one feet breakline or a significant amount of grass that may hold a fish. Keep an eye on the depth of the boat compared to the depth where you had caught a fish. Positioning of the boat is often critical in shallow water conditions. Once accomplishing this, move back to 10-14ft of water and work below 14ft until you find the edge of the growth that was holding the fish, this can be as deep has 18ft.

At 12 to 18 feet, it is not unusual to be as far as 150 yards from shore. Below 14ft I use a Hula Grub "swimming" it along the edge of the grass line picking off aggressive fish that haven't committed to moving in shallower to actively feed. One of the key's to catching fish in deeper water with a 3/4oz football head is that by "swimming" it, the bottom becomes stirred up, mimicking a crawdad attempting to get away.

#### When to fish the NE

When to fish the NE is darn near anytime of year with the exception of when a cold from the north comes in from Alaska. Normally from Feb 15th all the way thru November you should be able to catch a limit or two of bass there.

Wind is a key issue to observe for while fishing the NE corner of the lake. Wind, normally will blow from the North first thing in the morning causing a slow bite or movement of fish into feeding. The North wind will stop usually between 9-10am in the morning and the Northwest wind will start to come up for the rest of the day. This

is the best time to venture into this area.

Best bite is between 10am until 1pm in the afternoon. Don't ask me why, it just is and I don't question mother nature ha ha!!!!! har..... Best bite is when you get that ripple on the water, thus, cutting the sunlight penetration down causing the fish to move up to feed or into feeding depending on the depth there in. There are always other fishing patterns occurring around this lake, but this pattern will hold up under MOST weather conditions.

Remember to note the depth where you have caught fish and the position of the boat at that time. Usually you will find a group of fish in a 30yd area. You can very easily run out of the zone, so pay attention. A little secret known among the fisherman that know the NE corner well, is that if you are catching small fish or legal tournament fish and they just suddenly turn off, just wait 20 minutes because the bigger fish

Native Americans in the Berryessa Valley lived principally along Putah Creek, not 440 feet above it. When farmers plowed the fields in the Berryessa Valley before the dam was built, they would uncover so many primitive artifacts (simple bowls and scraping tools) they would lay them along the banks of Putah Creek to prevent erosion. Examples of artifacts from Oak Shores are shown below.

Several Archeological studies were done before and after the construction of Monticello Dam. Two studies done later are referenced below.

Milling Stone Cultures in Northern California: Berryessa I (1979) from the Journal of California and Great Basin Anthropology, contains the following statements:

"Although the study area (Oak Shores Park) is contiguous to Lake Berryessa and appears (at the present time) to be a favorable place for human occupance, prior to the construction of Monticello Dam it was a considerable distance from the principal stream draining the area (Putah Creek), and would not usually be considered a very likely place to search for or find substantial evidence of prehistoric occupation. Thus, when the Bureau of Reclamation requested the Oak Shores survey, it appeared that it would be yet another public archaeology project in which the primary value would be the exercise gained by the surveyors.

In sum, although the situation was difficult to accept in view of our general notions about resource exploitation and prehistoric space utilization, we had to face the fact that a careful survey over a substantial territory had produced no tangible evidence of occupance or utilization. It was agreed at that point that a short report was in order pointing out that the survey had been accomplished and that the planned Oak Shores Campground development would not impact any known cultural resources."

Archaeological Investigations at Lake Berryessa, California: Berryessa II (1985) from the Journal of California and Great Basin Anthropology similarly found few artifacts of significant value:

"As a first step in the investigation of

of inquiry were initiated: (1) a re-examination of several critical areas above the 440-foot contour (overflow elevation of Lake Berryessa) within the Oak Shores project area; and (2) an intensive survey of a second segment (designated the "bridge sector" (Fig. 21) of the exposed


shoreline and reservoir bed.

Results of the re-examination were essentially negative. Even though the drought had reduced normal grass cover, the only archaeological remains found above the 440-foot contour consisted of a small scatter of obsidian flakes at one, quite limited, locus in the Oak Shores area.

Specifically, it is hypothesized that the greater the elevation above and distance from Eticuera and Putah creeks, the more widely dispersed and apparently casual are the prehistoric artifacts. Site locations and artifact distributions in the bridge sector of Eticuera Creek were examined during the 1976-1977 drought when the surface of Lake Berryessa dropped below the 400-foot contour. The predicted location of major camps and villages in the Oak Shores area cannot, of course, be verified without a substantial lowering of the lake.

Currently, all village sites within the immediate Lake Berryessa project area lie under water. Site NAP-539, located upstream from the lake on Eticuera Creek, appears to be the only intact prehistoric village in the general vicinity."



#### **Litigation Lottery:**

#### **Lawsuits Against Local Governments**

The United States is clearly a lawsuit-happy country. For example, product liability lawsuits previously used the principle of "Assumption of Risk". People who did clearly dangerous things with a product (motorcycle, jet ski, bread slicer) were presumed intelligent enough to know that they could get hurt. But some attorneys recognized that most people actually weren't that smart and shifted the legal principle to "Strict Liability".

This "creating new law" as it's known in the trade, caused a surge in lawsuits when people realized that getting hurt was the same as winning the lottery if they could sue. As long as they could prove they were dumb enough to get hurt by something, they made money.

many companies needed this incentive to make opinion on any case. their products safer. But it did become money-

This "I won the lottery" attitude is also present in the types of lawsuits brought against local govits. ernments: towns, cities, and counties. Whether it's the little old lady who falls on a downtown street and blames a crack in the sidewalk or an inattentive driver who hits a curb while practicing the lost art of parallel parking and blames the town for putting the curb there, personal distress equates to winning the lottery in many people's minds, especially when supposedly "deep-pockets" local governments are involved.

Well, government pockets are really not that deep. Every dollar spent on a frivolous lawsuit comes from somewhere in your town's budget – maybe from the salary of a laid-off park maintenance worker. Page 7 gives a list of the lawsuits I know this is somewhat overstating the case — years. This is public information and I have no injury (i.e. psychological))



**Becoming Fire Wise!** By Evan Kilkus

Napa Firewise is a fire awareness program designed to educate the residents of Napa County about the dangers wildland fires pose and the need to create "defensible space" around their homes. Defensible space is a zone where vegetation and fire fuels have been reduced to stop fire spread. The goal is to save homes and lives. Defensible space is a law as well as an approach to vegetation management

The Berryessa Estates at the north end of Lake Berryessa formed a Fire Safe Council in 2007 as part of the Napa Firewise program. Not far behind in protecting their own community was a group of concerned residents of the Berryessa Highlands who recently formed the Berryessa Highlands Fire Safe Council.

As many Berryessa Highlands residents have probably noticed, there has been some tree trimming and brush-clearing going on in the neighborhood over the last few weeks. This clearing is the first phase of fire hazard reduction work that is planned to take place across the Berryessa Highlands area.

The work is a joint effort including CAL FIRE, the Napa County Fire Department, the Napa Communities Firewise Council, and the Berryessa Highlands Fire Safe Council.

Highlands Hot Spots Identified

With the help of Don Gasser, Fire Smart, Inc., who is an expert at identifying wildfire fuels and fire hazards, the council identified thirteen project areas during their initial meetings in 2010. They found areas with extremely high concentrations of fire fuels, including the clusters of eucalyptus around the sewer plant and water tank, and the dense brush to the West of Rimrock Road.

They also decided that any large clusters of brush along Steele Canyon Road should be cleared out, since Steele Canvon is the only access road serving the community.

Additionally, specific locations

were identified as in need of fire fuel reduction, including under the PG&E power towers, and around the chimneys at some homes.

#### Current Project Status

With the Berryessa Highlands Fire Safe Council organized, the Napa Communities Fire Wise Foundation set aside \$10,000 of its 2010/2011 county-wide grant for use in the Berryessa Highlands.

Initially, using a fifteen man CAL FIRE Delta Camp Crew, they created a 200-300 foot perimeter of defensible space around the treatment plant.

This first project included removing all lower brush and small pine trees, and removing and/or pruning a dozen or so large and dense eucalyptus trees. There was also a large amount of brush and pine up the hill between the plant and Steele Canyon Road that was thinned out.

The second project was along Steele Canvon Road between the Lupine Shores entrance and Rimrock Road. Specifically, there were six or seven strips of land between houses where they were able to make an impact.

The third project area during this initial phase will bring the work crew up Rimrock, where they will clear the highly flammable and dense chamise brush. They will pri-Poppy Lane, Manzanita Lane, and along Steele Canyon Road. Black Oak Lane.

As we all know, it is the homeowner's responsibility to clear within 100 feet of their home. The work crew will be concentrating on the next 100 feet beyond that, doubling the "buffer" area. Some of this brush will be hauled up the hill and

#### Long Term Plans

The next step for the Council is to create a Community Wildfire Protection Plan, and submit that, with a grant application, to the state in order to receive additional funding to complete the remainder of projects. The application submission and approval process

will take place over the next several months, with future projects estimated to take place as early as next Winter.

Although 2012 will be the year for major improvements, 2011 will see many upgrades to amenities at Lupine Shores, Chaparral Cove, and Foothill Pines (Memorial Day opening) resorts. Markley Cove Resort, Pleasure Cove Marina, and all public recreation facilities are open for business as usual.

In the longer term, David Ffinch, President of Pensus, stated that, "Pensus plans to provide a safe, high quality and varied recreation experience to satisfy the desires of all who choose to enjoy the extraordinary beauty of Lake Berryessa"

A joint Pensus - Bureau of Reclamation press release stated last month that five concession areas managed by Pensus will be open this summer. There will be a single telephone number for reservations and information: 707-966-9088.

Chaparral Cove (formerly Putah Creek) and Lupine Shores (formerly Steele Park) recreation areas are currently open for day use, boat launching, and \$20 each way. RV and tent camping.

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#### Nichelini Winery Renovation Uncovers **History** – **Literally!**

May 4, 1939. Fred Nichelini is on his hands and knees. He is in the process of removing a floorboard in the old Nichelini house in Chiles Valley built by his father in 1895. You know, the one built on top of the old stone winery cellar. His father had died two years earlier. His brother Bill and he would often come up from Oakland to do handyman work for his mother, who still lived there. Besides, after 44 years it was time to lay down some modern linoleum on top of the well-worn wood floor. Over the years his 11 brothers and sisters had literally beaten a path in the doorway between the living room and dining room.

The floor had to be flat with no bumps or depressions when the linoleum was laid. In order to get it that way he had to use a shim under the board. So he went out to his car to get a newspaper he had brought with him, tightly folded it up and tucked it neatly under the board. It worked.

Last week, Ken Wainright, a fourth generation Nichelini, along with his cousins Phil Sunseri, his wife, Leslie, their son, Josh, and Marvin Asher, were doing some repair work on the floor. They noticed a particular area was a slightly "soft". It sort of gave way a little. Investigating this further, Ken removed the board and there was Fred's newspaper. It had not seen the light of day in 72 years. Yet it was as good as new.

He carefully unfolded it. The Oakland Tribune, May 4, 1939. Three big headlines caught his eye. History was to prove that all three were to ring hollow as predic-

tions. "Japan Split with German Axis Hinted", read one. The second read, "Germany Offers Guarantees to Balkan Nations". And the last one was, "Poland Will Say 'No' To Hitler In Danzig. Warsaw is Calm Over New Crises". Four months later, on September 1, 1939, Germany invaded Poland and a new term in warfare was created, the blitzkrieg.

"It was like going back in time", said Ken Wainright, "World War II was only four months away and nobody knew it. Of course, when you are on a piece of land that has been home for the same family since 1884, not too much surprises you. What's fun is that the next surprise never seems to be too far away."

"My father, Fred Nichelini, was a real handyman", said Carol Nichelini Madigan. "We don't know for certain that it was he that did that specific floor repair but, at that time, between his brother Bill, who was the family's second-generation winemaker, and he, most of the needed repairs got done. Also, my father was working as a ship building inspector at Mare Island in 1939, so he would have been keenly interested in the German situation". In fact, in that same newspaper on the front page was another article, "Navy Asks for More Warships", a request to the U.S. House of Representatives that was, in fact, for a record peacetime appropriation for naval

First it was the four beehives we found in the old barn walls (story previously printed in the Lake Berryessa News). Now a perfectly preserved 1939 newspaper under the floorboards. The next "renovation surprise" could come any day!

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

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#### **Triploid Trout Stocking Begins** in Lake Berryessa

The California Department of Fish and Game (DFG) has not stocked rainbow trout in Lake Berryessa since April, 2010. This has changed changed since 3,400 pounds (6,800 fish) of catchable triploid trout were planted in Lake Berryesss on February 15, 2011 according to Mike Ficele, Fish Hatchery Manager, Silverado Fisheries Base, at the Yountville DFG office.



A lawsuit filed in 2006 by the Pacific Rivers Council and the Center for Biological Diversity against DFG claimed that DFG's fish stocking operation did not comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). DFG had to complete an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) that considers species and habitats affected by hatchery-raised rainbow trout. One of the conditions of the EIR is that each water planted throughout California must go through a Pre-Stocking Evaluation (PSE) Protocol.

DFG recently completed a PSE for Lake Berryessa and the lake was approved as a "triploid waters" for the stocking of sterile triploid trout.

According to Ficele, more trout are being raised at Darrah Springs Hatchery near Redding and are almost ready for release. The release standard is two trout per pound, They are now at the 3 trout per pound stage. Future releases should take place during March. The target is to release 40,000 pounds of trout (80,000 fish). "It looks like we may



actually hit the target goal of 40,000 lbs, and stockings should really get going in March," according

Through the mandated environmental impact studies done on California's trout stocking program, it was found that the steelhead, a federally threatened species, could interbreed with the nonnative strains of hatchery trout that could escape trout. over the dam. So in order to protect the genetic integrity of the native steelhead, only the sterile triploids are allowed to be stocked in Lake

Berryessa.

The "triploid" trout are normal rainbows that have been modified to be sterile, but are otherwise identical to other rainbow trout. They look, fight, and taste just the same. With no ability to reproduce, triploids focus all of their energy on eating and growing

large — sometimes to exaggerated proportions. But the largest of them, 20 pounds and above, are found in the lakes of Washington and Idaho.

But they are not actually "genetically-modified" in the sense that their genes have not actually been "changed" and thus don't deserve the negative description as "frankenfish". They are rare but natural phenomena in the wild. But to create thousands of them at a time took scientific experimentation. The science behind creating these fish happens during the incubation of the trout eggs.

When trout spawn, the female's eggs possess two sets of chromosomes and the male's sperm possess one set. After the eggs are fertilized, the chromosomes recombine and each egg inherits one set of chromosomes from the female and another set from the male — similar to humans. The third set is then kicked out of the egg. Rarely in the wild, an egg will "forget" to kick out the third set and the fish becomes what is known as a triploid (possessing three sets of chromosomes). Triploid fish look,

> swim, jump, and taste like normal fish, except for one important difference they never develop normal eggs or sperm and are unable to reproduce (i.e., they are sterile).

> Through experimentation with this natural process, researchers found that they could create triploid trout both by exposing trout eggs to pressure and by placing trout eggs in a warm water bath shortly after fertilization. Both processes inhibit a trout egg's ability to kick out that third set of chromosomes and a triploid fish is born. California's DFG is currently using the pressure method for the production of their triploids.

The DFG plants catchable rainbows after they grow to a half-pound as part of a "put & catch" fishery that is designed for anglers to have at them for a short time. Survivability and growth are not a goal of the program. Sterile trout will be raised to the same half-pound before being released. There will not be an attempt to engineer monster-size

These "put & catch" fish are meant specifically for anglers to catch. A rule of thumb is that there is a 50% catch rate by anglers during the first 6 months to a year of fishing. All rainbow trout have the potential for large growth spurts if they find a healthy spot, but it is unknown whether a triploid will grow any larger than a fertile fish.

Trout feed on small insects, minnows, crustaceans and worms. Aquatic and terrestrial insects are the main sources of natural food for trout. The triploids are not expected to have a negative effect on the number of other game fish in the lake. There may be specific factors about Lake Berryesss that would cause some especially large trout to grow from those that were planted. But we won't know that for several years.

#### **Green River Fishing**

"Pick up a flat rock, skip it across Green River." Who knows where exactly John Fogerty was skipping rocks across Putah Creek way back when. Creedence Clearwater Revival's song "Green River" was about Putah Creek where John Fogerty used to spend summers as a kid. One thing is for certain, "Green River" would face her share of challenges flowing down stream.

Having grown up a few blocks from Putah Creek there was hardly a hole that I had not swum in, a riffle I had not fished, a fish that I had not met. Things were so much different back then in regards to regulations, methods, and fishing conditions.

An angler could have his limit in a couple of hours in those days of planted rainbows. Those days, are long gone. In 2008 Putah was added to the Department of Fish and Games no plant list. The put and take system that so many visitors had creek might never be the same.

When the ruling went into effect that there would no longer be fish stocked in Putah Creek changes in the regulations did not immediately follow, leaving the wild fish that were left subject to the 5 fish catch limit. In 2007 a group of anglers: Greg Bonovich, Dr. Garrick Chang, Chris

Yama, Gordon Chappell, and others had noticed the drastic decline in the fishing and decided that something needed to be done. Putah Creek Trout, the organization,

Their goal was clear, protect the wild fish that were left, preserve their habitat and they will re populate the future. In 2009, they began working with DFG's wild trout program specifically on changing regulations for fishing the creek.

In order to protect the wild fish, a zero take limit was put in place year round. No longer would it be common to see stringers full of fish leaving the creek. To help with releasing the fish safely only artificial flies or lures with barbless hooks may be used. The no bait regulation is by far the most unpopular.

The reason behind it is that when a trout eats bait it swallows it along with the hook. It is very hard to retrieve a hook from a fish once it has been swallowed thus harmfully affecting the survival rate been used to was now eliminated. The of the fish that is released. 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

#### Fly Fishing the Green River

The key to being a successful angler on Putah Creek is to keep at it and change your style regularly. It is important when fishing Putah Creek to set your expectations correctly. I tell my clients flat out, this is a tough place to catch fish. There are so many challenges when fishing Putah I don't know where to start.

I guess first is that dry flies will not produce a lot of fish. If you want to catch fish here you need to know how to nymph with weight and an indicator. This is a river where you need to know how to roll cast and you need to know how to roll cast well. tant skill to have here. Smaller size flies in the 18-With all of the trees, bushes, branches, and rocks 24 range will get more grabs then the bigger stuff. working against you it is not uncommon to go a whole day without ever making a single back cast.

The rainbows here are all big, wild, and in great shape. There are a lot of fish 20 inches with some close to 30. Expect most fish to be in the 12-15 inch

Putah Creek. The weather starts to get warmer meaning more bugs are activity. The fish are done with their spawn and ready to get fat again. The water levels will be in your favor at least until April 1st. When fishing here I recommend a standard 9'

and tippet, either 5X or 6X. Some anglers here like to as light as 7X which is fine when fighting the smaller fish but if you hook a "Putah Pig" on 7X you will get worked.

In March the caddis will start to hatch, use your favorite pupae patterns both green and cream. There are always good mayfly hatches and midges. March is a good time to strip streamers. The creek is full of sculpins and sticklebacks; if nymphing isn't working try stripping a big sculpzilla or black bunny leach.

Presentation with your flies is the most impor-Also, make sure to change flies often, I can confidently make the argument that these fish see more flies than any other tail water in California.



But new research leaked from the UC Davis Agricultural Research Department on April 1, 2011 reveals the reason why many virus-based illnesses can now spread so rapidly. Some micro-organisms can now evagualate. They have evolved the ability to interact with biological, mechanical and electronic devices. #### Camp Berryessa Wins \$1.5 M Grant

Kids in Napa County and nearby areas will have a better chance of sleeping under the stars, watching osprey dive for fish or doing rolls in a kayak, thanks to a \$1.5 million grant that the California Coastal Conservancy awarded today to the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District to construct an outdoor education camp on the site of the former Boy Scout camp on Putah Creek at the north end of Lake Berryessa.

Last fall the local Mead Foundation awarded a \$50,000 seed grant to the District. The District used this seed grant as local matching funds, which then leveraged the \$1.5 million Coastal Conservancy grant.

The grant will enable the District to construct the first phase of the camp, which will include approximately 30 tent cabins, campfire amphitheater, swimming area, canoes and kayaks, nature trails, and numerous other activity areas. Once the basic camp is up and operating, the District will seek funding to complete the campground by adding a central dining and meeting facility.

Youth and other non-profit community groups using the site will support the camp through discounted user fees and volunteer labor.

"Not a cent of taxpayer money should be spent on flashlights, ashtrays or other unnecessary items, most of which likely end up in landfills," said Governor Brown. "Every taxpayer dollar we save by cutting waste is a dollar that can be used to pay for critical public safety and social services."

The Napa County Board of Supervisors — who also serve as the directors of the Napa Berryessa Resort Improvement District —issued a request for proposals (RFP) to manage the water and wastewater of the NBRID facilities serving the Berryessa Highlands.



#### Lake Level as of 3/28/11







#### Lake Berryessa News Introduces New Weather Radar & Fish Finder

Using an experimental new radar working with the California Department of Fish and Game to test a radical new

issue of The Lake Berryessa News that DF&G is now stocking triploid rainbow trout in the lake. This method of tracking is for scientific use and will not be available to anglers who must continue to use fish finders.

#### **D-Q:** A Ghost Town University?

For many years I've driven past a set of institutional buildings standing out in the middle of a farm field on Hwy 128 between Winters and Davis. I've always wondered about them and maybe you have too. Friends in Winters had told me it was an old Native American school, but I was surprised to find out more about it's long history – and that of the site itself.

D-O University was a two-year college located on Road 31. The school closed due to loss of accreditation, declining enrollment, and alleged financial mismanagement.

The full name of the school is Deganawidah-Quetzalcoatl University. According to Iroquois leaders, use of the spelled-out name of the university can be offensive because the first part of the name should be used only in an appropriate spiritual context. Therefore, it is usually referred to as D–Q University to avoid offense. Iroquois tribal members, in certain circumstances, may use the full name.

The purpose of D–Q University was to provide alternative ideas and methods of education to Native American people. Among its goals were the preservation and re-institutionalization of traditional Native American values, the perpetuation and exercise of Native American religion and beliefs, the establishment of a Native American Research Institute, the development of field-based educational delivery systems to Native Americans who could not attend the school itself, and the maintenance of social and personal support systems for D-Q students and staff.

Founded in 1971, D-Q was the only all-Native American college in California and faced severe financial and accreditation issues. The school was one of the first six tribal colleges in the United States, all of which were founded between 1968 and 1972. Those six colleges created the American Indian Higher Education Consortium in 1972. The U.S. Department of Education recognizes 34 tribal colleges, the majority of which are two-vear institutions.

The site of D-Q was previously

used as a United States Army communications facility, known at various times as the Sacramento Vallev Radio Transmitting Station; West Coast Relay and Transmitter Station; U.S. Army West Coast Relay and Radio Transmitting Station; and the U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command - CONUS, Davis California, Facility. The site was also used at one time by the Department of the Army, Signal Corps, to support the Signal Corps Radio Station WVY.

