SMALL BUT ACTIVE CHAMBER MEETING

Last Wednesday a small, but busy regular monthly meeting of the Lake Berryessa Chamber of Commerce was held at Monticello General Store and Restaurant, followed by a delicious dinner for those who stayed to participate.

Since there again were no "official" Minutes of the previous meeting, Gerri Elliott read "highlights" from notes of the previous meeting.

President Ed Crosby said there was also no "official" Treasury Report to give, but said as nearly as could be figured there was "approximately \$400" present balance.

Under "Old Business" President Ed Crosby said a survey had been taken, as to whether Wednesday or Thursday nights would be best for the regular monthly Chamber meetings. It revealed that there was about a 50-50 reaction, with half wanting Wednesday, and half preferring Thursday. There was some discussion, with the decision being made to continue with Wednesdays, but to take another survey, in writing, with names, to be able to see exactly WHO wants what, and if they WILL attend or not if the meetings are held on the nights they would prefer.

Chairman of the Boat Show Committee Ray Elliott reported that the space had finally, after some confusion, been confirmed, and the Chamber will have their usual spot on the corner in the Cow Palace in Vacationland, 10' x 10', same as previous years. He requested more help to design and construct the booth onto the bed of a trailer, which has been donated by Ed Crosby. So far he said he has only Bill Barta and Bob Pearson who have offered to help, so as soon as more people offer to help they can get together and begin work, after determining what supplies, etc. will be needed.

Barney Barnett, in charge of the big raffle, reported that things have slowed down on the ticket sales, only because too many members are "laying down" and being too lax about pushing ticket sales. Only twenty percent of the tickets have been sold, and more are being sold by outsiders