After the federal government decommissioned the site, the organizers of the school applied to use it. based on a law which required surplus federal land to be returned to Native Americans. The application was initially denied, but after a series of protests, the University of California withdrew its application to use the site for its Native American Studies program and a primate lab, and D-Q University was conditionally granted the land in 1970.

The school opened in 1971, and obtained accreditation in 1977, but lost it in 2005, after which it closed. However, disputes among the board of trustees were settled in a lawsuit, which resulted in the re-opening of D-O University later that year. Declining enrollment and lack of funds led the board to dismiss the president in June 2006.

While formal classes are not currently being held, elders and teachers have occupied the University grounds despite Board and police pressures to vacate the land. During several instances in 2008, students and supporters were arrested for occupying the

The school's community continues in hosting community events, such as powwows, as recently as April 2009, including presenting an indigenous permaculture course and other cultural

D-Q University in September 2010, in conjunction with the Regenerative Design Institute hosted a Permaculture Design Course, during which time Native Americans and non-Natives collaborated on site development proposals.

Phil Burton of Pope Valley asks readers to report any sightings of the Tri-Color Blackbird. "I do some volunteer work for the Audubon Society and last weekend was our bi-annual Tri-Color Blackbird count. At this time of year, they form colonies in tules and cattails for nesting. They're only found in California and they've been declining for years. Two years ago we found more than 600 in Pope Valley. This year we found none.

I spent half the day Saturday looking at the historic sites and didn't see a single bird. I have a bad feeling that they may be gone. Over in the Central Valley, there are still some, but on this side of the lake??????

The females are pretty drab but the males look just like a "regular" Red-Winged Blackbird BUT they have an obvious white stripe next to the red. And, as I said, this time of year they are found in groups."

#### Napa's Ag Revenues Down in 2010

Napa's agricultural output was valued at more than \$461 million in 2010, down roughly 8 percent, more than \$40 million less than values measured in 2009. Rough market conditions for Napa's top crop, premium wine, were the primary cause of the declining values.

The county's olive industry continued to grow, generating \$666,000 in 2010. A year earlier, the olive crop was valued at just \$297,000. Vegetable crops continue to make up only a small portion of the county's agricultural economy, valued at \$116,795 in 2010. The figure was down from the more than \$200,000 generated by vegetables a year earlier.

In 2010, the value of livestock dropped 7 percent, sliding from \$3.3 million to \$3 million. Field crops - such as hay and pasture land - took a large hit, moving from \$365,000 in 2009 to \$145,000 in 2010.

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
#### Dam Level Update as of Monday, 4/18/11



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#### Pope Valley: Now and Then

I wonder how many people who visit the Napa Valley realize that it is actually made up of 97 little valleys? Yes. The United States Geological Survey lists 97 valleys or canyons. Take away the 73 named canyons and you still get 24 separate valleys and that's not counting Chiles Valley, which they consider an area, not a valley. Go figure.

Each valley has its own microclimate — its own soils. We grew up in Conn Valley, which has a decidedly different climate than Wooden Valley or Foss Valley. Grapes thrive in some valleys and do less well in others. Water is generally scarcer in the subvalleys than in the volcanic hillsides. Each valley has its own personality, but none can lay a glove on Pope Valley in the springtime.

For a few weeks each spring, Pope Valley is carpeted in green and sprinkled with thousands upon thousands of wildflowers. It is a bike rider's paradise, flat, cool, breathtakingly beautiful. Whereas Napa Valley proper was originally settled by German and Italian immigrants, Pope Valley was settled by mostly Scotch-Irish who crossed the plains with the first wagon trains led by larger-than-life guides like Jim Bridger and Joel Walker. The early settlers were tough and generous. Lynn Webber chronicles how they were the first to go up into the Sierras to help rescue the Donner Party. In fact, a few of the 900 residents in Pope Valley can claim Donner Party descendancy.

In 1873 Aetna Springs started stirring. The golf course (built in 1893) used to claim to be the first one built west of the Mississippi, but others dispute that. Lance Armstrong has pedaled yearly past Jeff Paraday's garage and Hendrick's quaint store while competing in the Tour de California. One used to see small private planes landing daily at Usibelli's air field. When we were young, a special treat was if my parents would drive us out to Usibelli's restaurant (now defunct) for the best steak in the Valley. If we got there early enough we could watch the planes land and take off.

In the late '70s there was quite an active skydiving club. The Internet is filled with nostalgic memories of folks who jumped there. They call it the best DZ (drop zone) in the world. One said, "The airport was once the world's largest parachute training facility during World War II."

As everyone knows, Litto's Hubcap Ranch is in the Guinness Book of World Records. Only in Pope Valley could one man's fetish for hubcaps become a nationally renowned work of art. Classic.

The Lake Luciana project has been a hotbed of political debate. It has split Pope Valley. We remember when Butte Oil owned the ranch and its 5,000-acre-foot lake. Back in the late '80s the county (as only bureaucratic government can do) decided it would consider a "tree ordinance." Rather than wait for the county's findings — and fearful that they (or future land owners) wouldn't be allowed to cut trees and plant grapes — in one weekend Butte Oil slaughtered hundreds of oak trees that had been there since before 1776. They lay like dead soldiers on a battle field. It was an ecological Antietam.

But our fondest memories of Pope Valley were Easter weekend. The annual Easter egg hunt at Wally's was one for the books. Dozens of families would arrive bringing food, wine and beer, and the kids would fan out and climb a knoll laden with Easter eggs under the wildflowers.

As the kids got older, the "egg hunt" turned into "Rocket Day," where Ronnie and a group of crazed, amateur Werner Van Brauns would test their rockets and send them soaring 1,500 feet in the air, and then they'd parachute gently to the ground. The youngest kids would scurry to retrieve them while the older ones popped clutches and ground gears trying to figure how to drive a stick shift. Barry would bring his 50-millimeter machine gun and his armored personnel carrier (on tracks). The budding teens would jump in the four-wheelers, jeeps and trucks, and drive around the ranch — learning the skills they would need when they became of age.

Cowboy hats and boots dominated. It looked like a scene from "Oklahoma." Instead of surreys with some fringe on top, open jeeps and pickups surrounded temporary picnic tables and ice chests. Neighbors were gathering. Life was moving on. And Pope Valley was keeping a watchful eye on us all.

Many years ago he had founded a similar round table in the then frontiertown of Fairbanks, Alaska where he practiced law for mining interests. The object of the round table was simply to have a pleasant social gathering once amonth so the residents could learn toknow each other a little better.

The original meeting at the PopeValley Lodge included 4 families: The Wildbergers, the Blanchards, the Pfundsand the Hardins, It's popularity spread rapidly, soon averaging around 25 people per

In the attendance record book is typed the following guide lines for the Round Table: This guest book is given to the Round Table by the Usibelli Lodge, as a token of hospitality and good will. Those who attend are invited to do so if they wish. The Pope Valley Round Table meets on the second Thursday of each month, for dinner and a neighborly good time at the Lodge.

There is no organization - no officers - no board of directors - no minutes and no required attendance. No invitation is extended beyond the suggestion that one might like to come. There is only one rule: Each-person attending must pay his or her own bill. Mr. Pfund made one further restriction: At no meeting may a member use theRound Table for the purpose of promoting events of a financial or political nature.

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

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
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
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#### Berryessa Estates: Putah Creek is Back!

can transmit disease.

Once an embedded tick is manually removed, it is not uncommon for a welt and skin reaction to occur. A little hydrocortisone spray will help alleviate the irritation, but it may take a week or more for healing to take place.

In some cases, the tick bite may permanently scar leaving a hairless area. This skin irritation is due to a reaction to tick saliva. Do not be worried about the tick head staying in; it rarely happens.

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#### "Smartyphone" Techie Fun Stuff

During the last five years both cellphone and internet service have improved dramatically at Lake Berryessa. Gone are the days when email service crashed every few minutes while trying to use PacBell landlines to the Berryessa Highlands.

Although PacBell never did (nor ever will) replace their old copper cables to Napa, cellphone service providers like AT&T, as well as internet service providers like PNC Valley Internet, have replaced the need for landlines and satellite internet service.

As I mentioned in my front page article, I now have an HTC Inspire "smartyphone" as a tech-adverse friend calls it. A toy of many diversions, a necessity for almost nothing. But it does have a cute feature - a code reader. Using the camera and the AT&T Code Scanner application I can now read any bar code on any object. I can also read QR codes.

A QR code (short for Quick Response) is a specific matrix barcode (or two-dimensional code), readable by dedicated OR barcode readers and camera phones. The code consists of black modules arranged in a square pattern on a white background. The information encoded can be text, URL or other data.

Common in Japan, where it was created by Toyota subsidiary Denso-Wave in 1994, the QR code is one of the most popular types of two-dimensional barcodes. OR is the abbreviation for Quick Response, as the creator intended the code to allow its contents to be decoded at high speed.

Although initially used for tracking parts in vehicle manufacturing, QR codes are now used in a much broader context, including both commercial tracking applications and convenience-oriented applications aimed at mobile phone users (termed mobile tagging).

QR codes can be used to display text to the user, to add a vCard contact to the user's device, to open a Uniform Resource Identifier (URI) or to compose an email or text message. Users can also generate and print their own QR codes for others to scan and use by visiting one of several free QR

code generating sites.

QR codes storing addresses and Uniform Resource Locators (URLs) may appear in magazines, on signs, buses, business cards, or almost any object about which users might need information.

Users with a camera phone equipped with the correct reader application can scan the image of the QR code to display text, contact information, connect to a wireless network, or open a web page in the phone's browser. This act of linking from physical world objects is termed hardlinking or object hyperlinking.

To show the outside world that Lake Berryessa has kept up with the modern world of insipid (mostly) social networking and reltively useless applications of high tech software, I have created QR codes for the Lake Berryessa News and a few other advertisers and web sites. (See bottom of this page and

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

Below is the daily outflow in Cubic Feet per Second (CFS) from Lake Berryessa in 2010. The maximum summer daily outflow was 701 CFS or 1,400 Acre-Feet (AF) per day. Each foot of lake level drop at the 435' level is equal to 18,000 AF. This equates to a 1' drop every 12 days during summer.

It took about four times longer then normal, but we finally reached the first barbed wire fence and then trolled slowly to the second one with no success.

I told them we should change to brass and glass and use senco worms and our luck changed. John's first fish spit out the bait just as it got within reach of the boat, but we were so excited to finally hit fish that he didn't feel that bad. His line was old and he lost a few setups because it snapped. My recommendation is to put new line on at the beginning of the season so you won't be disappointed when you hit that big one.

John changed to a weightless senco with a wide gap hook and landed a nice size bass that weighed almost three pounds (see photo). Next fish was caught by Albert using almost the same

It was a rough day because of the whitecaps. I feel that if the water would have been calmer we would have had a limit for everyone. The fish were there, it was just hard to keep the boat in place for any period of time. The water temperature was ideal from 61 to 65 degrees so the only factor working against us all day was the wind. 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

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An interview with aquatic biologist Ken Davis by Laurie Banks

It was easy to find aquatic biologist Ken Davis. He was standing on a launch ramp at Lake Berryessa. His bright yellow shirt with black writing made him look like a giant bumble bee. He was throwing a five-foot net into the water and slowly drawing it back. It looked like he was trying to catch minnows, but the writing on the back on his shirt "Zebra Mussel Survey" told the real story.

#### Banks: You seem to be trying to net fish, but I'm guessing you're looking for mussels.

Davis: I'm actually catching samples of plankton. That's algae and other microorganisms that live in the lake. By looking at it under a special microscope I can see if there are microscopic mussel larvae called "veligers."

#### Banks: What problems do mussels cause?

Davis: Because they have no natural predators in North American waters they can grow prolifically. Water agencies are concerned because they can plug and damage equipment such as pipes, pumps and trash racks. Boat owners need to be concerned because mussels clog cooling systems causing motors damage. Mussels also cause problems for the fish because they filter water and eat the all the plankton. This upsets the base of the food web. Plankton is the food for small fish. If they can't survive, the big fish won't either.

#### Banks: Why are these mussels in some lakes and not others?


Davis: To survive mussels require a significant amount of calcium to produce the shells, copious amounts of plankton to eat, the right temperature range and a high pH. Lake Berryessa has the conditions that could support a significant infestation.

#### Banks: Do you think they are in Lake Berryessa?

Davis: No, I think I would have found evidence. For example, the low water conditions prior to this year allowed me to inspect much of the existing structure in the lake including the docks at the old marina before they were removed. They would have mussels on them if we had an infestation prior to 2007. The majority of my collection efforts are concentrated at launch ramps and docks where I've been getting plankton samples for the last three years. This also allows me to talk about mussels with boaters, anglers and marina staff. I'm amazed at how many people read my shirt and stop to ask questions about the mussels. That's a big part of the education program.

#### Banks: Who else is involved in this program with you?

I work closely with the Bureau o Reclamation staff and regional biolo gists. The Solano County Water Agency funds my program. Later this month, I'll be training new Bureau o Reclamation rangers, volunteers, and marina staff. I'll also be working with the bilge mat volunteers in May.



Davis: Boat owners need to be sure to thoroughly clean their boats. Information about cleaning boats is on my website www. creekman.com. Anglers should clean off mud and aquatic plants from their boots and equipment then sun dry everything that's wet. All of the aquatic invaders including mussels, mudsnails and didymo ("rock snot" algae) have a microscopic phase in their life cycle. Just because you can't see them doesn't mean they aren't there. Remember what mussels look like and report anything you find that's unusual to Fish and Game. With everyone's help, hopefully we can keep these invasive mussels out of this beautiful lake.

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#### Berryessa Fishing Memories Never Die!

Every kid should have a chance to go fishing with their dad or mom. When they are successful they will remember the first time forever.

I grew up on a river farm. The French Broad river. It runs out of the Fontana dam in North Carolina down through DouglasDam that adjoins are land to the Tennessee river above Knoxville Tennessee. We had no purchased fishing poles, only cane poles, long lines with fifty hooks and nets. I sold fish for fifteen cents per pound to workers who worked building the dam.

WWII, discharged at Treasure Island in 1946. I chose not to be a farmer. Worked for the Navy in Guam and Alameda for my first jobs. I inquired about places to fish. I tried Moss Landing, Timber Cove, Fort Ross, mountain streams. Then someone told me about catfish and black bass in Putah Creek at Big Rock above where the Lake Berryessa dam is now located. I camped there at Mr. Martin's for a dollar each night with my family and took my small boy fishing for his first time. I had no pole for him so I made a throw line with sinker and hook and night crawler for bait. His first fish was a great fish - I still haven't caught a bass that large yet.

After the dam was built I started fishing the docks, the north side of the lake for bass, trolling for at Spanish Flat. trout and catfish in flat areas along the north shore. I have owned several boats here over the years; however, the boat that I loved and used for the last few years I can't get into any more. It's an old 16 foot aluminum boat that I built in a wooden floor so he came back later he asked for a sinker and min-I wouldn't fall in.

I purchased it for \$100 from Marty of Berryessa Boat and Jet Ski Rental who's now at Markey Cove. Two old 40-horse Johnson rental motors were giftsfrom the guys at Spanish Flat Marina. I used these old motors and boat for several years with my bimba and a memory he will never forget. I still have never top and 2 umbrellas.

The Spanish Flat Marina guys had a board with

caught over the years. They called it George's board. I used the board to make a memorial for the wife of one of my fishing buddies who passed on.

One fishing trip I will never forget was at Timber cove near Fort Ross, the Old Russian Fort. I took my oldest son and a friend of his fishing in a thirteen-man navy surplus rubber raft using oars! The man who operated the business put the boats out beyond the waves with a lift. We were fishing for ling cod, and I had a plastic tub to protect the rubber raft from being punctured from the fish spines. But unfortunately I didn't think about other ways to puncture a hole in the boat. The neighbor In 1943 I was drafted on my 18 the birthday for boy hooked a star fish and couldn't get it off of his hook so he laid the star fish in the gunnels and POW he hit it with the sharp gaff. You guessed it - no emergency patches available! He panicked about what to do. I told him to put his finger in the hole and I rowed in as fast as I could. We were lucky the lure. I suggested an area in front of a patio boat. raft had three compartments.

> I think Lake Berryessa is the best fishing in the world for families with kids. All you need to do is learn each day where the fish are, look for the shad minnows. Learn what time the fish feed - at night when the moon is bright. How deep they are. When using a boat, what speed to troll. Fish around brush in the water if you can find some, make a habitat if you can. I fished on the docks where I kept my boat

> Several years ago I was fishing on that dock and Fish and Game planted trophy trout in the lake. Some got to 6 to 8 pounds. A little boy came down to ask me if I had a hook. I gave him one and when now. I gave him a sinker and I picked the largest minnow I could find. I thought that will keep him busy. In about 20 minutes came a scream, "Mister do you have a net?" He had the largest trout I ever seen in this lake. His father took him for a picture caught one that big.

Another time I was visiting with the guys at the pictures of all types of fish that my fishing buddies marina gas dock and they were throwing dead min-

nows to the large bass, carp and Sacramento pike under the dock. A lady came down with her son and saw the big fish and said, "I wish my son could catch one of those." I got a pole out of the store, put a piece of bread on it and handed the pole to the small boy and told him where to drop then bait.

Pow, a very large Sacramento pike grabbed that bread and jumped about 4 feet into the air and Mike Keen had the net and caught that fish in the net, in the air! That was one excited young man who went home with a picture and unforgettable memories.

My son Jon grew up here at Lake Benyessa and we did lots of fishing together before he went away to college. One trip and picture we will always remember. We were fishing for crappie on the gas dock at Berryessa Marina and using pink crappie jigs. He wasn't doing too well and came over where I was fishing to ask me where he should throw his About 10 minutes later he yelled, "Bring the net."

I took the net and looked in the water and


thought I saw a large carp so I let him have some fun and play the fish. Finally, when he tired the fish out we were both surprised he had such a large bass on a crappie jig. We took the fish up to the store and the owner, Dave, took a picture of Jon holding the fish and crappie jig and displayed the picture over the store door for years.

When the Bureau closed the Berryessa

Marina Dave gave Jon the picture. It hangs on my wall - Jon has a memory forever.

Jon and I joined some wonderful fishing derbies with the employees at Spanish Flat Resort - mostly for catfish. We are hoping to have another fishing derby this summer with folks who moved away.

But when you are fishing at Lake Berryessa, be careful of hanging your fish in the water. The creek otters have stolen my fish many times - even while I was fishing. One timeat Rancho Monticello I pulled my stringer of crappie up with an otter holding on to a fish until he finally got it. Mike Keen and I took some pictures at Spanish Flat of these animals. They were in the creek when the dam was built. I worked ten summers at the Bureau of Reclamation and volunteered five winters since I retired. Each summer I joined the group of employees and local people to support the kids fishing day. This summer if you can find the time - do that...If you are a fisherman - support them. Give them a

far, far away, there were seven resorts at Lake Berryessa. Each resort was essentially a mom & pop-type small family business. As with all small businesses, some were managed better than

of the seven resorts was \$12.5 M per year with Putah Creek and Marklev Cove at the low end of \$1M per year and Rancho Monticello (due to its 500 mobile homes) at a high of \$3.4M. That's not bad for a small company but not a lot of money by big business standards.

The Bureau of Reclamation only got a 3% franchise fee from the concessions - about \$375,000

The reason that the resorts were modestly profitable was due to the mobile home owners who were paying month rent. This rental revenue amounted to 30-40% of the gross revenue of some of the resorts. And this revenue had no cost of sales - it was almost pure profit!

The resorts profited from the mobile homes, who paid rent all year round, rain or shine, and helped subsidize the facilities for the day users. That was why mobile homes were encouraged at the resorts decades ago when the original concession owners realized they could not run a profitble enterprise without them.

A vibrant family recreational culture developed based on this balance of long-term and shortterm use. Unfortunately the government decided that American

use federal land on a long-term basis (now no more than 14 consecutive days in a one-month period) for personal benefit unless you are a major corporation, that is - of course.

The result is that there is only The combined gross revenue one of the original seven resorts left, still a small family business -Markley Cove - owned by John and Linda Frazier.

But for now readers should understand that Markley Cove Resort IS STILL Markley Cove Resort! Markley Cove Resort IS OPEN - it was never closed. Markley Cove IS NOT Mahogany Bay. Markley Cove IS NOT a Pensus Resort. It is the last of its generation.

Pleasure Cove Marina. owned by Forever Resorts, is also in operation with a full range of services. Markley Cove and Pleasure Cove are also the only two resorts to provide gasoline at the lake.

After several years with most resorts closed, 2011 will see all seven resorts open for business (sort of). The Pensus Group is making slow progress in redeveloping the resorts and acquiring permits to rebuild infrastructure.

Markely Cove and Pleasure Cove have cabins, convenience stores, boat rentals and other services, but the Pensus resort are for the most part campsites and sewer service.

But Pensus promises to ramp up their development during the next few years, addding camp-

A long time ago, in a galaxy citizens should not be allowed to sites, RV sites, cottages, restaurants, hotels, spa, conference center and other amenities.

> Their plans are quite striking, but they will have to reach out to the Bay Area and Sacramento to rebuild and dramatically increase their customer base. And create partnerships with Napa Valley resorts and wineries. A few billboards have already popped up, but it will take considerable effort to bring visitors back in the numbers needed to be profitable without the revenue from the original

As of Memorial Day weekend, Chaparral Cove Resort (Putah Creek) and Lupine Shores Resort (Steele Park) are open with boat launching, tent & RV camping, boat & RV dry storage with launch & retrieval service available, and new concrete picnic tables and BBO/fire rings. (See photo at right and on Pg. 3.)

Foothill Pines Resort (Spanish Flat) is open for RV and tent camping but has no launch ramp. Blue Oaks (Berryessa Marina) and Manzanita Canyon (Rancho Monticello) are open for group camping of 50 or more on a reservation basis.

Free public facilities at Oak Shores and Smittle Creek Day Use Parks are open. They offer nice hiking opportunities and more than 100 picnic sites equipped with BBO grills. Two hand launches for non-motorized RV sites with no electricity or car-top boats are also available at Oak Shores.

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

#### The Hummingbirds Are Back! Did you ever wonder what one tastes like?

Human beings have evolved as omnivores and have learned to eat almost everything, including insects and other creepy-crawlies. I've eaten some odd things while traveling internationally. But I couldn't find any hummingbird recipes on the internets. Hummingbirds may be too full of sugar to be safe for human consumption!

Actually, I've been feeding hummingbirds for years, as many of you have. With two feeders I've had more than a dozen flitting around me at one time. Watching them brings home how tough and mean they can be. Though we tend to think of hummingbirds as cute, dainty little things, in reality they make bold and fierce competitors. They don't let their guard down for a moment while defending their territories.

I've often had a single hummingbird take possession of one feeder and fight every other hummingbird off for relatively long periods making that little chit-chit war cry while zooming around like a tiny fighter jet. They fly so close I'm worried one will hit me and stick like a dart!

Although I brought my feeders in for the winter when I saw no more hummers on my deck for several weeks back in November, I was amazed to see a couple buzzing around the feeder holders during a rainstorm in March. They seemed as if they knew what they were looking for – probably a couple of my old friends who had migrated to and from Mexico during the winter. There's not a lot of data to work with, but most experts think the average lifespan of a hummer is 3 or 4 years.

When I first started feeding hummingbirds I bought that hummingbird "food" at the store because I thought it had some additional nutrition. Read the label – it's pure sugar only. So I now use granulated sugar. White granulated sugar is the best sweetener to use in hummingbird feeders. A ratio of 1 cup sugar to 4 cups water is a common recipe. Boiling and then cooling this mixture before use has been recommended to help deter the growth of bacteria and yeasts.

As lazy as I am, I don't do that. My feeders are drained every day or so during the summer without the time for anything to grow in them. I spend so much time refilling the feeders that sometimes feel like an overworked cook at a kids summer camp.

I wrongly thought that flower nectar might provide the missing nutrients my bird feeder did not. I always wondered what else they ate. It turns out that hummingbirds need to eat bugs for protein. Nectar is a poor source of nutrients, so hummingbirds meet their needs for protein, amino acids, vitamins, and minerals by preying on insects and spiders. They are great little hunters and are very resourceful. They have even been known to steal little bugs out of a spider's web, eat the spider, and then steal the web to build their

With the exception of insects, hummingbirds while in flight have the highest metabolism of all animals, a necessity in order to support the rapid beating of their wings. They consume more than their own weight in nectar each day, and to do so they must visit hundreds of flowers daily. Hummingbirds are continuously hours away from starving to death, and are able to store just enough energy to survive overnight.

My flock seems to live in a couple of big oaks around my house. I can watch them fly back and forth and sit on the branches. Hummingbird feeders make it a lot easier for the birds to get the energy to survive while they hunt the other food they need to thrive. And they make my deck a fun place to sit and observe them in

#### Budge Brown, Dale Brown, Cleavage Creek Winery, Airplanes, and Jet Ski Racing: A Non-Traditional Eulogy

I never met Budge Brown. I almost met Budge Brown – three times. I was invited to a public relations event several months ago at the newly opened tasting room at Cleavage Creek Winery in Pope Valley. Several weeks later I was invited to a "locals" night event at the winery. Unfortunately I was obsessed with skiing at the time and missed both events. I had scored my first senior (65+) season pass good at Northstar and Heavenly. I ended up skiing 22 times this season. I became part of a subculture of "mature skiers". I skied with "seniors" and "super seniors" – 65, 70, 75, and even 80 years old!

The reason I mention this is that Budge Brown was a "super senior" in more ways than one. At 78 he never slowed down. Everyone I talked to in Pope Valley or around Lake Berryessa who had met him had only the best things to say about him. By all reports in the media surrounding this tragedy, he was an exceptional person.

I never met Budge Brown. But I had some strange connections to him. Interesting how coincidences, some sad, seem to occur every now and then.

Cleavage Creek Winery had just become a new advertiser in the Lake Berryessa News. When I had visited beautiful Cleavage Creek a few weeks ago to meet with Jean Varner, Director of Winery Operations, she said that Budge was around the winery somewhere, but again I didn't get a chance to meet him. Another missed opportunity.

Last week I read Dale Brown's latest thriller, which has many fascinating details about Civil Air Patrol activities in Nevada, including how they perform search and rescue operations. In the acknowledgments I saw the name Brad Spires, who was listed as Dale Brown's CAP mentor in becoming mission-pilot qualified in Minden, Nevada.

Brad is an old jet ski racing friend, as well as a Squadron Commander in the Civil Air Patrol. Brad's son, Blaine, and my son, Evan, had been jet ski racers together. I called Brad last Wednesday to congratulate him on appearing in a famous writer's novel and catch up. The next day I read about the tragedy of Budge Brown's plane going down after leaving the Minden airport for Tracy. It seems he took off at 3:30 PM - just before I called Brad Spires at 5 PM.

From news reports of the search I learned that Budge was the founder of the Manteca Water Park, Coincidentally, Evan had visited that water park when he was a jet ski racing promoter as a possible jet ski racing venue.

Reports mentioned that the Civil Air Patrol was taking the lead in search and rescue so I emailed Brad who told me that the California Wing was running the search.

A story appeared later that day about Budge and Brad in which Brad describes Budge as one of his closest friends. He credited Brown with renewing his interest in flying in

"If you were a friend of Budge, there is nothing he would not do for you. He is just really a good man. He was finishing the winery at Cleavage Creek. The grand opening was two months ago. It was kind of the pinnacle of what he's been working on," Spires said.

Budge had the will and stamina to jump through the Napa County bureaucratic hoops to get Cleavage Creek Winery built. He was dedicated to making exceptional wines and to fighting breast cancer. The Cleavage Creek butterfly is a symbol of hope and metamorphosis. It represents the transformation made when those with breast cancer survive their struggles and go on to lead healthy lives.

"He's a very caring family man who had a small circle of very close friends. It's very special. If Budge shook your hand and looked you in the eye, that was the end of the discussion," Spires said.

I also just learned that my friends, Jim Fresquez and Susan Meyer, owners of Rustridge Ranch and Winery were also close friends of Budge for years. Jim had actually flown with Budge and landed in Minden with him in bad weather! Jim and Susan attest to his excellence as a person, as well as a pilot. Pilots who knew him suspect he had a medical emegency since none of them question his skill as a pilot nor the quality of his aircraft.

Budge's son, Jeff, knows his father died doing something he loved. "He was happy up there. He loved that little airplane, it was challenging, it was fast, you had to be on top of your game and he flew it real well."

I never met Budge Brown. I almost met Budge Brown. I wish I had met Budge Brown. To me he is a classic "super senior" hero. We should all emulate his example and passion:

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#### Fishing with Sid



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

#### In & Up

Most of us have heard of the rule of thumb that Lake Berryessa rises 1foot for every 1 inch of rain. As with most rules of thumb, this is not accurate. Lake level rise depends on many variables like the actual lake level when it rains and how saturated is the ground.

It usually takes about 3 inches of rain on dry hills before there is any appreciable runoff into the lake. That's why the 3-week dry period in January slowed this year's rise and it took an inch or more to start the runoff again.

Also the lake is roughly like a Vshaped bowl, so the higher the level to start, the more rain it takes to make the lake rise even further.

A look at the actual data during the last few years shows that the average increase in 2009 was 3.4" rise per inch of rain. In 2010 the number was 7.5" rise per inch of rain. In 2011, that figure (seven day average) went from 3 inches rise per inch of rainfall in early February to 11 inches per inch in early March to a peak of 13 inches per inch during the wettest part of late March.

The lake did go up 61 feet in one year in 94-95, but that was due to an unusually wet season with two significant storms - a January flood event and a March flood event. The March storms produced a new record stage on the Salinas River near Spreckles and exceeded the 1986 peak on the Napa River by 0.3 feet.

#### Out & Down

During this 2011 unusually wet season, conspiracy theory rumors still circulated. One was that the lake would have risen faster if the Solano Irrigation District (SID) and the Solano County Water Agency (SCWA) were not letting out water so fast.

Several years ago some people claimed that the dam managers were letting out water faster than necessary because electricity prices were so high that they were trying to make a profit from the power generated by Lake Berryessa.

In reality, Lake Berryessa output is controlled by the water allocations established when the dam was built, as well as certain Bureau of Reclamation flow specifications. SID cannot exceed specific annual allocations and water is not simply flushed for power generation exclusively. Power is an added bonus as water is sent to consumers.

During February and March of 2011, the power plant was shut down completely for it's annual maintenance. There was zero power generation for that period. What can be a little misleading is that if someone looks over the edge of the dam they will typically see the very visible release spouting out through the outlet pipe which is not water passing through the powerhouse. > Winter (Oct 15 through mid March...depending on temperatures) is May to September it was 3.06 feet. the time for filling Lake Berryessa except for a base amount of release required to maintain stream flows and dam safety. The Bureau of Reclamation requires a minimum of 45 cubic feet per second (CFS) to be released through Monticello Dam at all times. This supports the Lower Putah Creek fishery and keeps Lake Solano "charged".

Let's start with some simple arithmetic. 1 Cubic Foot per Second equals 1.98 Acre-Feet per day. 1 AF of water equals 1 foot of water on 1 acre. The required minimum output of 45 CFS Berryessa has a surface level of about 19,500 acres when full. At the minimum output it would take 219 days for imately 52,173 AF (3.06' x 17,050). the lake to drop 1 foot when full.

The maximum outflow obviously occurs during the summer. (See chart on Pg. 11) The dam was originally built to supply irrigation water to Solano County. 46,000 AF were released during the winter. To put that in perspective, evaporation in 2010 total was 4.7 feet. From

A 3.06 foot decrease when the lake is nearly full equates to about 56,600 AF. As incredible as it may seem, more Lake Berryessa water is lost to evaporation during the summer than is actually released from the lake during the winter. Evaporation is measured in inches (see data on Pg. 11) using an actual evaporation pan, 48" in diameter 10" deep, located at Markley Cove.

Actual 2010 figures show the lake dropped from 423.55' on 5/1 to 413.38' on 9/30 - a 10.17' decrease

At the 423 foot level the lake has a surface area of about 17,050 AF so the equates to 89.1 AF per day. Lake 2010 loss was 173,399 AF (10.17' x 17.050 AF/foot). And evaporation accounted for an actual loss of approx-

> At 700 cfs (1,400 AF/day) summer outflow with a surface area of 17,050 AF at the 430 foot level the lake experiences a one-foot drop every 12 days – which matches observation.

> Once again remember that rumors ories about Lake Berryessa water are false. Numbers don't lie, but do take some thought to unravel.

#### California Boating Law Refresher

California law requires a person to be 16 years of age or older to legally operate a vessel powered by a motor of 15 horsepower ormore, including personal watercraft (PWCs).

Exceptions to this law are:

- Persons 12 to 15 years of age may operate a vessel powered by a motor of 15 horsepower or more, including personal watercraft, if they are supervised on board by a person at least 18 years of age.
- There is no age restriction for operating a sailboat under 30ft. long (with wind as the main source of propulsion) or a dinghyused between a moored vessel and shore or between two mooredvessels.

It is illegal to permit a person under the age of 16 to operate avessel powered by a motor of 15 horsepower or more, including personal watercraft, without onboard supervision by a person 18 years of age or older.

Students who pass the Boat California online course will be issued a boating safety education certificate approved by the California Department of Boating & Waterways.

#### Making an Appetizing Meal Out of Unappetizing Ingredients

Just because a menu item sounds a little odd doesn't mean it isn't delicious. Ask chef Chris Cosentino, co-owner of San Francisco's Incanto restaurant. He's famous for serving up every part of an animal—even the bits that might make you say ick. "It's about not being afraid of your food," Cosentino says.

With his favorite dish, Chris' Last Supper, he takes some unconventional ingredients—blood sausage, trotter stock, duck eggs—and makes you want to inhale them. Here's how it works.

Sanguinaccio (northern Italian blood sausage): Blood sausage scares some people—but it's delightful for those brave enough to eat it. In Cosentino's, the blood thickens a mixture of

pork heart, onions, buckwheat groats, and spices. The flavor is rich, nutty, and creamy—like chocolate, but savory. Plus, before it hits the plate, the sausage is seared in butter. Mmmm. Butter.

Pig trotter stock: Trotters—that's feet to you—are full of collagen, which adds richness and body. Before the stock goes into the dish, it's finished with more butter.

Duck eggs: Fried in more butter ("This is my deathbed meal. Why would I hold back?"), the eggs are cooked sunny-side up so the viscous yolk can mingle with the other liquids on the plate.

Oysters: They're poached in trotter stock and butter but not cooked all the way through, in order to preserve an alluring, creamy mouthfeel.

Buckwheat sprouts, chives, and chive flowers: A visual representation of ingredients inside the blood sausage, the flowers add a sense of whimsy and fun—and who's not charmed by flowers?

Crusty bread: Grilled multigrain bread adds a bit of familiarity to the plate and a crunchy contrast to the other ingredients.

"We are taking all your comments into consideration and doing our best to provide enjoyable camping experiences. I wanted to clear up some of the rumors surrounding The Bureau and Pensus's activities. The Pensus Group signed the Concession Contract on April 28 2010. We made a huge 3 week push to get some

of the sites open for RV and camping for Memorial Day Weekend 2010. For the past year Reclamation and Pensus have been continuing the clean up of

the sites, which is a massive undertaking given all the debris that was left. We are currently doing the Environmental Assessment which we have to do under Federal Law before we disturb anything. That means we cannot trench to lay infrastructure or disturb any dirt to build anything. So unfortunately we were very limited in the facilities we were able to provide for this year.

#### How much do you need?

How much fuel you need to carry depends on the design of yourboat and the intended use. In a sailing vessel, for instance, a 50 gallon tank of diesel feeding a 25 hp auxiliary engine cursing at 80% of top speed could propel a 33 foot sailboat 300 miles at 7 knots in calm weather. That same amount of fuel would take a twin engine 40 foot sport-fisher only about 33 miles at 40 knots. This boat would need 450 gallons to cover 300 miles at that speed.

Planing hulls need much more power than displacement hulls anduse more fuel per mile. However their ability to carry fuel is limited because their planing ability is affected by weight. Many naval architects build in as little tankage as possible taking into consideration the design of the boat, reasonable usage and the distance between refueling stops in and around its normal area of operation.

#### How much does it weigh?

Gasoline weighs about 6.1 pounds per gallon. Diesel weighs about 7.1 pounds per gallon. Both gasoline and diesel engines use about 0.6 pounds of fuel per horsepower per hour. On average, diesel fuel contains about 140,000 BTUs per gallon or 10 percent more energy than the same volume of gasoline.

#### Where does it go when it is consumed?

Your engine uses the fuel you purchase in several ways.

- 35 percent is given up to the atmosphere in heat
- 25 percent is given up in heat and vibration absorbed by surrounding water
- 10 percent is given up to overcome wave resistance
- 6 percent to overcome wave formation and prop wash against the hull
- 7 percent to overcome skin friction
- 2 percent is wasted in friction at the propeller shaft
- 1 percent to overcome air resistance

This leaves about 13-14 percent of the original energy to turn the propeller.

#### How much do gasoline anddiesel engines consume?

Diesel engines consume about 1 gallon per hour for every 18 hp used. You can estimate the number of gallons consumed per hour by multiplying horsepower used by 0.055. Note: An engine at cruising speed usually uses only about two-thirds of its maximum available horsepower. Most marine engines are designed to run continuously at between 60 and 75% of maximum speed. Diesels tend to be more toward the top of the range.

Gasoline four stroke inboard engines need about 1 gallon per hour for every 10 hp used. The number of gallons consumed per hour can be estimated by multiplying horsepower used by 0.100. (See note above) Outboards might use considerably more since two stroke motors seem to have a greater thirst than four stroke motors.

#### What about fuel economy?

Any attempt to force a displacement hull beyond its maximum theoretical hull speed brings exponentially higher fuel consumption for minimal gain in speed. On the other hand, slowing down a little almost always is rewarded by gains in economy, and thus range. This same principle applies to high-speed planing hulls as well, but only up to the point at which they start to come off plane. Once off plane they tend to lose efficiency.

#### How about fuel reserves?

Use the old rule of thumb: Use one-third of the fuel in your tank to get there, one-third to get back and save the last third as an emergency backup.

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#### Seeing Underwater at Lake Berryessa By Peter Kilkus

In the Spring of 2007 the Solano County Water Agency (SCWA) performed a survey of the underwater landscape of Lake Berryessa. They wanted to accurately determine the capacity of the lake using the latest technology. Siltation from a lake's shoreline is often a factor in lowering the total water-carrying capacity of reservoirs. SCWA wanted to investigate the sedimentation rate and establish a baseline as well as create accurate bathymetric maps.

The data used to make bathymetric maps today typically comes from an echosounder (sonar) mounted beneath or over the side of a boat, "pinging" a beam of sound downward at the lake bottom. The amount of time it takes for the sound or light to travel through the water, bounce off the lake bottom, and return to the sounder tells the equipment the depth at that location.

Of course, doing this from a moving boat requires a lot of calibration and measurement. The SCWA system used a motion reference unit, a gyrocompass, and attitude sensor for dynamic corrections for vessel movement. Deep water surveys can produce a large variation of sound velocity values due to thermal changes. Sound velocity casts were performed hourly to account for sound velocity changes through thermoclines.

A "cast" is the process of slowly lowering a sensor through the water until it reaches the bottom. Then it is hoisted back to the surface. As the instrument runs through the water column, the sensor obtains conductivity, temperature, and pressure data.

For you techies out there the list of survey equipment is fascinating:

-26 ft. Research Vessel Sounder with Multibeam Sonar (300 kHz Dual-Head, Vertical Accuracy 1cm) -17 ft. Survey Skiff with Singlebeam Sonar (200 kHz Single Head, Vertical Accuracy 1cm) -Real-Time Kinematic (RTK) GPS

-DMS Motion Reference Unit and SG Gyrocompass -Odom Sound Velocimeter

The Dual Head System has 125 beams per head with an across-track beam width of 1.5 deg. The system provides an approximately 200 degree swath coverage, or ten times depth. Maximum survey speed is 5 knots with sonar pings rate of 15 pings/sec.

The MultiBeam system was used for measurements in areas with depths greater than 10 ft. The SingleBeam system was used in shallow areas from 3 to 15 ft depths. MultiBeam and SingleBeam depth resolution was an amazing 1cm (0.4 in.) Each dual beam (set at 40 degrees) has 125 transducers and in ideal conditions provide a swath width that is 10 times the depth.


The Real-Time Kinematic (RTK) Global Positioning System survey data was used to merge the bathymetric data with the existing Napa County Digital Terrain Model (DTM) resulting in some astonishing visuals. Depth data is shown as color variations rather than contour lines.


A SCWA engineer said that you can see the old roads if you look closely at some of the images. I had hoped that the old Town of Monticello streets might stand out, or the Putah Creek Stone Bridge. Although there is a lot of detail visible, the images don't seem to show the old town.

You can download the high resolution images I've posted on the Lake Berryessa News web site and look for yourselves. The old Town of Monticello was just northeast of the Big Island on the east side of Putah Creek. A map of Monticello is included below so you can make your own comparisons.

The survey results confirmed that Lake Berryessa retains its full capacity – which is now more accurately known. Siltation has not been a factor in reducing the total volume of water behind Monticello Dam.

Untreated Lake Berryessa water generally meets primary and secondary public health drinking water standards. This means the water is clean and safe, which is a very good thing for all the lake visitors and permanent residents who rely on Lake Berryessa's clean water for drinking and household uses, as well as the people and ecosystems that rely on the Sacramento Delta, where the water eventually ends up.



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

#### Fire Season is Here!

The 2011 fire season startedy June 20 according to CalFire's Sonoma-Lake-Napa unit. Staffing will gradually increase at CalFire stations in the Sonoma-Lake-Napa unit. CalFire will assign an engine at each of its 20 fire stations in the three counties, as well as three bull-dozers, 11 fire crews, and one helicopter. Sonoma's Air Attack Base will also open for reloading air tankers.

On July 1, one air tactical plane and two air tankers will arrive at the Air Attack Base. The Sonoma-Lake-Napa Unit will enter into its peak staffing period July 4.

Sonoma-Lake-Napa Unit Chief Tim Streblow reminds everyone to use caution when mowing grass to maintain defensible space for fire protection. Residents should mow early in the day and avoid high temperatures and windy conditions. Each year, CalFire said, mowing equipment causes fires. Most are caused when a blade strikes a rock, casting a spark into the dry grass. For more information, visit fire.ca.gov.

#### Napa County Jobless Rate Drops in May

The unemployment rate in Napa County dipped to 8.7 percent in May, down from a revised 9.6 percent in April, and below the year-ago estimate of 9.0 percent, according to statistics released by the state's Employment Development Department. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 11.4 percent for California and 8.7 percent for the nation during the same period.

Overall, Napa County has the sixth lowest unemployment rate in the state, compared to 8th place in April. Marin County had the lowest jobless rate in the state at 7.4 percent, the report said.

Napa County farm jobs saw the biggest gain in one month, rising 41.5 percent or 1,700, followed by a 30 percent gain - or 300 jobs - in health care and social assistance. Leisure and hospitality jobs rose 4.4 percent over the past year, with accommodation and food services jobs rising 12.5 percent over one year. Federal government jobs fell 33.3 percent and city employment fell 11.1 percent over the past year.

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#### World in a Time Capsule: At Least Just a City By Peter Kilkus

I read a David Morrell thriller, Scavenger, some months ago, which had time capsule theme. I've been meaning to write an article about time capsules since then and was spurred into action by the discovery of a time capsule at the Napa Pubic Library. Coincidentally, the Napa Library is one of my favorite places and is where I originally checked out the Morrell book.

At the start of a library renovation project in May, 2011, county maintenance workers removing a bronze plaque on what originally had been an exterior wall discovered the 23-pound copper box behind it.

Among the long-hidden items pulled from the capsule were symbols of a smaller Napa: a phone book for a population of about 42,000, a pamphlet guide to local restaurants scarcely thicker than a church-service program, even a copy of that year's county farm report - Napa Valley wine grapes ranking only third in revenue, behind livestock and nuts!

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

# Lake Berryessa Heats Up for Summer!



The astronomical beginning of summer in the Northern Hemisphere is marked by the June solstice. This year that date was June 21, 2011 at 10:16 AM Pacific Daylight Time.

Coincidentally, that was also the first day that the Lake Berryessa water temperature jumped above 80 degrees where it now stays from the surface to about 10 feet down. It drops off dramatically after that to 60 degrees at 40 feet and 52 degrees at 70 feet. So don't dive too deep off your boat!

As you can see from the chart on Page 11, June 21 was also the first time the air temperature got to 100 degrees this year.

The moral of the story is that Lake Berryessa is warmer than Hawaii or Mexico, great for watersports and sun, plus you don't need an airplane to get here.

Of course, if you have a seaplane, Lake Berryessa is an official FAA Seaplane Base. You can land right in the middle of the lake and cruise to Big Island for a picnic.

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

Neighbors protecting neighbors - what a concept! But if you are a Berryessa Highlands resident, you have seen it in action all spring - cutting, chipping, and burning off dangerous fuel loads. This has been accomplished because of the work of the Berryessa Highlands Fire Safe Council: Susan Sedillo, Evan Kilkus, Jerry Rehmke, Jim Rubins, Wendy Walin, and

The Berryessa Highlands, consists of 649 parcels with 349 residences, and a population of 920. It is located on rolling to steep terrain on about 700 acres located near and above Lake Berryessa. The site is isolated from other residential areas and is more than five miles from the nearest fire station.



The Berryessa Highlands community has been involved in fire safety initiatives starting in 2009, primarily utilizing the Napa FireWise chipping program. In 2010, a group of Berryessa Highlands homeowners took the initiative to form a committee with the support of the Napa Communities Firewise Foundation (NCFF), CAL FIRE, and Napa County Fire. For the past four years, the resident homeowners

of Berryessa Highlands have benefitted from the curbside chipping program provided by the Napa working to remove brush, dead trees, and limbingup trees on their property, bring the waste to the curbside. Using the website or telephone, they schedule the chipper service.

Management Plan was developed in 2010 by a hired

defensible space consultant, who is Defensible Space, Inc.). The assessment and its recommendations have been embraced in the new CWPP. After reviewing the Vegetation Management Plan, the council created and prioritized a list of projects that will help make the comunity more defendable in a wildfire.

Utilizing \$12,000 in grant seed" money provided by NCFF, he council worked with CAL 🧗 FIRE in early 2011 to start and/or complete four of the higher prioriy projects. One goal was to complete high visibility projects, so nomeowners would see what needs to be done around their own homes. Immediately, homeowners began increasing their efforts to provide more defensible space around their homes.

The Berryessa Highlands community is unique because the lake around it does provide some protections from large scale wildfires to the East, North, and West of the community. The lake acts as defen-

sible space. At the same time, the shoreline, and the public that use the lake, create a predictable fire ignition area that is within ½ to 1 mile from homes.

For this reason, creating defensible space, and eliminating fire fuels in strategic areas, can have a significant impact on the ability of fire crews to do their job and save homes and lives in the event of a small or large wildfire. The goal of this work is to make our community safe under any fire situation.

For the last few weeks three members of the Communities Firewise Foundation (NCFF). People Council, Evan Kilkus, Susan Sedillo, and Jim Rubins, have donated many hours developing the new plan and writing an application for grant funding: The Berryessa Highlands 2012 Fire Safety Program. #### What is mediation?

Most people want love, peace and harmony in their lives. And yet, conflict is a natural part of life. Disagreements happen, even where there is love; but the disagreements often block or destroy the love. How can our conflicts and disagreements become vehicles to get back to the warmth, love and peace that we deeply long for?

How we approach and resolve conflict is the focus of mediation. In mediation conflict is seen as an opportunity for growth and change. Mediation is based on a world-view of equality and connection, instead of the usual attitude of right versus wrong, blame, judgment and control. Mediation seeks to resolve problems between people and to establish con nection, compassion and forgiveness between them. Many of our conflicts, the big ones and the small ones, can be resolved through mediation.

In the mediation process the people in conflict are assisted by the mediator to state their positions safely, to hear each other fully, and to come up with solutions that they can agree upon. Through skillful listening and com munication, mediation allows people to let go of anger and resentments, and gives them a chance to forgive and create a fresh, new relationship. Forgiveness is essential.

The mediator is trained to facilitate the mediation process. He or she does not take sides in any conflict. The mediator knows that everyone involved in a conflict holds a position that is understandable and has some value. So he or she tries to help the people to understand each other and to find solutions that they both can accept and live with.

This is very different from rulings from a court of law where the judge or jury pass judgment on the people in conflict. The mediator does not judge or decide on the solutions; the people in conflict are able to do this themselves with the help of the mediator.

Here are some situations where I have used mediation successfully:

The case of a landlord and a tenant, where there was a disagreement about the security deposit paid when tenant moved in. The owner believed that tenant did not deserve the deposit back because of the condition of the house, and the tenant believed that the landlord owed him the deposit.

The case of 2 neighbors, where one neighbor owned a dog that stayed outside most of the night barking, and it was disturbing another neighbor. So this neighbor wanted the dog either to be killed or given away.

The case of a single parent with a teenage son who wanted early emancipation from his mother, and she wouldn't grant this to him, so he was threatening to run away.

The case of a couple, where the husband was the only income earner in the household, and he wanted to make a budget to limit his wife's spending, but she refused the budget and wanted to spend for the household in her way.

In all these examples, if the people in conflict were to take it to court, most likely one of them would win and the other would lose, and the loser would be very unsatisfied. But through mediation, in each of these cases the people came up with an arrangement that satisfied everyone involved, so no one was the loser.

The process of mediation is not always easy. It seems easier to fight and argue than to really listen and find solutions. Sometimes it is necessary to have several mediation sessions in order to fully resolve a particular problem between people. However, mediation usually leaves people feeling more peaceful and content.



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
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#### NAPALACHIA by Bill Scholer



Bill Scholer's cartoon above makes a very important point. Large corporations, especially financial companies, are zombies not people. If our radical conservative Supreme Court says they are people, then they are the drug dealers, pimps, and thieves of modern society.

Due to the Supreme Court's wrong-headed Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission decision in 2010 that says corporations are "people", predatory corporations now get the advantage of 1 = 1 vote. But a corporate charter historically represents a privilege not a right - that is extended in return for the acceptance of corresponding obligations.

In his dissent, Justice John Paul Stevens argued that since companies are without feelings. consciences, or desires, they shouldn't benefit from laws that protect ordinary citizens. Nor did the Founding Fathers perceive them as such. The notion that corporations - a useful legal fiction created by government - should have the same rights as natural human beings would have

astounded Thomas Jefferson, James Madison and John Marshall. The theory of natural rights that animated the Declaration of Independence proclaimed that it is people and only people who are endowed with inalienable,

Corporations are merely tools. They are not natural persons with rights inherent in their existence. To rule that Congress cannot limit the rights of corporations that are invented by man and controlled by man - to endow those legal fictions with the same natural rights as living, human beings - is absurd. To claim the U.S. Constitution as the basis for that ruling is an out-

Respected financial commentator David Korten states, "The owners and managers of corporations have the full rights of any citizen - in their capacity as citizens - to participate in defining public goals and policies. However, corporations themselves, as non-human legal entities created to serve the public interest, have no place using their resources to influence the processes by which citizens define the public interest and set the rules of corporate conduct. Corporations are not people. They are alien to the ways of life and blind to the complex nonmaterial needs of human societies. They should be wholly barred from any form of political participation.."

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#### Country Living Alert: Poison Snake & Poison Plant Rattlesnakes

Mac & Cheryl Bean have a local blue jay to whom they hand-feed unsalted peanuts in the shell. A week ago he was squawking up a storm. Cheryl asked Mac to go see what was up with the noisy bird. When Mac was just about to step off their front porch the blue jay (they call him Puffy) came diving down in front of Mac's face flying toward the ground squawking really loud.

Mac looked down to see what Puffy was diving at and there was a large rattlesnake. If Puffy had not warned him, Mac would have stepped of the porch onto the snake which was going down their driveway! They were going to let the snake go on his way to the field behind their house, but it turned and headed into the planter that goes under their front porch. So unfortunately for it, the snake is dead and buried in a very deep grave. Needless to say Puffy is getting all the peanuts he wants for a job well done.

Though rattlesnakes are dangerous if provoked, they are generally not aggressive, and they also provide humans with a tremendous service - they eat rodents, other reptiles, and insects, and are in turn eaten by other predators.

The California Poison Control Center notes that rattlesnakes account for more than 800 bites each year with only one to two deaths. About 25 percent of the bites are "dry," meaning no venom was injected, but the bites still require medical treatment.

#### Do's and don'ts in snake country

Be aware that startled rattlesnakes may not rattle before striking defensively. There are several safety measures that can be taken to reduce the likelihood of startling a rattlesnake.

Never go barefoot or wear sandals when walking through wild areas. Wear hiking boots.

When hiking, stick to well-used trails and wear overthe-ankle boots and loose-fitting long pants.

Avoid tall grass, weeds and heavy underbrush where and then get to the doctor as quickly as possible. snakes may hide during the day.

Don't move planks, rocks or logs by hand - use a stick or crowbar until you can see under it. Do not step or put your hands where you cannot see, and avoid wandering around in the dark. Don't reach into holes in the ground, rocks or trees, woodpiles, abandoned buckets and tires.

Step ON logs and rocks, never over them, and be especially careful when climbing rocks or gathering firewood. Check out stumps or logs before sitting down, and shake hours. out sleeping bags before use.

Never grab "sticks" or "branches" while swimming in lakes and rivers. Rattlesnakes can swim.

Be careful when stepping over the doorstep as well. Snakes like to crawl along the edge of buildings where they are protected on one side.


When you hear a rattle, freeze until you identify where the sound is coming from; you don't want to accidentally step on it when trying to flee. Once you have spotted it, give it time to move away. If it doesn't, move slowly straight away from it; don't walk to one side or the other as that could be perceived as threatening.

Look behind you before you start to walk backwards you don't want to trip over a rock, or another snake. Rattlers cannot move fast enough to overtake a person who

wants to get out of its way. The only danger is that the person falls or trips in getting away, thus disturbing another snake, or falls towards the rattler rather than away.

Don't handle a dead or injured snake. Dead snakes may not really be dead. Muscle contractions can still cause wounds, even when handling the decapitated head.

Encouraging and protecting natural competitors like gopher snakes, kingsnakes and racers will reduce the rattlesnake population in the immediate area. And, kingsnakes actually kill and eat rattlesnakes.



#### What to do if bitten.

Though uncommon, rattlesnake bites do occur, so have a plan in place for responding to any situation. Carry a portable phone, hike with a companion who can assist in an emergency, and make sure that family or friends know where you are going and when you will be checking in.

The first thing to do if bitten is to stay calm. Generally, the most serious effect of a rattlesnake bite to an adult is local tissue damage which needs to be treated

Get to a doctor as soon as possible, but stay calm. Frenetic, high-speed driving places the victim at greater risk of an accident and increased heart rate. If the doctor is more than 30 minutes away, keep the bite below the heart,

Do not try to cut the bite wound open or suck out the poison. Wash the bite area gently with soap and water. Remove watches, rings, etc, which may constrict swelling. Immobilize the affected area

#### Dogs vs. Snakes

Most bites to dogs occur on the face or extremities. The swelling is often dramatic with up to 1/3 of the total blood circulation being lost into the tissues in a matter of

anisms leading to uncontrolled bleeding This kind of blood loss induces shock and finally death. Facial bites are often more lethal as the swelling may occlude the throat or impair ability to breathe.

Effects depend on the amount of venom injected. Approximately 20-25% of bites are "dry" meaning no venom has been injected, 30% of bites are mild meaning they cause local pain and swelling in the bite area and no systemic symptoms. 40% of bites are severe with approximately 5% actually being fatal.

#### **Poison Oak**

Obviously, a big problem with getting Poison Oak is identifying the plant. If you can't spot Poison Oak a mile away, your only recourse is to never touch any vegetation at all while on the trail or doing whatever you're doing.

You can recognize Poison Oak by its trademarked 3 leaf pattern. Unfortunately, there are other plants with triple leaf patterns too. You cannot depend on the color. In some areas, the leaves remain green the entire time they are on the stem. In other areas the leaves are red in the spring. Being a very common "shrub" in California, it must be watched for everywhere.

In the Spring, the leaves are light, bright green with whitish green flowers clustered on the stems. In the Summer, Poison Oak has yellow-green, pink, or reddish colors on some of the leaves, with small white or tan berries after the flowers of Spring. Certain times in late Summer/Early Fall and certain conditions can even cause leaves to become Yellow. The fruit becomes darker in the Fall and the leaves turn bright red or russet brown. In the Winter, the leaves and seeds fall, leaving stick or whip-like stems or climbing vines.

The Poison Oak rash is cause by a chemical called urushiol. This is present in poison oak leaves, branches, roots, everything. When you touch it, the oil is absorbed into the skin. This is a poisonous substance, and the rash is the result of your body's immune system fighting against

If an animal, such as your dog, gets in Poison Oak you can get it from petting the dog (the dog won't get the rash though). You can get it from your clothing or equipment that touches Poison Oak.

The rash doesn't appear until after the oil is absorbed into your skin. If you think you have exposed an area of skin to the oil you can the clean the area with rubbing alcohol, this may limit or even stop the oil from being absorbed. Once you get the rash, you can't spread it around by scratching. The oil that seeps from your wounded body isn't urushiol, its secreted by your body.

The reason most people think it will spread is because of secondary infection. You touch a poison oak plant, the oil is on your hands. You rub your face, it gets there. That is how the oil is spread. Now after a while, there isn't as much oil to spread around, so some parts get hit more heavily. What this means is, the rash appears soon in some spots, and takes a couple of days in other spots. This gives The toxin further disrupts normal blood clotting mechthe illusion that you've spread the rash by scratching.

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#### Climate zones in Napa County Lake Berryessa is "Lucky 7"

Ask gardeners in the Napa Valley what climate zone they live in and most will say that they are in Sunset Zone 14. They would be correct if they lived on the valley floor. Zone 14 is the smallest of four zones in Napa County, as determined by Sunset's "Western Garden Book." The other three are Zone 7, called "Foothill-Digger Pine"; Zone 14, "Coastal Warm"; Zone 15, "Coastal Cool"; and Zone 17, "Marine.". The margins of all climate zones are inexact. Each zone contains microclimates created by elevation, slope and exposure.

Zone 7 owes its Foothill-Digger Pine name to the abundance of California foothill pines in the area. The zone comprises the eastern part of the county and includes Pope Valley and Lake Berryessa. These areas have a later spring and earlier frosts than the rest of the county, creating a growing season that may be as much as a month shorter. Summers are hotter and dryer. This is a good area for late- or long-blooming fruit and nut trees. This zone also defines most of Lake County.

Although Sunset has identified four distinct zones, Napa County is considered to have a Mediterranean climate, with wet winters and dry summers. A major influence is the summer marine air which flows up and down,

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Napa used to be

from the ocean east to the Sacramento Valley.

Winter winds tend to flow up and down over and through the hills and the valleys; the summer winds flow across this terrain. The fog in the summer moves through the Russian River Gap toward Mount St. Helena, down Napa and Pope valleys. The summer fog from the Petaluma Gap and the Golden Gate cools the southern portion of Napa County and also appears along the western hilltops.

Rainfall varies by elevation. On the valley floor, it averages 20 inches; on Mount St. Helena, 50 inches. Annual chilling hours (the number of hours each year below 45 degrees F), which affect the type of fruit trees that can thrive in the area, vary from 700 to more than 1,600. That's partly why some species trees are difficult to grow on the valley floor but do well on the foothills. Some require more chilling hours than the valley

provides. Understanding the characteristics of your climate zone can improve your chances of choosing the right plant for the right place.

#### Fluorescent Bulb Recycling Expanded

fet Oxygen Mask

Napa County has announced the launch of a new program with PG&E that will help expand residential recycling locations for spent fluorescent lamps, as well as build awareness of the need to recycle fluorescent lamps. Building on the success of the City of Napa's Lighting Efficiency and Safe Stewardship ("LESS") fluorescent lamp collection program, Napa County residents can now more conveniently drop off their used fluorescent lamps at local businesses participating in the program.

Fluorescent lamps are today one of the most cost-effective methods available to decrease energy use and associated greenhouse gas ("GHG") emissions. At the end of their life, disposal of fluorescent lamps presents a challenge as they contain trace amounts of toxic mercury vapors that should not be returned to landfill. It is important to properly dispose of fluorescent lamps at a participating drop-off location in order to mitigate the environmental impact of the mercury necessary to make the lamps up to ten times more efficient than incandescent bulbs.

"Spent fluorescent lamps require special handling, but are safe to use and are 99.9% recyclable when disposed of properly," says Steven Lederer, Director of the Napa County Department of Environmental Management.

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#### Coast Guard Supports Napa Sheriff

The local Coast Guard Auxiliary units near Lake Berryessa, Napa and North Solano County Flotillas initiated contacts with the Napa County Sheriff's Department and with the Bureau of Reclamation to explore the establishment of Coast Guard Auxiliary presence at the lake. Both agencies indicated their willingness to accommodate the Auxiliary in both shore-based and on-the-water activities. The Lake Berryessa Recreational Boating Safety Task Force was established in 2008.

Mike Marseille is the Coast Guard Auxiliary's Operations Coordinator for the Lake Berryessa Boating Safety Task Force that works at the lake year round starting this year. He provided the Lake Berryessa News with the following information:

- 1. The USCG Auxiliary has entered into a cooperative safety agreement with Napa County Sheriff and Cal-Fire to provide safety patrol and medical response coverage on the Lake during holiday weekends and special events that are requested by either agency.
- 2. We are providing free vessel safety checks for any person that uses the lake if requested.
- 3. We will be providing dates for boater safety courses that will be open to the public and will submit those to you once they are finalized.
- 4. We can respond to help boater assist calls such as tows, out of gas, engine failures and so on. We will provide free towing to the closest safe launch ramp.
- 5. We always monitor marine band Ch

6. We have been requested by special event participants at the lake to review and assist with review of their safety plans and provide extra safety boats for their events

For example, the Coast Guard helps the Monticello Ski Club by staging near the club entrance at Skier's Cove to help educate boaters who violated the no wake zone near the ramp.

#### Serious Phone Outage: If Only **Stupidity Could Be Cured**

Some not-so-very-smart vandals used a boat to rip a phone cable from the lake near the public boat launch at Capel Cove.

About 190 customers in the Lake Berryessa area were affected. Although service was restored to many by the end of the weekend, Lupine Shores remained without telephone service as of July 16.

An AT&T technician came out to the lake after an alarm went off at 4:35 a.m. Thursday, authorities said. At the lake, the technician discovered a vault in the ground open and about 30 vards of cable cut up in 5-foot-long segments left by the bank. A boat, which may have been used to lift the cable out of the water was found sunk. Sheriff's deputies pulled the boat out of the lake but identification numbers had been

The suspects may have wanted the copper from the lines since the cable contained 600 copper lines in it.

Lake Berryessa Boat and Jet Ski Rental took extreme measures to minimize the impact of this major phone outage. With no land lines, only weak cell phone signals wound their way down Lake Berryessa canyons.

According to owner, Marty Rodden, he spent more than a thousand dollars in additional labor and overtime costs, including a cell phone booster and cell phone credit card machine, during the first two days of the outage to make sure he could accommodate his

#### **NBRID Bid Proposers Named**

The NBRID solicited proposals

from qualified firms experienced in the business of financing, designing, constructing, operating and maintaining water and wastewater treatment and conveyance facilities. The cost of these services would borne entirely by the proposer under a Design, Build, Finance, Operate, Maintain (DBFOM) mechanism and would not in any way be constructed or structured as debt incurred by or for NBRID.

NBRID will pay for services provided, as and when those services are delivered by the proposer on a monthly basis and will continue throughout a predetermined contract period.

Four companies have submitted bids which are being evaluated. Two members of the Transition Committee will sit on the interview panel.

#### **Napa Grand Jury Questions NBRID's Legality**

The report states that, "The confusing situation is the result of the fact that a succession of Napa County Boards of Supervisors acted as if they had formed a (board of directors) but did not need to hold an election."

Janice Killian, an attorney with the Napa County Counsel's Office who handles district affairs, said that the grand jury's concerns boil down to a misunderstanding of state law.

California Public Resources Code states that a board of supervisors is always the governing body of a resort improvement district, Killian said, noting that Napa's board has retained that authority by never forming a board made up of district residents.

The Grand Jury report is a good summary of the history of the NBRID (and LBRID). However, most of its recommendations are already being implemented. (See previous story above.)

It also makes the unhelpful recommendation that Board of Supervisors ceases meeting and acting in the name of the NBRID Board of Directors.

#### Camp Berryessa Agreement Signed

The Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District (RPOSD) will build and run a new environmental camp at Lake Berryessa under a new 25-year agreement with the Bureau of Reclamation.

Earlier in the spring, the district received \$1.5 million from the California Coastal Conservancy to pay for the development of the former Boy Scout campsite at the north end of the lake just past the Putah Creek Bridge. The project has also been awarded \$50,000 from the Mead Foundation.

John Woodbury, general manager of the RPOSD hopes Camp Berryessa may open by summer 2013.

Camp Berryessa, which is on federal land, will feature 30 tent cabins for a maximum of 120 people, a campfire, composting toilets, showers, a climbing wall and nature interpretive signs. Activities at the camp will include kayaking, canoeing, archery, and hik-

Woodbury explained that new soil will have to be brought in and settle for a year in order to build a septic tank system for the new showers and dining area. The Boy Scout camp closed in 2004 when the Bureau of Reclamation revoked their use permit.



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Redistricting Maps Realign Napa Supervisor's Districts

With legislative districts across the state being carved up according to recent census figures, Napa officials are set to embark on their own redistricting efforts. Boundaries must be redrawn every 10 years in order to keep population evenly spread across the county's five districts. After redistricting, population in each of the five supervisorial districts should be roughly 27,000 people.

Under the current lines, Keith Caldwell's 5th District - which includes the rapidly growing city of American Canyon - now has more than 34,600 people. Meanwhile, Diane Dillon represents only 24,000 people across her geographically-large 3rd District. Populations in the three remaining districts are between 24,800 and 26,000 people.

Major changes are proposed along Lake Berryessa's southern shore, where residents of the Berryessa Highlands community may be swapped from Dillon's 3rd District to Supervisor Bill Dodd's District 4.

The adjustments at Berryessa were made mainly to keep Highland residents - who live within the boundaries of the Napa Valley Unified School District - in the same supervisorial district as other school district residents.

One consequence of the change would be that the NBRID (Berryessa Highlands) would become part of Dodd's district rather than Dillon's. But the LBRID (Berryessa Estates) would remain with Dillon. Another possible positive result would be that Lake Berryesss would have two supervisor directly involved with the future of the lake. Previously all of Lake Berryessa was the responsibility of Supervisor Dillon.


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

Jacky Ickx, world famous Formula One race car driver and 6 time winner of the 24 Hours of Le Mans, had lunch at Cucina Italiana last Wednesday, July 13, and then headed out onto Lake Berryessa with his family at Marty's Berryessa Boat and Jet Ski Rentals. He drove many years for Ferrari so he had something Italian in common with Chef Stefano Gusberti. Per Jacky, "In this sport luck and tragedy are only a few hundredths of seconds apart from each other. The fact that I am still alive after 100,000 laps is my championship."



"We have a 'zero tolerance' policy regarding any individual who is overly disruptive, aggressive, abusive, threatening or violent. Such individuals, when identified, will be escorted from the premises and refused access to the Concessions in the future. We will, under no circumstances, risk personal injury to our clientele, employees or police authorities by allowing clearly violent and aggressive individuals repeated access.

Pensus has received very few complaints regarding noise or disturbance at the Concessions. We did have one very aggressive and abusive individual, over the July 4th weekend. Only two calls were made by Pensus to the Sheriff requesting support. Pensus works closely with the Napa County Sheriffs and is most appreciative of their support, which has been exemplary. John Robertson, Undersheriff, and I have communicated personally and we will stay in close

low number of Sheriffs calls over the July 4th weekend. According to a member of the Pope Valley Volunteer Fire Department, which takes care of most of the west side of the lake (along with the Cal-Fire units from Spanish Flat), this was the first time in memory that they didn't have a single call during the weekend of the 4th. "It was wonderful to spend the weekend with my family."

Although the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) has been raised as an issue in the Lake Berryessa redevelopment process, it is not clear why this should be an impediment since Pensus is simply replacing the old facilities with new environmentallyfriendly construction. Any delay because of NEPA is even more puzzling since the demolition of the old resorts was accomplished with a minimum of environmental oversight.

as a Categorical Exclusion (CE) and stated publicly that they had evaluated the situation and produced Categorical Exclusion Checklist #743. They also stated that they had reviewed the environmental impacts of demolition of each site and that environmental impacts were minimal and mitigated by using Best Management Practices.

NEPA itself states that the EA is a concise docuboth water and sewer service. ment. It should not contain long descriptions or detailed data which the agency may have gathered. Rather, it should contain a brief discussion of the need for the proposal, alternatives to the proposal, the environmental impacts of the proposed action and alternatives, and a list of agencies and persons consulted. Agencies should make the Finding of No Significant

Impact (FONSI) and EA available for 30 days of public comment before taking action.

Unfortunately, the slow progress in this area is frustrating to many of the people involved, especially local business and residents, much less Pensus itself. The formal response from Reclamation to a question from the Lake Berryessa News does nothing to allay those concerns. This process should be fast-tracked by everyone involved, not allowed to linger into the spring of 2012. It is not an academic bureaucratic exercise – it affects real people.

Bureau of Reclamation response: "Pensus is in the process of formulating the Draft Environmental Assessment for development of recreation facilities and services within its six concession areas around Lake Berryessa as required by the National Environmental Policy Act, or NEPA. NEPA is a federal law that requires that potential impacts from federal actions and actions on federal land be examined prior to the initiation of that action. This environmental assessment for the planned development at Lake Mr. Ffinch's comments were supported by the Berryessa is considered "programmatic" because it will focus on the impacts of the overall development plan proposed by Pensus. Reclamation expects the Draft Environmental Assessment to be completed fall/winter 2011, at which point the public will be invited to submit comments. These comments are an important part of the NEPA process, and will be considered in the Final Environmental Assessment. Reclamation anticipates that the Environmental Assessment will be finalized in spring 2012."

The other major stumbling block for Pensus at Lupine Shores is the NBRID process. (See stories on Page 2.) Mr. Ffinch was emphatic in his response to this issue that Pensus fully supports becoming part of the Berryessa Highlands water and sewer system whether run as it has been, a Resort Improvement District, or as an independent Community Services District. One wrinkle in this approach was pointed out The Bureau of Reclamation used what is known by a County legal representative. Apparently according to law, a Resort Improvement District would provide both water and sewer services. However, if the NBRID became a Community Services District, Pensus would be required to hook up to sewer services, but would not be required to hook up to water service from the District. Mr. Ffinch made it clear that

> "Pensus has committed to Napa County that it will hook up to NBRID and to participate proportionately in any costs subject to a maximum cost limitation of \$4M and timing. We are working closely with and support the Berryessa Highlands residents.

There is nothing that Pensus can do at this point except wait for NBRID / Napa County to provide the

Regional Water Authority with the assurances they have demanded from NBRID that will allow removal of the moratorium against Lupine Shores connecting

At an April meeting a plan was developed to potentially remove the State's Cease and Desist Order (CDO) against the NBRID by showing that effluent volumes, which everyone knows is primarily impacted during winter by rainwater intrusion into old Berryessa Highlands sewer pipes, would be below the 50,000 gallon limit if the pipes were repaired. This would allow the CDO to be lifted and also allow a longer-time frame to make the major upgrades to the main sewer treatment plant.

The April meeting group identified several milestones and a funding mechanism. The Consulting Engineers would monitor the system through the remaining wet weather in 2011. Camera and video analysis would determine infiltration water origin and provide the results by summer. The CDO process requires a November 2011 report to the state. During summer of 2011, the identified areas of serious infiltration would be repaired. During the winter of 2012 the Consulting Engineer monitors and reports effluent flow volume which is hopefully less than the 50,000 gallon limit.

Unfortunately, it appears that this plan has not been completed as of July 2011. Whether it is a lack of money or technical issues is not clear. The Lake Berryessa News is awaiting a response from the

On a lighter note: Although Pensus published a brochure and funded electronic billboards around the Bay Area, they had not installed entrance signs at their resorts until recently. The original signs were spray painted on plywood sheets. The latest signs are small and can't be read from passing vehicles. It didn't do much for their professional reputation among locals as well as visitors.

The Lake Berryessa News Facebook page chimed in with photos and a bit of satire: "Five weeks after Pensus said they'd have signs up within two weeks, a new sign finally appeared at Lupine Shores next to their old spray-painted plywood sign. It seems they've transitioned from their old sign company, Ghettowerks, to Tiny Town Signs, Inc. From sublime Pensus was committed to join the proposed CSD for humor to breathtaking silliness. Hopefully real signs will be installed soon."

> David Ffinch took the hit with reasonably good grace, acknowledging some internal problems, but stating, "We finally have the permanent signs in hand as of Monday last. They will be installed within the next two weeks."

There were two people in the car. My initial response as a woman was to keep driving; vou never know who those people may be! But then my mind flashed on the faces that were in the car: an elderly man and a woman. My eyes glanced down at the temperature gauge in my car, and I pulled to the side of the road.

got out of her vehicle. She told me they had been waiting for several hours and the tow truck had not yet arrived. She had no reception on her cell phone and wasn't sure what to do. I asked her if she would like me to drive her a little way up the road to see if we could get a signal so she could make a call. She gladly accepted my offer, and we headed up the road.

had been on her way home from St. Helena Hospital where her mother had just undergone surgery to remove a cancerous tumor from her lung. Her mom had come through the surgery with flying colors. She was so relived to not have to worry about the outcome anymore. But her car broke down on her way home, and her 91 year old father had come from Lake County to wait with her.

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

Irrational Prevention vs. Irrational Reaction

It's been eight weeks since our first experience with Lake Berryessa boaters Memorial Day weekend and we have finally encountered our first aggressively impatient lake visitor. What sets this man above the rest of the small fraction of visitors known as the unfriendly crowd of boaters isn't necessarily that he pulled up yelling and screaming about having to talk to us but rather what he didn't want to talk about. This particular visitor wasn't irritated about being asked to answer a couple questions about water quality; he was inconvenienced by the mandatory invasive species questionnaire which is designed to prevent Quagga and Zebra Mussels from the lake.

The justification he used for resisting the inspection wasn't that he had visited infested waters, but just the opposite: he only visits Lake Berryessa. While having a make shift "fast track" system for locals would be ideal, limited resources has led to the current boat by boat mussel inspections. While a significant portion of boaters that come through Capell are returning visitors, there is also a large component of new visitors that do not call Berryessa their boat's home, all of which agree that waiting in line to launch and retrieve their boat can become quite a hassle.

Where the general consensus and this particular man differed in opinion though was whether waiting in line in order to prevent the spread of Quagga and Zebra Mussels was worth the trouble. In order to adequately analyze this predicament one first needs to weigh the costs and benefits of both options, do the inspection or not.

The costs of waiting in line are relatively simple; wait and miss some time out on the water. The benefits however tend to be a bit more elaborate. Being an invasive species, Quagga and Zebra Mussels out-compete native species, drastically altering the ecosystem in the process. The mussels also excrete acid onto the surfaces they attach to. Boats and water delivery infrastructure would seriously damaged if attacked by these mussels.

Since Lake Berryessa provides drinking water to approximately 500,000 people as well as serving as a key component to brewing Budweiser and Bud Light in Northern California, this is a risk that many feel isn't worth the extra half hour on the water that may be enjoyed by bypassing the inspection.

Next time you find yourself towards the tail end of what seems like the wait of a lifetime to launch your boat and mussel inspections are the cause, imagine what the introduction of this species would leave you doing in the future. Would you rather be boating on your home lake with ice cold Berryessa brewed beer or tiptoeing around razor sharp mussel shells on the closed lake shore with no reliable water source, fishing or extra tax dollars in the treasury? Most would be inclined to prefer the first option: a line to get into the water but water to use nonetheless.

Transition Committee members immediately held an election for officers and unanimously elected Stu Williams as Chair and Tracy Renee as Vice-Chair. The Transition Committee members then participated with the NBRID Board (Napa County Supervisors) in their regular meeting.

The rest of the meeting was dedicated to the discussion of the selection process and final decision for a firm to operate the NBRID water/sewer system and the Cease & Desist Order (CDO) against the District. Two Transition Committee members, Susan Sedillo and Randal Bryant, were members of the Interview Panel which had interviewed all four proposing companies (PERC Water, Corix Utilities, Summit Engineering and Aquagy Overaa) earlier.

The NBRID Board formally voted to begin negotiations with Summit Engineering immediately. The next meeting of the NBRID Board and the Transition Committee will be Tuesday, August 16, 2011.

## RWQCB vs NBRID: The Battle of the Capital Letters

Napa County staff met with representatives of the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) on July 13, 2011 to discuss progress in meeting the Administrative Civil Liability Order (ACLO) deadlines required under the standing Cease & Desist Order (CDO).

The RWQCB was informed about the progress of Larry Walker Associates fieldwork on the Berryessa Highlands system. RWQCB staff indicated that a monetary penalty related to the winter discharges is

The amount of the penalty can be reduced based upon District actions taken prior to and after the discharges to prevent further violations. Any progress in eliminating the Inflow & Infiltration (I&I) problems prior to the next winter wet season will also serve to reduce the penalty, although not on a dollar for dollar basis.

As of this writing, the sewer volume flows have been monitored, but the pipes have not been inspected using internal cameras. The Deputy District Engineer does not believe the Inflow and Infiltration (I&I) situation is the critical issue and stated that any evaluation and repair of Berryessa Highlands sewer pipes would probably not be completed by this winter.

Lupine Shores was also discussed at the meeting with RWQC. Pensus has proposed a "summer-only" hook-up to NBRID to allow them to operate during the primary recreational season, which is not affected by rain, and would thus not contribute to any potential storage pond overflows.

The RWQCB staff was not amenable to that proposal. Although the RWQCB does not have jurisdiction over provision of water service to Lupine Shores, the staff would want to see significant progress in addressing the treated wastewater disposal and storage issues and wet season monitoring prior to discussing a connection or disposal directly in the plant, whether seasonal or not. They did acknowledge that if wastewater was stored and then trucked off site they probably did not have jurisdiction.

November 1, 2011 is a big date for the NBRID. The following reports are required by the state:

- Interim Spill Prevention and Control Plan,
   Preliminary Revised Inflow/Infiltration
- (I&I) Assessment Report,
- 3. Preliminary Plan for Revised Wastewater Facilities,
- 4. Preliminary Financing Plan for Collection System & Wastewater Facilities.

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

#### Lake Berryessa's Loss is Yokosuka's Gain

Lake Berryessa News cartoonist, Bill Scholer, a longtime fixture on the local music scene in Davis, Winters, and Lake Berryessa, departed August 6 for Japan to be with his wife Karla who is teaching at the U.S. Naval base in Yokosuka south of Tokyo. They've had a long-distance high-tech relationship for the last year. Bill would Skype Karla on the weekends, when it was Saturday for him and Sunday for her over in Japan.

"I moved to Davis in 1981 to work at UC Davis as a graphics technician in the art department," Scholer recalled. He shared an office with Mike Henderson, a member of the art department who also performed as a blues musician with the likes of Jerry Garcia and Mike Bloomfield. Mike performed a couple of weeks ago with Bill at Cucina Italiana.

Henderson kept a guitar in the office, which Bill would sometimes play, and this led to gigs for Bill at the Blue Mango, a vegetarian restaurant and coffee shop in Davis.

"The Blue Mango hosted a lot of folk acts, and I started playing solo guitar there, and gradually I put a band together," Bill said. Eventually, he came up with my own brand of Davis blues that became the sound of the Bill Scholer Blues Band. His latest band "Waiting for Bruce" has a somewhat different sound. It is a collection of old friends who are musicians in Davis and a little bit outside the blues realm. The band also gives some exposure to the songwriting side of Bill's musical personality.

Bill's last gig in Davis last Thursday with Waiting for Bruce featured Scholer originals like "Cold Rain" and "The Knights of Labor" — the latter is based on one of the first American labor unions. He also played "Napalachia," which he said reflects his life in recent years.

"I've been living out by Lake Berryessa — we found some land that we put a home on," he said. "We're kind of like the hillbillies of Napa County, so I came up with the title 'Napalachia' as a kind of sideways reference to the rural beauty and traditional folk music of Appalachia."

We'll all miss Bill, especially those of us who were lucky enough to hear him play every Thursday night this summer at Cucina Italiana. Perhaps we should declare Lake Berryessa a sister city to Yokosuka. We could also Skype Bill And Karla from Cucina Italiana on Thursdays so Bill can continue to play for Thursday Music Night at Cucina?



#### **Pensus President Reaffirms Commitment to NBRID**

Pensus President, David Ffinch provided this statement to the Lake Berryessa News:

As you are aware, on July 30th at the invitation of Brenda Brown, my daughter Georgi and I attended a meeting of Berryessa Highlands residents and other interested parties. From Pensus' viewpoint the meeting went well. We responded to many questions and I believe we were able to allay a number of concerns.

Pensus confirmed that it would like to connect development elements of the Lupine Shores Resort to the Napa Berryessa Resort Improvement District (NBRID) sewage treatment plant.

Presently there is a 'Cease & Desist Order' by the California Regional Water Quality Control Board restricting new connections to NBRID due to non compliance with Waste Discharge Requirements. The total cost of bringing NBRID into compliance is estimated to be up to \$4 million and Pensus has agreed that the Lupine Shores Resort will bear its fair share of that burden.

Pensus also confirmed that it has, and will continue, a zero tolerance policy against those who disturb the peace. We are working closely with the Napa County Sheriff's office and we very much appreciate their responsiveness and support. We are committed to assuring a very safe and secure environment for visitors.

A frequently asked question is when new installations will be made. Pensus is working with all of the government agencies involved in the planning and approval process which is, of necessity, detailed and time-consuming. Installations are dependent upon all necessary agency approvals and it is too early to predict, with any degree of accuracy, when construction of major elements will take place. By early next year we hope to be able to provide some direction in this regard.

#### Capell Creek Bridge to be replaced in 2013 – Project Update!

Last December Caltrans released an Initial Study with Proposed Mitigated Negative Declaration (CEQA) for the Capell Creek Bridge Replacement Project, (Bridge No. 21-0009) in Napa County on Route 121 with a new single span bridge from post mile (PM) 20.2 to post mile 20.4. Construction work is currently scheduled to begin in Spring 2013 and would be completed by Spring 2015. The proposed construction and improvements will include roadwork that requires lane closures and one-way traffic control during construction period.

The existing bridge, built in 1907, consists of two spans made up of rubble masonry earth filled barrel arches. In 1959, the bridge was widened from 18 ft to 30 ft with reinforced concrete slab on reinforced concrete pier and abutments, all on spread footing. The two-lane bridge currently serves two-way traffic with 12-ft lanes and 3-ft shoulders. Because of the later alteration, it does not possess sufficient integrity (enough of its original design and materials) to be eligible for National Historical Register listing.

The project is now ready to roll since Caltrans just released a Mitigated Negative Declaration (CEQA) for this \$5M project which states:

The Department has prepared an Initial Study for this project, and following public review, has determined from this study that the proposed project would not have a significant effect on the environment for the following reasons:

The proposed project would have no effect on Cultural Resources, Geology and Soils, Noise and Vibration, Hydrology, Air Quality, and Utilities, Paleontological Resources, or Timberlands.

In addition, the proposed project would have no significant effect on Biological Resources, Land Use, Farmland, Water Quality, or Hazardous Materials.

The proposed project would have no significantly adverse effect on Visual Resources because the following mitigation measures would reduce potential effects to insignificance;

Mitigation techniques such as contour grading, slope rounding and revegetation/replariting shall be employed.

All exposed ground surfaces should be hydro-seeded with appropriate plant species for erosion control purposes to reduce the degree of visual contrast of these areas and naturally recolonize with herbaceous plants occurring on adjacent, undisturbed slopes.

Oak trees having a diameter at breast height in excess of 4 inches that are removed during construction should be replaced by the same species at a 3:1 ratio for upland native oak trees, 5:1 for riparian native oak trees, and 1:1 for other non-native trees. All other felled trees having a diameter at breast height greater than 4 inches should be replaced at a ratio of 1:1 Trees will be replaced onsite to the extent possible after the completion of roadway construction. Caltrans will seek offsite planting areas only if replacement onsite is not feasible.

The new bridge railings should have a finished pattern, surface texture, and coloration that mimic the stone pattern, color, and texture of the original railing.

The proposed project would have no significantly adverse effect on traffic during construction because the following mitigation measures would reduce potential effects to insignificance; briefly:

Caltrans will develop a Transportation Management Plan (TMP) in consultation with local officials regarding lane closures that may be required during bridge construction.

Caltrans Design will also work closely with local county officials and Caltrans TMP Manager to avoid bridge closure during the Napa County harvest season through implementation of one-way traffic control (including day times) that will be needed during construc-



#### **Berryessa Highlands Water Conservation Tips**

Ed and Cheryl Berg of Rimrock Road decided to do something about water conservation. Over the years they have always maintained one of the nicest front yards on Rimrock. Originally they used a non-conventional biomass method to aerate and fertilize their front lawn. This resulted in a lush green vista. However, over time the water crisis hit them hard



Here are some of the water conservation methods they've done, are doing, and yet to do:

-Recirculation pump on hot water line, with timer or remote switch. This recirculates the cold

water in the pipes back to the water heater until only hot water is ready to come out of your hot water tap. This method saves many gallons of water while taking showers or washing clothes.

- -Rock in your yards and use drought and deer tolerant plants. (Photo below)
- -Use timer and drip emitters on garden vegetables.
- -Replace leaking hose bibs.
- -Run bath water into buckets until hot and reuse to water with. (For homes without the re-circulating pump described above)
- -Put a brick in holding tank of toilets.
- -Compost your garden to enrich soil and save water.
- -Capture rainwater, keep it balanced and reuse in spring.
- -Wash full loads of laundry rather than small loads.
- -Use your neighbor's water when they're not home. (Just kidding!)

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
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#### Scuba Diving into Lake Berryessa History By Peter Kilkus

Most people know that the Town of Monticello is submerged beneath Lake Berryessa. They've also seen the photos of the old town and the famous Putah

Creek Bridge. An engineering marvel in its day, it was titled the "Oueen of the Stone Bridges". Constructed in 1896, it would become the largest stone bridge west of the Rocky Mountains. Few people living today have ever seen it or crossed over it.

It had 3 arches, each spanning 70 feet and extending down to bedrock. The bridge totaled 298 feet in length, and it rose 42 feet above the low water at the center of the span. The bridge stones were set into a cement mortar. The sandstone blocks used

withstood testing of 8,000 to 12,000 pounds per square inch. They used 675 barrels of cement, 380 barrels of lime, 55,000 feet of lumber for false work, as well as tons of iron. The arch stones were 3 feet 6 inches deep; 12 3/16 inches at the crown and 11 inches at the base. They used 2,600 loads of rock. Each load comprised 5 to 10 cubic yards of material. The total cost of the bridge was \$19,980.



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
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

#### **NBRID Process Update**

Subsequent to the article about the NBRID in the last issue, Napa County staff explained to the Lake Berryessa News that they are vigorously pursuing solutions to both the Inflow and Infiltration (I/I) problem as well as the winter effluent storage problem.

The NBRID wastewater system has a twofold problem. One is excessive I/I during wet weather. The other is that there is insufficient storage for treated effluent that cannot be legally discharged during winter wet weather

The only current means of effluent disposal is land application (i.e. spraying). By permit, spraying is not allowed prior to, during or shortly after rainfall events. Discharge of tailwater to the watershed is also not allowed.

Therefore, in a wet winter, there has to be sufficient storage available to retain all treated effluent and any rainwater entering the system. Short-term actions are focused on eliminating the I/I. The longer-term solutions to resolving the storage and disposal issues is anticipated to require property acquisition, CEQA/NEPA compliance, and coordination and approvals by several State and Federal agencies.

Following the selection of Summit Engineering at the August 2nd NBRID Board meeting as the contractor for operating, upgrading and maintaining the Berryessa Highlands water and sewer system, there was some dissatisfaction with the thoroughness of the process.

#### **Has Anyone Ever Actually** "Polluted" Lake Berryessa – NO!

The effluent is routinely tested for the presence of coliform bacteria. Almost all strains of e. coli are harmless to humans, but they are easy to detect by simple testing. So they are used as an indicator of water that might be contaminated by truly pathogenic

> The statement has often been made that "the effluent is better than what flows into the lake naturally". The results of coliform testing performed on the NBRID and LBRID effluent are always within standards and are usually "non-detect". This means the disinfection systems are working as they should. NBRID wastewater is disinfected secondary treatment water and the effluent water quality is completely innocuous.

> When tests are performed on untreated lake water, e.coli are detectable - the source being everything that lives in the watershed. However, testing shows that untreated Lake Berryessa water meets primary and secondary public health drinking water standards which means the water is clean and safe.

The only time the e.coli count rises in the lake is after the first major rainstorm when the first flush off the land reaches the lake. This is primarily due to the cattle that have been grazing around the lake. Even then the number detected is quite low and drops dramatically as the land surface water is diluted and flows out of the lake.

The spills from the holding ponds, which were mostly rainwater anyway, have NEVER caused measurable "pollution" of the lake.





Last year, fewer than 2,000 cases total were produced, and bottles are available only through the winery or at a few restaurants owned by family friends - the Buckhorn and Putah Creek Café in Winters and Cucina Italiana at Lake Berryessa.

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#### 8 Clean Water & Why It Matters

Bilgee is a giant bilge pad who is also known as "The Protector of Clean Waterways." He's the Lake Berryessa Watershed Partnership's mascot and visits Lake Berryessa during the summer to remind everyone that more than 500,000 people drink the water that comes from Lake Berryessa; and that the region's fish, wildlife & plants depend on clean water from the lake to survive.

Untreated Lake Berryessa water generally meets primary and secondary public health drinking water standards. This means the water is clean and safe, which is very good for all the lake visitors and permanent residents who rely on Lake Berryessa's clean water for drinking and household uses, as well as the people and ecosystems that rely on the Sacramento Delta, where the water eventually ends up.



#### The Travels of a Piece of Lake Berryessa Trash

A day out on the lake with family and friends often results in loads of laughs, sun, food and the disposing of a day's worth of trash. Unlike the day use areas and resorts, the lake itself does not have strategically placed recycling and trash bins meant to help keep the lake garbage free. Despite the minor inconvenience of keeping a designated trash bag on your boat, the lack of floating trash bins does not justify the practice of dumping garbage into the lake itself.

Some boaters are still unaware of the unintended consequences that littering on the water may cause. During a routine bilge pad installation, a recent visitor to the boat launch at Lupine Shores shared his hopefully unique experience of picking up piles of trash that were floating on the water throughout the day. Even more concerning than the fact that garbage had been dumped on the water was imagining what may have happened to the trash if this boater had left it out there.

Imagine a plastic bag that happened to avoid capture by good Samaritans during its journey to Monticello Dam. Being unaware of the concept of a watershed, this lucky plastic bag doesn't realize the voyage that it is has embarked on. Lake Berryessa's watershed extends far beyond its shores and past the dam. Assuming that an unlucky bird does not decide to eat the indigestible plastic for its next meal, or that it doesn't get caught up in riparian vegetation (plants along the creeks corridor) this single piece of plastic will make its way from the grocery store, to Lake Berryessa, through either Solano County to the end of Putah South Canal or find its way flowing in Putah Creek out to the Sacramento River. The eventual destination may just be the Pacific Ocean where the plastic will break into smaller and smaller pieces and remain forever.

Similar to an invasive Zebra Mussel, the seemingly immobile plastic bag can use people and boats to travel to and from Lake Berryessa just as you do. Please keep this scenario in mind the next time you see a plastic bag or any piece of trash. And, just maybe you will pick it up and stop its voyage before it begins.

Thanks to all the people who contacted the dive team with information and suggestions. I've talked to several people who actually walked across that bridge many times. It was to low and the water too shallow for anyone to dive from it into Putah

Local fisherman, Sam Boucher, sent in some topo maps with GPS coordinates for the Town of Monticello and the old Putah Creek stone bridge. He also sent in a photofof the Capell Creek Bridge near the launch ramp when it came out of the water during the big drought of 1990.

The Capell Creek Bridge (one of several with the same name) was located just east of the public ramp near the 5 mile an hour buoys. A short video of it is available on You Tube at:



#### California Department of Boating and Waterways 2007 – 2009 California Boater Survey Report

A survey of 5,735 boaters was administered throughout the State to determine boater attitudes, opinions, and knowledge. The survey is extremely detailed and is available at: www.coastal.ca.gov/ccbn/materialsforeducators.html. Some excerpts are published below.

More than half of the survey respondents (56 percent) were 50 years of age or older and about three quarters (77 percent) were 42 or older. Only 10 percent of boaters in the sample were age 33 or younger.

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



The report itself is not a thorough legal investigation as much as it is a narrative of recollections and comments of the participants in the process. The "bad guy" in all of it turns out to be a single unnamed individual attorney in the DOI's Office of the Solicitor (SOL).

The first bid process was complete. The Pleasure Cove contract had already been negotiated and signed. The Pensus contract had been negotiated and in review. The Markley Cove contract negotiations were ready to begin.

During review of Pensus' contract, SOL identified legal flaws that would supposedly put Reclamation at risk of violating the Antideficiency Act which prohibits the government from purchasing, or implying that they may purchase, assets for which funds have not yet been approved by Congress.

Reclamation had inadvertently used a clause from a National Park Service contract template that included this type of language. Since no one could predict the financial situation at the end of a 40-year contract, nor would anyone expect Congress to actually make an appropriation in 2010 for a 2050 expenditure, the contracts would previously just state something like "depending on funds being appropriated by Congress".

Apparently this was not acceptable Pleasure Cove Marina. to the SOL. Nor was it acceptable to simply remove the offending language by "red-lining" it and getting on with business. The Attorney-Advisor said that would be unfair to the losing bidders and that the only fair alternative was to re-do the whole bid process. As a result, SOL advised USBR to rescind

Aside from the shocking use of the word "fair" by the SOL to justify undoing years of effort, that "fairness" had actually not been applied during the original bid process.

There were six original bidders. The owners of Rancho Monticello and four partners had applied to run five of the seven resorts under the name Lago Resorts LLC. One of the partners, California Parks Co., a company that runs the concessions across California. would manage the resorts.

Rancho Monticello, Putah Creek, Berryessa Marina, Spanish Flat and Markley Cove. The plan, explained Bob White, included spending \$90 million to remodel, upgrade and build new facilities at the resorts while keeping cially. the resorts open.

The other applicants were: Recreation Del Sol Enterprises LLC, St. Helena, CA (Peter White – a previous owner/partner at Rancho Monticello); Pensus Group LLC with experience operating marinas in Arizona but not ground-based resorts; FX10 LLC (Linda Frazier bidding on her own Resort, Markley Cove); Steele Park Resort Inc., and Pleasure Cove Marina LLC, a subsidiary of Forever Resorts Inc, which has extensive resort management experience nationally and internationally, but only bid to operate

The fact that Forever Resorts only bid on Pleasure Cove, which had been given to them by Reclamation after it confiscated the resort from Steve Petty in 2005, was a disappointment to Reclamation. Clearly, Reclamation wanted a single company to take over the Lake Berryessa resorts - as docuthe June 2007 prospectus and all assomented in the bid prospectus. Reclamation had attempted, even in 2005, to lay the groundwork to justify giving Forever Resorts any of the other existing resorts, stating: "Due to the approaching expiration of the other six concession contracts at Lake Berryessa it is possible that any of the other concessionaires could have their contract terminated in advance because of financial and performance problems.

In the event this occurs and Reclamation determines it necessary to establish an interim concessionaire, in a similar manner as this contract, the Lago Resorts bid to operate Pleasure Cove concessionaire could be assigned that responsibility through an amendment to this contract."

But apparently Forever Resorts' experience at Lake Berryessa did not incline them to get in any deeper finan-

standing. In the interest of full disclosure, I wrote the ISO 14000 Environmental Management System for Rancho Monticello which was used in the Lago Resorts bid. I also wrote the Environmental Management Plan for the Steele Park bid and participated in writing one for the Markley Cove bid.

But a funny thing happened to the Lago bid on the way to the evaluation. It was rejected as non-responsive and tossed out. Arguably an outstanding bid backed by substantial investment resources and managed by people with decades of experience.

#### It was never evaluated!

Per the Whites, "The bid was declared non-responsive due to one sentence that did not make the U.S. government the first lien holder on personal property loans, i.e., cars, equipment, etc. We did request consideration and revisions, but were flatly rejected.

The terms of 2009 Bid Prospectus. and the fact that the Bureau of Reclamation had already forced the closure of Rancho Monticello and Spanish Flat, made it impossible for Lago Resorts to bid again.

What's more puzzling about the Lago rejection is that Reclamation allowed bidders to modify (clarify) their bids per a statement in both the 2007 and 2009 bids.

"An Offeror may not amend or supplement a proposal after the submission date unless requested by Reclamation to do so and unless Reclamation provides all Offerors that submit proposals a similar opportunity to amend or supplement their proposals."

This opportunity was presented to Pensus when they apparently violated a Franchise Fee requirement in the second bid process. In the first prospectus, The Lago Resorts bid was out- a bidder was allowed to bid a 0 percent franchise fee. The second prospectus clearly stated that each bid proposal must include a minimum 1 percent franchise fee.

> But Pensus did not propose a franchise fee in the second bid – probably inadvertently - which would have made their bid "non-responsive" – the same justification that Reclamation used to deny the original Lago Resorts bid. However, in this case Pensus was allowed to modify/clarify their bid.

> So "fairness" appears to have a hazy definition in government circles. From a pragmatic point of view, there was no one left among the original bidders to whom to be "fair". Lago had been eliminated. Steele Park and Spanish Flat had given up.

> Pleasure Cove/Forever Resorts had already signed a contract and threatened legal action if they were forced to re-bid. Reclamation backed down.

#### Obama Turns 50 Despite Republican Opposition

WASHINGTON—After months of heated negotiations and failed attempts to achieve any kind of consensus, President Obama turned 50 years old Thursday. drawing strong criticism from Republicans in Congress.

"With the host of problems this country is currently facing, the fact that our president is devoting time to the human process of aging is an affront to Americans everywhere," said Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, who advocated a provision to keep Obama 49 at least through the fall of 2013.

"To move forward unilaterally and simply begin the next year of his life without bipartisan support—is that any way to lead a country?"

According to White House officials, Obama attempted to work with Republicans right up until the Aug. 4 deadline, but was ultimately left with no choice except to turn a year older.

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#### If a tree falls in the woods...or across Steele Canyon Road... What do you do?

A 50 foot tall pine tree fell across and blocked Steele Canyon Road for less than thirty minutes Sunday afternoon, August 28. It caused a minor delay for drivers, but also showed a great collective get-involvedand-help effort from the community and visitors. Fortunately the tree did not hit any passing motorists, but within ten minutes there was already a line of twenty vehicles, and growing.

Initially, one of the drivers in line unloaded a small hand saw, which was very effective at removing the smaller limbs and getting them out of the way. Just as the group of neighbors and visitors finished removing all of the bulky and thin branches, a Berryessa Highlands resident arrived with a chainsaw. Within 10 more minutes, the spontaneous volunteers cut up and removed the entire tree, while safely guiding the line of lake-goers trying to get home on the lane that they had initially cleared.

CAL Fire was called about 10 minutes after the tree fell, but 15 minutes after that, the tree was already cleared from the road, and the first-on scene volunteer firefighter called them off.

And that's how it's done at Lake Berryessa!

The Inspector General's report shows that most of the local Reclamation officials did not really want to redo the bidding process. But there are pretzel-twisting rationalizations of why a winning bid award does not mean a contract. There are long sections of self-justification and hand-wringing, which makes for interesting reading, but then Reclamation did the totally unnecessary anyway - and forced a re-bid.

One interesting revelation is the mindset of BOR Area Manager Michael R. Finnegan. Finnegan did not participate in the June 2007 bid review or selection process. Finnegan believed that the review panel misinterpreted the evaluation criteria and selected the Fraziers as having the best proposal for the Markley Cove concession only because it misinterpreted the Record of Decision and failed to seek clarification.

Finnegan explained that the review panel had misinterpreted the "continuity of operations" provision in the Record of Decision to mean that there must be zero impact on the continuity of business operations at the Markley Cove concession during the new concession contractor's transition phase. Finnegan emphasized that if not for the panel's misinterpretation, Pensus would have been selected as having the best proposal for the Markley Cove concession.

A basic unanswered question which will probably remain unanswered is why - when the new prospectus was the same as the old prospectus - did Markley Cove lose the bid the second time? SOL did not investigate that nor will the primary documents be released - even under a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request. The Lake Beryessa Chamber of Commerce tried | Dive Center. the FOIA process and was rebuffed.

None of the principals in the report were willing to comment publicly since apparently some discussions are ongoing. It appears that much pain and suffering have been caused by a government agency out of touch with its impacts on the lives of real people and local communities. The report is another example of something that just didn't have to happen this way.

It's past history with overtones of current events. What will "future history" bring?

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#### Of Rodeos and Barbecues: How Memories of the Past Become "History"

I just read a fascinating book available at the Napa County Library: Roots of the Present: Napa Valley 1900 to 1950 by Lin Weber. It reads like a novel, but is an academically solid description of Napa County "History". I had heard about oil well drilling in the Berryessa Valley but had not known that there were actually two oil rushes out here - first in 1901and again in the early 1920's. Nor that Putah Creek was pronounced "Pewter" by the old-timers.

The following description of the Monticello Rodeo brings it back almost like a memory rather than history. Photos and video of the old rodeo are on display at Carol Fitzpatrick's Monticello History Exhibit at the Spanish Flat Village Center.


Monticello's main claim to fame in the 1930's was not its illusory oil fields nor its good, honest grain, but its annual rodeo and barbeque. It had been attracting thousands since 1926. An outgrowth of the little valley's annual springtime cattle round-up, it was one of the first in California to feature professional contestants. The Monticello Community Club hosted the event on the first Sunday of May for 15 years, and the program was always the same.

The night before the event, the barbecue committee built a bonfire of oak wood in a big pit next to the Monticello community hall. When the timbers became white-hot coals, the men and women of the committee sprinkled on a thin layer of loamy dirt and then dropped in some prime hindquarters of local-grown beef, which had been wrapped in many layers of cheesecloth. They covered the meat with more loam and then built a new fire over it all, which glowed all night. Meanwhile, they cooked up several huge kettles of pinto beans.

Late the next morning, the smell of roasting beef greeted the jam of cars that pulled into town from just about everywhere. Those who arrived early could play in a pick-up baseball game on the diamond next to the barbecue pit or just sit around and enjoy John Philip Sousa music provided by a live band, which performed all day. Early in the afternoon the barbecuers lifted the roasted beef from the pit with big hooks. An endless supply of beer was available, both during and after Prohibition, as was an endless supply of cake.

Then the rodeo began. There were saddle- and bare-back bronco riding, bull riding, calf roping and wild cow milking. There were races. There were clowns. There were courtships. Between the BlueRidge hills to the east and the chaparral of Cedar Roughs to the west, under the hazy May sky in a gentle, grassy valley, there was asweet, simple, down-home joy.

It was a different world when Barrel Builders was started in the early seventies. No desktop computers, no cell phones, no instant gratification. But that's when Robert Mondavi began importing barrels from France. Not being dummies, Skip Lane, Don Surplus and Keith Roberts (who later went on to found Mendocino Cooperage) decided that there was an opportunity here and left Mondavi to start Barrel Builders.

About that time, I was coming off a stint working as a backpacking instructor for a pilot project with the San Diego Juvenile Probation Department. Jerry Brown was governor back then and cut the funding when several purses were stolen at our first awards dinner where he happened to be a guest.

Newly jobless, I headed north for Alaska by way of the Napa Valley, where I happened on job at BB. I thought a short stint here would be fun, and also yield a grubstake. So it was in 1975, that I began building hot tubs, planters and ultimately, wine barrels. The photo on the right from Sunset Magazine has me pounding hoops as an apprentice cooper (I'm the one with the long hair). By then, my fate was sealed.

Fast forward, in 1986, several employees (myself among them, as I had by then lost interest in Alaska) bought the company from the owners. Five years later, I bought out my last partner, Henry Work (who is now a cooperage consultant in New Zealand).

Shaving barrels used to be a huge business. That same year we shaved over 6,000 barrels from New York to Israel and South America. Used barrels were virtually free.

A lot has changed in the industry since then, when only a handful of wineries spotted the Napa Valley and the old giants in the Central Valley still held sway. I'm looking at our 1978 price list: French oak barrels cost \$155. American oak - \$75. There were only about 10 cooperage suppliers here in the US.

Then the premium wine industry took off after the famous Paris Tasting put Napa on the map, and all hell broke loose. Back then, wineries were welcomed and the remaining orchards and ranches turned to grapes. Local governments all but gave permits away; tasting and ancillary events were expected and the growth was expo-

nential. Heady times in the wine business; you almost couldn't NOT make money.

Charles Krug's ads mirrored much of the Valley sentiment with their "CK is OK" branding. Everyone seemed to help each other. Of course, this was before Jess Jackson sued Jed Steele for taking his winemaking secrets with him and the rise of corporate winemaking began. Walla Walla? Central Coast? Texas? Temecula? I recently returned from visiting clients in Maine where there is a "Wine Trail" with over a dozen wineries and some beautiful facilities. In Maine!

Nobody in his right mind enters the wine business to get rich; it's the lifestyle and the connection with the land that makes this business the wonderful thing that it is. I can't conceive of a more rewarding and fun job and the friendships and connections that I've made over the years are incredible.

We have been in the business of repairing and maintaining cooperage for over 35 years. During that time we have been asked to fix virtually every type of problem you might have with a barrel - from simple bore-bug holes to multiple stave replacements when a barrel falls off a forklift. Our coopers are experienced, competent and efficient. If we can't save a barrel (or it is not worth saving) we will let you know.

I am also grateful for my wonderful staff who are some of the hardest working people around and have insured our success over the years. My profound thanks to you all and here's to the next decade of fine winemaking.

Blue Green Algae at Lake Berryessa

Bureau of Reclamation Press Release

With long summer days and heat, Lake Berryessa becomes an ideal habitat for cyanobacteria. Cyanobacteria, also referred to as blue-green algae, are a common and natural component of the microscopic plants (plankton) in Lake Berryessa. Some types of blue-green algae produce natural toxins or poisons. When these algae die and break down, toxins can be released into the water.

Blue-green algae are usually present in lake water in low numbers.

But once the water warms up in shallow areas, blue-green algae can become very abundant in some sections of Lake Berryessa. Under calm conditions, blue-green algae can accumulate in thick layers at the surface or along the shoreline. These accu mulations are frequently referred to as "blooms" or "scums," Wind can blow these accumulations around the lake.

While blue-green algae toxins have been detected at many locations in Lake Berryessa, the highest concentrations of toxins are usually found in blooms and shoreline scums. These dense accumulations pose the greatest potential health risks Watch for dense accumulations of algae and avoid these areas.

Blooms generally have the following properties:

- -Water may appear cloudy and look like thick pea soup.
- -Blooms are generally green or blue-green in color, although they can be brown or purple.
- -A thick mat or foam may form when a bloom washes onto shore.

Weather influences where blue-green algae will accumulate in a given location During extended periods of calm and sunny days, blooms can accumulate at the surface in any location. Wind and waves may cause them to form along shorelines or ir protected areas. Shifts in wind direction can move a bloom's location.

Recreational contact, such as swimming with water not visibly affected by a bluegreen algae bloom is not expected to cause health effects. However, some individu als could be especially sensitive to even low levels of algal toxins and might experi ence mild symptoms such as skin, eye or throat irritation or allergic reactions.

Direct contact or breathing airborne droplets containing high levels of blue-greer algal toxins during swimming or showering can cause irritation of the skin, eyes nose and throat and inflammation in the respiratory tract.



But isn't it sad the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the green thing back then?



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
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

Let's start with the February 1, 2011 NBRID Resolution: "To ensure continued qualified oversight of the District's operations, the Board of Directors will immediately explore utilizing Section 5956-5956.10 of the California Government Code employ a public private partnership process for the selection of a contractor or contractors to manage District operations on a long term basis, and to determine whether it is in the best interest of the District to contract for the design, building, operation, and financing, or any combination thereof, of the District facilities."

This implies that the primary goal of RFP is an immediate "operationsonly" contract. The determination of the type and extent of capital improvements and new facilities is left to a further stage of "competitive negotia-

Code 5956: "5956.5. ... the governmental agency soliciting proposals and entering into agreements with private entities for the studying, planning, design, developing, financing, construction, maintenance, rebuilding, improvement, repair, or operation, or any combination thereof, by private entities for fee-producing infrastructure projects shall ensure that the contractor is selected pursuant to a competitive negotiation process...The competitive negotiation process shall utilize, as the primary selection criteria, the demonstrated competence and qualifications for the studying, planning, design, developing, financing, construction, maintenance, rebuilding, improvement,

repair, or operation, or any combination thereof, of the facility. The selection criteria shall also ensure that the facility be operated at fair and reasonable prices to the user of the infrastructure facility services. The competitive negotiation process shall not require com-

This implies that the choice of proposer is not specifically tied to any specific cost projections. The choice is to be based on competence and qualifications and the ability to successfully finance projects in the future. In fact actual dollar figures are not required. This is one of the major sticking points of the controversy.

Berryessa Resort Improvement District (NBRID or District) is soliciting proposals from qualified firms (hereinafter referred to as the "Company") experienced in the business of financing, designing, constructing, operating and maintaining water and wastewater treatment and conveyance facilities. The cost of these services shall be borne entirely by the Company under a Then follow-up with Government Design, Build, Finance, Operate, Maintain (DBFOM) mechanism. The cost of these services shall be borne entirely by the Company under a Design, Build, Finance, Operate, Maintain (DBFOM) mechanism and shall not in any way be constructed or structured as debt incurred by or for

If the Company believes there is a better way to achieve NBRID's goals then that should be reflected in the proposal. In order to enter into a contract with NBRID, the successful bidder will be expected to comply with all the requirements contained of a design, build, finance, operate, and maintain contract as set forth under Government Code Section 5956 et seq."

More than twenty potential responding companies toured the facilities but only four submitted proposal:. Aquagy Overaa (Team), Summit Engineering (Team), PERC Water, to the same information. Therefore, Corix Utilities

The interview process has been criticized for its choice of members of the Transition Committee. Arguably its most knowledgeable members are Stu Williams and Tracy Renee. After the interview process, which was not public and for which none of the proposals have yet been made public, Summit Engineering was chosen as the winning proposer (not bidder). Corix came in second. These choices were ratified in open session by the full NBRID Board. Aguagy was not chosen as one of the top two contenders.

After this meeting, Georgi Ffinch was reprimanded by County counsel for potentially Brown Act violations when she distributed a public letter from Pensus requesting further evaluation of the proposals. The Lake Berryessa News printed part of that that letter in the August 22 issue. Again critics claim that the Brown Act is used by the County to limit discussion rather than guarantee open proceedings.

The basic purpose of the Brown Act is to ensure that the actual deliber-

ations of a legislative body in reaching a decision are carried out in public with all members of that legislative body and the general citizenry having access there are prohibitions against private The NBRID Board appointed two meetings, serial meetings and emails, and a number of other activities that might be construed as "behind-thescenes" deliberations.

> An argument has been made that, since the Summit proposal relied on financing through public sources rather than their own private financial resources, they violated the RFP requirement that the cost of services not be structured as debt to the NBRID. Therefore, their proposal should have been deemed non-responsive and tossed out of the competition.

> > When Summit was questioned as to

how they could immediately finance any capital improvements, they admitted they might have to borrow money from Napa County. When Corix was asked the same question, they said they'd simply write a check from their corporate coffers. These statements were discussed in public at the August 2, 2011 NBRID Board meeting. There were also some dollar figures proposed and discussed at that meeting although County staff is admant that dollars don't count yet.

NBRID is negotiating an immediate "Operate and Maintain" contract with Summit. If the parties cannot agree, NBRID will then begin negotiations with the second ranked proposer, Corix. Two members of the Transition Committee, Stu Williams, Chair, and Tracy Renee, Vice-Chair, are sitting in on the negotiations sessions as part of the Transition Committee's informational responsibility, but are neither negotiators nor decision-makers.

#### Algae at the Lake Explained - Again

The Lake Berryessa News received several calls and emails about the recent algae growth in Lake Berryessa. Several came from long-time lake users who said they had not seen anything like it before. Biologist Ken Davis has done some further analysis of the algae situation at the lake and has this to say.

There are three separate issues here – well actually two since one transforms into another. Over the last week, I've taken a good look at many sites on the lake, collected samples, and examined them using a compound microscope.

Note that all of the algae mentioned below are commonly found in plankton samples from the elake, just not in the density seen lately.

- 1. The floating particles (filaments) are the blue-green (cyanobacteria) that I reported a month ago – that's an algae called Phormidium.
- 2. When Phormidium and other algae die, they produce a gas and float to the surface where they form the familiar brown mats we have all seen. Typically they are windblown and end up in windblown coves.
- 3. The green slim (film) is another blue-green algae called Oscillatoria. It can also be found commonly in the water column, but weather conditions cause it to come to the surface and form the green slime and eventually a green, very flat mat on the surface.
- 4. There is a third blue-green in the mix, but it's rare, called Lyngbya.
- 5. They can also be mixed in the same "scum" and they are not easy to identify without the proper equipment.



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

The state of affairs of the NBRID has resulted in some public rancor and criticism. The NBRID Transition Committee meeting on September 6 at the Capell Valley Fire Station successfully provided a general summary of information regarding the status of the ongoing NBRID activities. #### Open Letter to NBRID Stakeholders from Aquagy, Inc.

At the NBRID Transition Committee's meeting Tuesday night, 9/6/11, several accusations and statements were made that require our response to the homeowners of the Berryessa Highlands:

-Aquagy was invited to the meeting by the Chairman of the Transition Committee to observe and answer any questions that might come from the homeowners or District staff pertaining to the proposal we submitted for the Design/Build/Operate and Finance of the District.

-We did not protest any actions by the District Board of Directors because we don't wish to hamper or slow the District's forward progress.

-We have spent the last two years providing input to the community, District staff and Board, especially pertaining to an alternative that allows the expedited processing and private funding of public projects, in accordance with California Code (Section 5956).

-We have not been compensated by the District, homeowners, or Pensus, the resort owner.

-We have always advocated a transparent process that would lead to selection of the best alternative for the residents and resort owner. There is no commu nication we have had with any of the involved parties, including the Board of Directors that we would not readily provide to the homeowners and public.

We are disturbed by the veil of secrecy that the Board and District staff is employing to obscure the selection process for NBRID's water and wastewater services contract. While the Board speaks of "transparency", they have been anything but transparent in their management of the RFP process, changing the composition of the Interview Panel and refusing to compare the key terms of the four proposals. Such secrecy in the review and selection process is not only unnecessary, it is inappropriate for a contract being expedited and negotiated through Section 5956.

At the Tuesday night meeting, Director Caldwell reprimanded and lectured the members of the NBRID Rate Committee and Transition Committee for asking reasonable questions about how the four proposals compare to one another. He categorically stated that "any engineering firm that claims to know how much it will cost to fix NB's problems is lying." Director This is the context of the following letter from Caldwell is not an engineer, nor is he qualified to make that assessment.

There is no great mystery to the technical problems facing NBRID or to the repeated violations and Cease and Desist Orders. It's simply inaccurate to claim that the scope of work required at NBRID cannot now be known.

The Aquagy proposal is not confidential and we informed the District in writing, so there is no reason that the details of our proposal cannot be shared with the homeowners and Pensus. In fact, as the primary stakeholders, it's the right and duty of the homeowners and Pensus to demand to see all four proposals before supporting a contract on the District's behalf.

The Aquagy proposal contains fixed, not-toexceed estimates for construction cost, total project cost, annual operations cost, and for a proposed rate increase. It includes fixing the I&I, storage, and disposal issues contained in the CDO, and all improvements to the water and wastewater treatment plants needed to provide uninterrupted service for the next

The total cost for these improvements is estimated at just under \$6 million dollars and would require a phased rate increase over five years of about 7 to 8% per year. Those are the TOTAL costs over the life of the 30-year contract, other than periodic inflationary adjustments.

Secrecy and confidentiality are inappropriate for the NBRID RFP process because the use of an expedited schedule was predicated entirely on application of the legal mechanism known as Code Section 5956, which dictates a very different process than the traditional bidding process governed by the Public Contracts Code:

-The express intent of Section 5956 is to enable the use of private funding for public infrastructure projects. Section 5956 specifically stipulates: "The agreement between the governmental agency and the private entity shall include...: Adequate financial resources of the private entity to design, build, and operate the facility after the date of the agreement." Any proposal that did not guarantee immediate financing needed to assume full responsibility for the District upon signing the contract should be deemed non-responsive to the RFP and should be immediately disqualified for not meeting the conditions required by Section 5956.

-Section 5956 dictates use of a "competitive negotiation" process, as distinct from a traditional "competitive bidding" process. There is no need for (nor benefit to the stakeholders) from having a secretive selection process; quite the contrary. The Selection Committee should have gone directly to an open-forum negotiation phase, involving any or all of the four proposing teams that were "responsive" to the RFP. This would have facilitated the District getting the best possible deal for its ratepayers in the most expeditious process.

The entire interview process was unnecessary and a waste of valuable time at a juncture when efficient management of both time and money are of dire importance to the District, especially for lifting the Cease and Desist Order and connecting Lupine

Additional fines are likely if the Regional Board doesn't see tangible and comprehensive improvements very soon. For the past year the general consensus of district stakeholders has been that the County's current schedule is simply too little, too late and that the best interests of the District will be served by an expedited process to secure private funding for immediate, sweeping improvements.

In recent weeks, County staff has claimed that "price doesn't matter" and that the current RFP is for a "professional services contract". That is incorrect. Price does matter – in fact it is central – and Section 5956 provides exemption from most requirements of the Public Contracts Code, with the specific intent of facilitating rapid and competitively-priced infrastructure projects.

Notwithstanding what's already past, this selection process could be righted and completed as soon as next week, and meaningful work could begin shortly thereafter. How? By the stakeholders deciding to take control of the district they are paying for so dearly, and firmly directing the Board to adhere to the Section 5956 process they committed to.

If District stakeholders sincerely want Pensus to be part of the NBRID system, a new operations-only contract is not sufficient; tangible improvements are needed immediately to satisfy the CDO, the Regional Board, and the schedule Pensus is bound to in their contract with the Bureau of Reclamation. Achieving those immediate improvements was the whole point of issuing a design-build-operate-finance request for

Although Aquagy was not the team selected for contracting with the District at this time, we remain willing and able to advise the homeowners and District in any manner that might be of benefit.

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#### Getting your boat ready for Winter

From the Western Boaters Safety Group

The worst thing that can happen to a boater is to come to your boat in the spring, remove the cover and find out it's full of water, or covered in mold and mildew. There is no way to store your boat all winter that is foolproof. The best thing to do is check on your boat often, especially if there has been any kind of inclement weather.

You may still get some warm days to take the boat out, but you can start the process now. First thing is to add fuel stabilizer to your fuel. Even if you go out several more times this season, it is a good idea to add it early. That way if you don't use the boat again it's in there. The stabilizer works best if you add it to the fuel and then take the boat out on the water. That way it gets run through all the fuel lines helping to preventa buildup of varnish that can cause poor performance next year. This is cheap and adds so much.

Check your owner's manual for the manufacturer's recommendations for winterization or off-season lay up. It is highly recommended that you contact a reputable boat service center and pay to have your boat winterized properly. This is the best way to make sure your boat is ready for the winter as well as making sure the regular maintenance has been done.

Take out the drain plugs. Allow any moisture in the boat to get out. Make sure you clean out any debris in the bilge area so that it can't build up in front of the drain plug opening. Make sure you store the boat in a bowup position. Make sure your cover fits and that it is tented properly. In other words be sure the water will always run off and not puddle in the canvas. If you store in a barn or other outside type building, you may want to cover the cover with a sheet of plastic just loosely draped over the cover to keep bird droppings off the canvas and the boat. The acid in the droppings can cause color fade on both the canvas and the gelcoat on the boat.

Inside Storage. The best way to store your boat is to have it in a locked, indoor facility. But even then

vou need to check on it to makesure there is no moisture accumulating inside the covet Moisture trapped inside the cover causes mildew and mold. Also with inside storage you can have mice and rodents get into your boat and destroy upholstery, wiring and hoses.Be sure to check your boat often to be sure you don't have a problem.

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Shrink Wrap. Many marinas and shops offer shrink wrap as aservice and solution to customers storing their boats for a long period f time. This is another way of storing and works very well for keeping rain, snow, dirt, and debris from entering the boat, but it can also lock in moisture from condensation and with the fluctuation in temperatures again cause mold and mildew. If you decide to shrink wrap your boat, be sure the shop puts in vents and it is a good idea to ask for a door to be added to the shrink wrap so you can open it during nice days and

Boat Covers, Canvas, Tarps. This is the most common wayto store boats. The problem here is that most covers are not "tented" properly. You need to 2. Change the engine and drive oil in the fall. You make sure that there are no sagging areas in your tarp where water can stand. Eventually the canvas will leak and the water will run into your boat. To keep the boat tented properly, you can use a custom fitted cover with tent poles already built in, or you can build your own frame work to hold the cover up. In either case you need to check the cover often and look under the cover to make sure that mold and mildew are not growing under the cover. It is a good idea again to open up the cover during nice sunny days and allow the boat to air out.

Another tip for keeping the moisture in check is to take plain Tidy Cat cat litter and pour it into 3 or 4 vinyl dishpans. This will absorb several times it's own weight in moisture. Spread the dishpans out in the boat. Be sure to use smaller dishpans as a large one will get too heavy to remove from the boat when filled with moisture.

If you live in a climate that freezes or border linefreezes, you need to be sure that your engine and

- 1. Add fuel stabilizer to your fuel tank. Make sure vou run the boat for several minutes after adding to make sure the fuel stabilizer gets through the entire fuel system. Be sure you have a water source hooked up to your engine when you run it.
- don't want to leave moisture, dirt, or metal in the oil over the winter.
- 3. For inboards and VO's have the alignment checked. This needs to be done every season and on I/O's the bellows can be checked at the same time. If you own an inboard or V-drive the shop can check your shaft packing and the transmission and/or V-
- 4. Have the engine fogged out. This is a heavy coating of an oil-like substance that covers all the internal parts of the engine and keeps everything from rusting during a long lay off period.
- 5. Clean the boat. Wax, vinyl conditioners and cleaners all add to the life of your boat.

So we are left with a rather odd situation in that the NBRID Board has seen all the proposals. Two members of the Transition Committee (Sedillo, Bryant) have seen all the proposals. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Transition Committee have seen only the Summit proposal now being negotiated. And Aguagy has made the core of their proposal public in a letter to NBRID stakeholders. The Lake Berryessa News has sent the County a California Public Records Act request to have all the proposals be made public.

The next phase of the process, after erated less controversy. a successful contract has been completed with Summit, is to continue to negotiate with Summit for the Design-Build part of the DBFOM process. This has raised serious questions in the minds of some, including Aquagy, because actual cost and rate proposals were not required in the original Code 5956based RFP process.

Although this does not feel right to some people who are more used to a competitive bidding process, which would include a cost component originally, it does not seem to be prohibited by Government Code 5956.

The argument made by critics is that without a second phase of the RFP comparing all the proposals again, with actual cost and rate data comparison, ratepayers may never know which company could have been the most costeffective overall.

Meanwhile NBRID staff and consultants are scrambling to meet a November 1 deadline imposed by the State Board for completion of several reporting milestones required under the Cease and Desist Order.

On that date the following reports are required by the state: Interim Spill Prevention and Control (Completed), Preliminary Revised Inflow/Infiltration (I/I) Assessment Preliminary Revised Wastewater Facilities Plan, Preliminary Collection System Improvement & Wastewater Facilities Financing Plan.

The County is making good progress on these reports. Video recording and smoke testing for Inflow and

Intrusion points have been completed with a report due soon. Walker Associates is completing a facilities plan that will be used to develop actual dollar figures for required capital improvements.

Critics say this Walker work was wasted since the RFP itself could have required that all the proposers actually submit capital improvement costs and future rates. This expanded requirement might have delayed the RFP process which was so focused on an immediate solution to the operation and maintenance issues. But it may also have gen-

The District has just been threatened with a \$330,000 fine. A public hearing about the fine will be held in Sacramento at the end of November with the NBRID Board and Transition Committee members attending to argue against the fine.

Money, money, and more money. And the elephant in the room is still the \$900,000 owed by the NBRID to Napa

If your mind is spinning after reading all this – which is only part of the public record – I sympathize.

There appear to be two paths forward. The one the NBRID is on now which seems to be to negotiate an operations contract with Summit followed by negotiating the capital improvement project with Summit. This is quickest.

The other is to negotiate an operations contract with Summit then go to phase two of an RFP to re-propose (remember it's not a bid under 5956) the capital improvement project with cost and rate impacts. Much more complicated and not guaranteed to provide a substantially better result.

What would you do as a Berryessa Highlands resident? This will be the type of decision an independent CSD Board will have to make in the future – and with no County deep pockets help in the wings. What would happen if someone called a CSD election and no one showed up?




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#### A Historical Lodging Quest: Where Did Travelers Stay?

I call upon the good people of the Independent Republic of Berryessa to assist me in my noble quest to identify and document the rich history of the lodging industry of the "Napalachia" region of Napa County. To date, I have unearthed 25 lodging enterdating back to 1862.



#### Hunting Berryessa Valley, Lloyd Briggs, 1881

Started off today driving a nice pair of ponies with a sort of express wagon in which we packed our tents and provisions. We drove over the mountains to Berryessa Valley. The road is extremely dusty this time of year, owing to the large trucks loaded with quicksilver which travel from the Knoxville quicksilver mine to Napa. The scenery is superb, and the waving wheat, hundreds of acres of which we passed looked like a golden realm in such a wild, mountainous country.

Ouail are plentiful and quite tame, also the turtledove, and cottontail and jackass rabbits; and I had my game bag well filled on arrival from what shooting had while standing in the team.

We passed many ranches bearing peculiar names such as "Hole in the Wall," "Windy Flats," etc. Arriving at Monticello, a farming and mining town of about 100 inhabitants, twenty-five miles from Napa we put up at a hotel kept by E. A. Peacock, to whom belongs the distinction of building the first house in the town of Monticello in 1866.

I enjoyed fishing in Putah Creek which runs back of the town. Of all the dusty places in this region this is the dustiest place I ever was in. We were white from the time we entered it until we left. The seats, tables floors and counters, and all the articles on them, were buried in dust by the passing teams or puffs of wind a cloud of dust arose from our beds as we retired for

I enjoyed talking with the inhabitants, who were kind and friendly, but, as one visitor at the hotel expressed it, "They do want to know where you cut your first tooth and how old you were; when and where you were born."

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


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

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

#### News from Supervisor Diane Dillon New SRA Fee Coming Your Way?

Fire suppression responsibility is divided into two basic areas in the state -- SRA (State Responsibility Area) and LRA (Local Responsibility Area). In Napa County, the LRA is the area within each of the cities, on the Napa Valley floor (basically) between Silverado Trail and Hwy 29, and the Carneros area. An easy way to remember this:

LRA is the Napa Valley floor. The SRA is the rest of the County, i.e., the vast majority of the unincorporated area. Maps showing these two areas can be found at this website. Why this distinction matters is because the State Legislature passed a bill in June imposing a fee of up to \$150 per structure in the SRA.

the Governor was supportive of the bill and signed it into statute and, in The local citizens group working to August, emergency regulations were adopted by a reluctant Board of Forestry and Fire Protection (BOF). These regs set new annual fees of \$90 per first dwelling, and \$25 for each additional dwelling, to be placed in a special fund for fire prevention activities only. The regs create a tiered system so that it is possible to give discounts to property owners.

> But this unfair "fee" is not as large as the Legislature and the State Administration would like it to be. Thus, in the waning days of the legislative session, there was another attempt to raise the fee to a minimum of \$150 counts, plus a tiered fee on unimproved and agricultural lands, starting at \$1 per acre for the first 100 acres.

> The good news is that RCRC (the Rural Counties association that I chair) and its allies were successful in holding off the new increased SRA fee bill. We were assisted greatly in this process by the support of our former State representative, Senator Wes Chesbro; please read his well-written letter here.

> While it is unlikely that any property owner will see a fee imposed before next Spring, attention on the issue will now turn back to the BOF, as the Administration will likely make an attempt to get a new set of implementing regulations based on the parameters of the June bill. Additionally, another attempt at finding an alternative financing method is likely to come up in discussions this fall or bill packages pursued by the Legislature or Administration.

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#### What You Should Know About Oak Chips

By Phil Burton, Barrel Builders

Oak chips are a fixture of the wine industry due to their ease of use and the cost of new cooper-age. The use of oak chips can add a significant amount of oak character at a tiny fraction of the cost of new barrels. (We have several winemakers who refer to chips as "micro-barrels.") Chips have become a staple, particularly in the fighting varietal category where they can add much complexity at an affordable price.

There are hundreds of tons of chips used annually - but very few wineries will admit usage. Two reasons wineries do not advertise the use of chips are: 1) the use of chips is considered "cheating" - a sign of low quality and; 2) In the US, toasted chips were illegal until 1993, even though winemakers used them.

Chips are one of the cleanest ways to get a decent oak flavor into bulk wines since the addition can be easily done in a tank. Especially with new methods such as micro-oxygenation, chips can produce wines that are similar to fairly good barrel-aged wines.

Chips are best added during fermentation so that the oak flavors integrate well with the wine, but they can be added anytime except right before bottling.

#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN CHIPS

Generally, American and French oak chips are available from several suppliers. A variety of toast levels are available although most manufacturers have a house toast which has proven most successful for them.

At Barrel Builders our house toast for French oak chips is a light goldenbrown; what we would classify as a medium toast. Our American oak chips are toasted slightly darker since this seems to mellow the extractives somewhat. The toasting for both is done slowly so that the color is uniform throughout the chip and all the chips are about the same color.

When shopping for chips, look for uniformity of color and size. Be careful not to buy chips that are really shavings or sweepings from the cooperage.

Quality oak chips will be made from

wood that is a by-product of the barrel manufacturing process; stave ends, rejects, and other scrap. Consequently the wood will have gone through the same aging process as the manufacturer's barrels - hopefully with extended air

Wet or kiln-dried wood will impart the same characters as kiln-dried wood used in barrels and are particularly noticeable in American oak. Some vendors have three-year chips available which have a more mellow flavor.

#### HOW CHIPS ARE USED

We have discussed use patterns, amounts, times and results with numerous wine makers and there is a wide variety of opinion. Following are general guidelines:

A range of 10 to 15 pounds of chips per thousand gallons of wine appears to be a common dosage.

When customers are first experimenting with chips, we often recommend using 8 to 10 ounces for one barrel start light, you can always add more.

Published literature suggests that extraction is largely complete in a couple of days. However, many winemakers extract for a week or more while some others wait several months. One large user swears that a subtle change in flavors occurs between weeks 3 & 5.

Chips can be introduced in several ways. They can simply be dumped into the wine where they will sink in a couple of days and the wine can be racked off.

Several wineries have developed sophisticated methods using stainless steel screens that fit over drain fittings. After the wine is drained from the tank. the door is opened, the screen is removed and the chips, lees and residues are

The most common method is to use "tea bags". A bag of loose cloth or other porous material is made up to hold the chips. Attaching a rope makes it easy to get the bag in and out of the tank. Yet another method is to add a large quantity of chips to a small amount of wine to create an oak extract. The extract is then used to add flavor during the blending process.



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#### What's Inside: Red Bull

Meat Sugar, Caffeine, and Bile!

Like most popular soft drinks. Red Bull is largely sugar water. But don't count on its glucose to "give you wings," as the ad says. Multiple studies have debunked the so-called sugar high.

#### Taurine

Also known as 2-aminoethanesulfonio acid, taurine was originally isolated from bull bile in 1827. Now made synthetically, it is the magical elixir said to bring out the kitesurfing extremophile in any Websurfing nerd. Taurine's actual effects, while not as drastic as the hype, are pretty wide-ranging, even from the amount found in a single can: Not only is it an inhibitory neurotransmitter (in some cases acting as a mild sedative) and an age-defying antioxidant, it even has the potential to steady irregular heartbeats.

#### Glucuronolactone

Internet rumors claimed this was a Vietnam-era experimental drug that causes brain tumors. Luckily, that's not true. But don't crumple up your tinfoil hat yet - hardly anyone has looked into exactly what this stuff does. So little research has been done on glucuronolactone (and most of it 50 years ago) that almost all information about it is mere rumor. Users generally believe it fights fatigue and increases well-being, but that could turn out to be bull, too.

#### Caffeine

Ah, here are Red Bull's wings. All the things this drink is supposed to do for you - increase concentration and reaction speed, improve emotional state, and boost metabolism — are known effects of this white powder, a distant cousin of cocaine.

#### Niacin (niacinamide)

Also known as vitamin B-3, niacin increases so-called good cholesterol (HDL) by preventing the formation of triglycerides, making it a terrific cholesterol drug. Unfortunately, there isn't enough niacin here to have this benefit. And it's not even pure enough to give you the mild head rush dubbed the "niacin

#### Sodium citrate

Commonly used as a preservative in soft drinks and spreadable cheeses, sodium citrate also helps convert glucose into lactic acid during exercise, producing a measurable effect on athletic performance. In at least one test, it shaved an average of 17 seconds off a 5K run.

#### Inositol

A carbohydrate found in animal muscle (sometimes called "meat sugar"), inositol is turning out to be a wonder drug that significantly reduces depression, panic attacks, agoraphobia, and obsessivecompulsive disorder. It might even be what makes whole grains effective cancer fighters. Instead of being a bit player in Red Bull (you'd need to drink up to 360 cans a day to get its benefits), inositol probably deserves a drink of its own.

Red Bull is an adaptation of the Thai energy drink Krating Daeng, which translates as "Red Bull". Based on market share, it is the most popular energy drink in the world. The company was founded by Thai national Chaleo Yoovidhya and Austrian national Dietrich Mateschitz. Mateschitz was the international marketing director for Blendax, a toothpaste company, when he visited Thailand in 1982 and discovered that Krating Daeng helped to cure his jet lag.

Red Bull's slogan is "it gives you wings' and the product is aggressively marketed through advertising, tournament sponsorship. In 2009 it was discovered that Red Bull Cola exported from Austria contained trace amounts of cocaine. Red Bull has also been the target of criticism concerning the possible health risks associated with the drink.[8]

A review published in 2008 found no documented reports of negative or positive health effects associated with the amount of taurine used in energy drinks, including Red Bull, concluding that "The amounts of guarana, taurine, and ginseng found in popular energy drinks are far below the amounts expected to deliver either therapeutic benefits or adverse effects.'

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#### The anatomy of a wine barrel

Oak barrels are like a winemaker's spice rack - that was the analogy that someone used when trying to explain what purpose the oak barrels served in making

Different types of oak have different types and amounts of tannin, which is a component of wine. A very important one, in fact. Those tannins contribute to mouth feel and body in wine.

There is also a diversity of oak grain offered by the various types of oak. The grain size of the barrel helps to control the exposure of oak to the wine. With a smaller-grained oak barrel, the wine will receive a slower exposure to the oak influences. Larger-grained barrels expose the wine to oak more quickly over time, and are most useful for wines aged for a shorter time in barrel.

American oak, because it has more lactones (a chemical compound of sorts) offers hints of toasty, sweeter flavors like coconut and marshmallow; this species of oak also has naturally low levels of tannins.

French oak, on the other hand, brings a whole new set of flavors and aromas to the party. Characteristic of French oak are baker's spices (vanilla, cinnamon, clove, etc.) along with roasted coffee bean and chocolate characteristics. Hungarian oak rounds out the Winemaker's Spice Rack. Hungarian oak is known to have a bit more of a kick since it imparts more peppery spice notes.

One important area of note is toasting level, which is essentially the controlled baking of the inside of the barrel over a fire. Toasting will move the flavors of the wood from lighter and spicier to darker and more deep and roasted, with a big impact on the wine.

There is also the new-vs.-old oak to consider—as in, new barrels impart flavors more intensely than used barrels. The oak characteristics will, over time, get "leached" out of the barrels and after each use, the oak influence becomes more and more tame until there may not be enough to do the wine any good. It's usually around the third or fourth go with the barrel that it no longer brings any oak influence to the party and at that point the barrel goes out of circulation.

Barrel size also plays a part in imparting oak characteristics on the wine. It would make sense that the smaller the barrel, the more concentrated the oak influence would be on the wine, since there is relatively more barrel surface touching the wine in these smaller casks.

#### Take a walk on Quail Ridge Reserve

Visitors are invited to take a walk on the Quail Ridge Reserve from 2 to 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 22. The reserve is on a peninsula at the southwest end of Lake Berryessa.

The group will gather at 2 p.m. at Markley Cove Resort to being the walk and will return at about 6 p.m. All participants must leave the reserve at the same time. Heavy rainfall during the day will cancel the walk.

#### The Great Berryessa Oil Rush(es): 1900 and 1920

If you look at the map of Lake Berryessa you'll notice a location on the east shore called Oil Well Canyon. I had always wondered what that meant until I attended a seminar a few years ago and saw photos of an oil well near where the Bureau of Reclamation headquarters building now stands.

The first "Oil Rush" began when some local businessman and a professional surveyor went prospecting for oil in Berryessa Valley in October, 1900. They returned with several full bottles that they said came from springs. A well should be drilled, one told the Napa Journal, to find the source somewhere in the sandstone and shale below.

Within days an "expert" from the Mt. Shasta Oil and Development Company said they were going to develop what suddenly became known as the "Berryessa Oil Lands." Soon after that the Monticello Oil Company was formed.

Oil strikes were making news all over the country. It was oozing out elsewhere in Northern California and positively bursting from the ground in the state's south.

The value of this new form of gold was only beginning to be recognized As a replacement for whale oil and tallow, "rock oil" or "coal oil," as it was once called, illuminated homes around the country in the form of kerosene. Gasoline was used as a cleaning solvent. Oil was converted to light whole buildings as well as city streets. It lubri-

So much oil, of so fine a quality, so near the surface, so close to home!

ished before it could come to the surors and investors quietly packed up their things and went away. A lot of money had changed hands for nothing, much of it going in legal and profes-When Henry Ford began making sional fees to attorneys.

The second "Oil Rush" began due to persistence, better known as an obsession in this case. Berryessa had long been a frustration to the scores of investors who had hoped to find oil and gas there. One persistent "wildcatter" was Walter B. Griffiths, a Napa realtor, state assemblyman, and self-styled petroleum expert. Like the prospectors Prompted by the invention of the who preceded him around the turn of the 20th Century, he had struck modest, short-lived pockets of oil and gas several times in the early 1920's.

When someone claimed to have found oil and coal on the McCormick ranch on Spring Mountain in St Helena, a rush of speculation started again, and a hatch of new companies California superior to any that I have appeared. One businessman convinced some Hollywood stars to invest.

A moderate-sized company produced about 10 barrels of oil a day, "very high grade and clear as crystal," according to the speculator. But it waspopping up on the Gosling ranch in n't enough and the hole was closed and the riggings were removed.

Local Napa businessmen also bought into the dream. But when a geologist from Los Angeles came to inspect the site, the expert advised folks to pull out. All the other little oil companies that had popped up in Berryessa soon reeled in their cables, too, and dis-

Convinced that Berryessa would yield oil, the driven Griffiths sank what was at the time the deepest hole ever drilled in Northern California. At 3,710', his 25'-long, heavy steel drilling cable snapped off. The line he used to rescue the cable also broke, and he had to seal the hole with cement.

Much of the information in the previous article came from the excellen book: Roots of the Present: Napa Valley 1900 to 1950, by Lin Weber This book was also the source of the information in a previous article about the Monticello Rodeo.

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




#### Rehabilitation of North End Trail at Lake Berryessa

The rehabilitation and realignment of the North End Trail is a joint effort by the Bureau of Reclamation and Berryessa Trails & Conservation. The existing North End Trail was established in the late 1970s and has a number of safety and envi ronmental issues as a result of its current condition, alignment, and ongoing ero sion along the banks of the reservoir. Segments of the trail are in close proxim ity to, and in some cases on the edge of, eroding cliffs or landslides.

The proposed action consists of rehabilitating the existing trail by realigning portions away from hazardous areas, resurfacing the trail through the use of pos sible trail stabilizers, and removing and controlling overgrown vegetation Associated structures, such as trailheads, gates, bridges, and wet crossings, would also be constructed or repaired, as needed.

The new North End Trail would be approximately the same length as the exist ing trail (7.3 miles long), but would include new loop and access trails and would adhere to sustainable design techniques. The trail would follow the sam alignment in most areas, but would be shifted further inland in areas where erosion or landslides have created hazardous conditions along the shore of the lake It would consist of a 4-foot-wide mineral soil surface trail with 2 feet of clear ance on both sides (8-foot- wide by 8-foot-high corridor free of vegetation).

The modified trail would consist of 5.4 miles of main trail, 1.1 miles of loo trails, 0.5 mile of access trails, and less than 0.5 mile of existing trail that requires regrading. Six loop trails would be created, with access to the main trai at eight points along the trail.



#### Real Berryessa Valley History from Murray Clark


My Grandfather, Alonzo Clark lost his right arm in a bird hunting accident when he was about 19 years old. That would have been about 1867. Dad said Grandpa always wore a suit no matter what he was doing. He said Grandpa could pick up a sack of wheat with his left hand. A sack of wheat could weigh between 130 - 145 pounds. One day Grandpa had been out in the field and it was pouring down rain He came to the house, put his horse away and went to the bunkhouse to dry off before going to the ranch house. The bunkhouse had a huge fireplace in it. When he walked in there were several hired hands around the fire. No one offered to make room for him so he reached into his pocket and threw a hand full of rifle ammunition into the fire. Dad said when they started exploding guys were going out the doors and windows. Grandpa just stood there until he was warm and dry.

Dad used to haul wheat from Berryessa to Napa with a 6-horse team and wagon There was still one of these freight wagons on the ranch when I was a young man They were huge, about 4 feet wide and 14 to 16 feet long. The sides had to be 5 to 6 feet tall. Of course, the driver's seat was on top and up front. I remember playing on this old wagon when I was a small boy. The rear wheels were 6 feet in diameter. They were also equipped with brakes.

The trip was about 35 miles and took 3 days because of the mountainous terrain The first day was from Monticello to Windy Flats. Windy Flats was like a stage stop for the teamsters. They would spend the night, get something to eat, rest and feed the teams. Then it was on to Napa to unload and go back as far as Windy Flats again. The next day back to Monticello. One time Dad was on his way back to the flats with an empty wagon.

When they were empty they usually only hitched two mules to the wagon and led the other four behind the wagon. The reason they only hitched two mules is that i is much easier to negotiate the turns. Dad had just topped the mountain and was headed down the other side when he met a guy on a bicycle. Well these mules had never seen a bicycle before and it scared the hell out of them.

The road is narrow and traverses a very steep bill side, 60 degrees off the down hill side of the road. The mules went over the down hill side and Dad jumped from the top of the wagon as it was going over. The four mules behind the wagon pulled loose and were OK. The two that went over the edge were killed. The wagon tumbled down the hill about 100 yards and came to rest against a big tree. One time on our way to Napa, Dad and Mom stopped and pointed out the wagon to me. In the early 1950's there was a big fire in the country and what was left of the wagon

These are the memories I often live on when I have a sad day. I have very loving memories of people who I now call dear friends, all met at the Inn with Jim and Linda. Our wishes go out to their childre, grandchildren and close friends.





o Preparation of a report of waste discharge application for submittal to the Regional Board.

<u>Flow Monitoring</u> – Monitoring of the system per Regional Board requirements. Confirmation of inflow and infiltration flows existing within the District.

<u>Financial Analysis</u> – Evaluation of public and private financing options and costs to determine the most favorable method of financing the improvements.

<u>Assessment Engineer's Report</u> – Preparation of documentation defining the plan for any assessment or bond approach for financing.

Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) Development – Preparation of preliminary engineering drawings and specifications to allow for development of a GMP for improvements per the desired approach from the feasibility study.

The second phase of the project would be implementation of the conceptual improvements determined and approved during the Phase 1 efforts. This will involve financing, detailed engineering, permitting, construction, and commissioning of the improvements.

In addition, the team will be providing operation and maintenance support and personnel for running the facility. Phase 1 will consist of oversight and support of existing District staff to allow for streamlining of the facility, data collection, and minimization of spills/overflow conditions. Phase 2 will involve the full transfer of the operations and maintenance duties of the facility to the team.

The agreement with Western Water Constructors is for privatized operations and management at a not to exceed cost of \$517,500 for the Preliminary Design Phase (PDP) professional engineering and financial services to address facilities needed to comply with Cease and Desist Order R5-2010-0101 issued by the Regional Water Quality Control Board, replacement of the water treatment plant and the wastewater treatment plant including provisions for private financing. This does not include any repair or construction work.

Completion of the PDP is scheduled for 150 days after contract signing. This work may potentially allow the CDO to be lifted in less than a year.

An especially dry year, such as 2007, only saw about 15 inches while a particularly wet season, such as 1998 and 2006, brought more than 40 inches. Some forecasters predict that the first part of this rainy season will be influenced by weak La Niña conditions. That could mean near-normal or below-normal rain-

"La Niña" - Spanish for "the little girl" - refers to unusually cold water temperatures in the Pacific Ocean along the equator. That usually leads to rainierthan-normal winter in the Pacific Northwest and dryer-than-normal winter in Southern California.

The National Weather Service Climate Prediction Center predicts above-normal rainfall in the Pacific Northwest and below-normal rainfall in Southern California. In the Bay Area, things could go either way or be normal. A colderthan-usual winter is also likely, according to the center.

The Old Farmer's Almanac also has predictions for the upcoming rainfall year. Look for a rainy streak into December and a wet, cool spring leading up to a hot summer, according to the almanac.

The Solano County Water Agency is doubtful that enough rain will fall to lift Berryessa water levels the final 14.6 feet needed to spill into the Glory Hole for the first time since 2006.

During a typical rain year, Lake Berryessa gets about 200,000 acre-feet of water. Last year saw above-normal rainfall and the lake received 300,000 acrefeet. If this rainy season mirrors the 2010-11 season, enough water could flow into Lake Berryessa and the lake level could approach or top the Glory Hole.

Much depends on where the heart of the storms hit. The Berryessa watershed runs from the lake as far north as 4,720-foot-high Mount Cobb in Lake County. Storms in 1995 dropped so much rain in the watershed that Lake Berryessa received almost 800,000 acre-feet of water. If that were to happen this year, the lake would fill and then some.

#### Wine and Global Warming

A team of climate scientists broke the US, into a four kilometer grid (much smaller than that used in global climate models) and examined the future effect of climate change on a single industry: winemaking.

Premium wine grapes like the weather warm but not too warm. They are particularly sensitive to days when the temperature rises above 95°F, although extended stretches above 85°F aren't good for them either.

What the scientists found is that while global warming isn't projected to produce a massive change in average temperature in wine-growing regions (probably only about 5°F by the end of the century), that's enough to tip a lot of summer days into the heat-wave zone.

For example, California's Napa and Sonoma wine regions currently see fewer than fourteen of the 95°-plus days each year. But by the end of the century thatcould climb to 55 or 60 - enough to pretty much put these regions out of business.

All told, the report calculated, U.S. production of premium wines could drop 80% by 2100 - even after accounting for the fact that some regions, like parts of Maine, Oregon and Washington, could become California's heirs.

End of the world? Not really. Life without premium wines would be less interesting, but not unimaginable.

Besides, America's loss might be Canada's gain. Or perhaps genetic engineering will come to California's rescue with heat-resistant strains.

#### California Inland Fisheries Foundation Volunteers Head to Lake Berryessa

CIFFI's four pens at Markley Cove Resort were thoroughly cleaned by a volunteer group manning the power washers. DFG's trout are scheduled to be put into the nets in early January 2012.

These pens hold the tiny rainbow trout during the fall and winter months in an attempt to teach the fish how to feed and better survive the crucial winter months. The small fry will remain in the pens for approximately four to five months, being fed several times a day by volunteers from CIFFI and Markley Cove Resort. After eight-plus years of using these pens, CIFFI has found that the pen-raised fish acclimate better to the natural food sources at Lake Berryessa and grow to a larger size by spring. They are also able to utilize the lake's huge population of natural food sources better than DFG's springs planted fish.

Simply put, planter trout have mouths too small to swallow the lake's minnows. Biological studies have proven that pen projects work well and anticipation is high for a greater number of holdover sized fish in future years.

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

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

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#### The Grinch Who Stole the Christmas **Stuffing: A Cautionary Holiday Tale** By Peter Kilkus (This Season's Grinch)

We all partake of the noble holiday tradition of stuffing a turkey, and then stuffing ourselves, for the holidays. Although we know that it's not good

for us, a whole platoon of doctors can't

seem to stop us. But I just had a personal wake-up call when my doctor said that the red "Check Engine" light was flashing on my physical exam results. My blood pressure had spiked and I was not feeling exceptionally well.

Then I saw a medical poster that kind of freaked me out. It graphically described a condition called "Metabolic Syndrome" and the picture on the poster looked a lot like me! (See picture on right)

So let me Grinch you out before vou start stuffing so you can understand your options and their effects. Consider it a Christmas present from the Lake Berrvessa News.

#### What is Metabolic Syndrome?

Metabolic syndrome describes a common condition in which obesity, high blood pressure, high blood glucose ("blood sugar"), and an abnormal cholesterol profile (dyslipidemia) cluster together in one person.

When these risk factors occur together, the chance of developing coronary heart disease, stroke, and diabetes is much greater than when these risk factors develop independently.

According to the American Heart Association, almost 25% of Americans are affected by metabolic syndrome.

#### **Metabolic Syndrome Risk Factors**

To be diagnosed with metabolic syndrome, patients need to have at least three of the following risk factors:

**Obesity**: Obesity is defined as having too much body fat. A person is considered obese when his/her weight is 20% or more above ideal weight. Obesity promotes insulin resistance, an inability to respond normally to insulin.

People with fat situated mainly around the stomach (abdomen) are considered "apple-shaped". They have a

higher risk of many of the serious conditions associated with metabolic syndrome. See accompanying article: Body Mass Index (BMI) Defined and Explained.

Metabolic Syndrome Risk Factor: Waist measurement greater than 35 inches (women) or 40 inches (men).

High Blood Glucose: Sugar (glucose) is what supplies the body with energy. Normally, this sugar is rapidly cleared from the blood and stored as energy. If sugar stays in the blood it causes an unhealthy buildup called high blood glucose. Glucose in the blood reaches all of thebody's organs and systems, including the heart arteries and veins, kidneys, and nervous system. This constant "sugar-attack" has

the same affect as eating too much candy and not brushing your teeth - it causes organ system decay or degeneration People with high blood glucose are at risk for many diseases including heart attack, stroke, blindness, and amputation. High blood glucose levels (or pre-diabetes) often leads to the development of type 2 diabetes.

Metabolic Syndrome Risk Factor: Glucose of 110 mg/dL or greater

High Blood Pressure: Blood pressure is the force that helps the blood flow through the blood vessels. When the blood pressure in the arteries is too high, it is called high blood pressure. High blood pressure damages blood vessels. If blood vessels are subjected to high blood pressure for an extended period of time, they thicken and become less flexible. This is called arteriosclerosis, and it can affect the arteries that supply blood to the heart.

Blood pressure is measured using two numbers. The first number, called systolic pressure, is measured just after the heart contracts and the pressure is greatest. The second number is diastolic pressure. It is measured when the heart relaxes and the pressure is lowest

Normal blood pressure is about 110/75 mmHg. High blood pressure alone causes no symptoms, but it does increase the risk of heart attack, stroke, and kidney failure.

Metabolic Syndrome Risk Factor: Blood pressure greater than 130/85

Abnormal Cholesterol Profile (Dyslipidemia): Cholesterol is a type of fat in your blood. Cholesterol either comes from the foods you eat or is made by your liver. It is found in all of the body's cells. There are "good" and "bad" types of cholesterol.

Too much of the "bad" cholesterol (triglycerides and LDL) and not enough "good" cholesterol (HDL) can increase your risk of coronary heart disease. Triglycerides and HDL levels are important indicators of metabolic syn-

**Triglycerides**: High triglyceride levels in the blood can help clog the arteries with fatty deposits called plaque (atherosclerois), making it difficult for oxygen-rich blood to reach the heart. High triglyceride levels increase your risk of having a heart attack

Metabolic Syndrome Risk Factor: Triglycerides greater than 150 mg/dL

HDL Cholesterol: HDL cholesterol (the "good cholesterol") helps remove deposits from within the blood vessels and it stops the blood vessels from becoming blocked. The more HDL in your blood, the better it is for your heart. When HDL cholesterol levels are low, there is a greater risk of developing a heart attack or stroke.

Metabolic Syndrome Risk Factor: HDL cholesterol level less than 50 mg/dL (women) and less than 40 mg/dL (men)

#### **Medical Conditions Associated with Metabolic Syndrome**

People with untreated metabolic syndrome are at a higher risk of cardiovascular disease (such as coronary heart disease and stroke) and type 2

Stroke: The term stroke refers to the sudden death of brain tissue caused by a lack of oxygen to the brain. In ischemic stroke, blood flow to an area of the brain is either blocked or reduced This blockage may result from atheroclerosis and blood clot formation.

Coronary disease: Narrowing of the arteries in the heart usually causes

coronary heart disease which can lead to heart attacks. The buildup of plaque in the lining of the arteries (atherosclerosis) can cause this narrowing. All of the metabolic syndrome risk factors can result in atherosclerosis. Heart attacks occur when blood cannot flow through the clogged arteries. As a result, the heart does not get enough oxygen and stops working.

Type 2 Diabetes: A disease in which the pancreas produces little or no insulin and/or the body loses the ability to respond normally to insulin (insulin resistance). Insulin is needed to transport glucose into the cells for use as energy. Without insulin, body tissues have less access to essential nutrients for energy and storage. Without proper management, diabetes can lead to complications that affect the eyes, mouth, cardiovascular system, kidneys, nerves, and extremities.

#### **Causes and Treatment**

Some studies suggest that metabolic syndrome is closely tied to an individual's metabolism, or how the body proceses food. Normally, food is absorbed into the bloodstream in the form of sugar (glucose) and other basic substances. When glucose levels in the bloodstreamrise the pancreas (an organ behind the stomach) releases a hormone called insulin

Insulin attaches to the body's cells allowing glucose to enter where it is used for energy. In some people, the body's cells are not able to respond to insulin (insulin resistance). It is this condition of insulin resistance that some studies suggest is behind the development of metabolic syndrome.

Metabolic syndrome is a disease that requires long-term management of each of the risk factors. Poor nutrition and lack of exercise are underlying causes. It has been shown that with lifestyle changes and treatment, including medications, people with metabolic syndrome can greatly decrease their chances of developing serious complications. Regular monitoring of blood pressure, cholesterol, and glucose are important to detect the syndrome. It is important to know your number.

#### Cranberry-Apple Sauce (The John Van Loon Special)

(This is one of the most flavorful cranberry sauces I've ever tasted!)

diced, peeled McIntosh apples (approximately 7 large apples) 10 cups

fresh cranberries 6 cups

2 cups apple cider

maple sugar (or firmly packed light or dark brown sugar) 2/3 cup

4 tbsp pure maple syrup

2/3 cup golden raisins

grated fresh ginger 2 tbsp

ground cinnamon 2 tsp

1/2 tspground cloves

1/2 tsp

- 1. In a large saucepan, combine the apples, cranberries, cider, maple sugar, maple syrup, raisins, ginger, cinnamon, cloves and salt.
- 2. Bring to a boil, and immediately reduce the heat to low.
- 3. Simmer, uncovered, until the cranberries burst, 8 minutes. Cool to room temperature.
- 4. Transfer to a bowl, cover, and refrigerate until chilled. Serve chilled.

Makes 16 cups or 32 servings.

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#### Fire Cider: Winter Health Without Flames

Stave off a cold with fire. Well, almost - fire cider. This unusual concoction of immune-boosting ingredients will also clear sinuses, but it's not for the weak of heart. Some people like to age their fire cider for several weeks, so they start a fresh batch every autumn for winter cold season.

- 1 small onion, peeled and chopped (contains natural anti-histamines),
- 5 cloves garlic, peeled, minced (anti-bacterial, anti-fungal, anti-viral,
- 3/4 cup peeled, grated fresh horse-radish (increases blood flow to the head)
- 1/2 cup peeled, grated fresh ginger (increases circulation to the extremities),
- 1 tsp. ground turmeric (anti-inflammatory),
- 1 heaping tsp. cayenne pepper (blood stimulant).
- 1 cup honey, preferably raw and local,
- 2 cups apple cider vinegar to cover.

Put the ingredients in a quart jar and stir until the honey is dissolved. Cover the mouth of the jar with a square of waxed paper, and fasten the lid tightly.

Put in a cool, dark place, and let sit undisturbed for six to eight weeks. Once your fire cider has matured, strain and squeeze the mixture through cheesecloth.

Stored away from light and heat, fire ciderwill last up to six months. When needed, take by the spoonful. It can be also be used as a salad dressing or as a chest rub.

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


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#### **Body Mass Index (BMI) Defined and Explained**

The Body Mass Index (BMI) is a quick, easy and efficient screening tool to identify weight problems in adults. While BMI is a strong indicator of body fat percentage, it can vary for age, race and sex. It is important to note that the BMI should only be utilized as a screening tool and is not in and of itself, diagnostic. For example, older people tend to have more body fat than those who are younger, and women tend to have more body fat than men.

Also, some athletes may score a higher BMI becauset hey have increased muscle mass; therefore, they weigh more because the weight is muscle not fat. In fact, some patients notice when the combine diet and exercise, they may go down a clothing size while their weight remains the same.

Body Mass Index calculates a person's fat level by using a complex mathematical formula based an individual'sheight and weight. The chart below highlights BMI scores and their correlating weight status.

Below 18.5 BMI - Underweight 18.5 – 24.9 BMI - Normal

25.0 – 29.9 BMI - Overweight

30.0 & up BMI - Obese

Body weight is only one indicator of disease risk. Combined with a high BMI, the following factors can place you at an even greater risk forcertain diseases:

- High blood pressure (hypertension)
- High LDL cholesterol ("bad" cholesterol)
- Low HDL cholesterol ("good" cholesterol)
- High triglycerides
- High blood glucose (sugar)
- Family history of premature heart disease
- Physical inactivity
- Cigarette smoking

In conjunction with BMI numbers, a person'swaist circumference is also an effective way toassess weight and health risk. People who carrymost of their fat around their waist, an apple-shaped body, are at greater risk for type 2diabetes and heart disease. The risk increases with a waist size that is more than 35 inches for women and greater than 40 inches for men.

Scientific evidence shows that when people carry weight around their waistline, abdominal fat tends to surround internal organs, impairing their function. Conversely, people who carry their weight around their hips, a "pear shaped" body, accumulate fat directly under the skin, and thus the fat does not interfere with their organ function.

Just as a BMI over 25 can have negative health implications, so too can a BMI of 18.5 or lower, categorized as "underweight" for an adult. A BMI this low could indicate a variety of medical conditions.

People with underweight body mass indexes are at increased risk for poor bonehealth, such as osteoporosis. Younger women classified as underweight may have disruptions of their menstrual cycle and difficulty getting pregnant. Other issues from being underweight can include anemia or a weakened immune system.



On November 26, the Berryessa Bridges Project team geared up, rented a patio boat from Pleasure Cove Marina, and sailed out on an exceptionally beautiful day – warm, sunny, and flat as glass.

According to Dave: "Les Wilkinson, Sharon Eckroth, Gary Callihan, Chris Hanson, and I rented a patio boat from Pleasure Cove Marina and set out about 9:30 AM Saturday morning. We are all technical divers, and have been diving together for quite a while. To be honest, although we were prepared, we were not really planning on getting any diving done Saturday, but things moved along well, and the conditions were ideal, so we went for it.

Using a chartplotter GPS with sonar we grappled near the bridge. Next we placed a commercial grade color television camera on a shackle to the grapple line and lowered it on its 300 foot cable along the line. With Les



monitoring and maintaining the grapple line and directing boat movements, me driving, and Sharon and Chris handling the electronics, we confirmed that what we were seeing was the bridge.

Gary handled the camera cable and "down one foot - back a little", we were able to get close enough to see the stonework of the bridge.

Les Wilkinson, our best diver, hit the water for what was the very first dive in history to the bridge - as far as we know.

Our formal plan called for more TV with Chris giving him directions like camera work, but we were all thinking the same thing - it was dead, flat clam, and sunny, and we were over the bridge - maybe we should send divers down to verify. A quick check of the sixteen scuba tanks aboard reflected that we had some gas appropriate for the depth.
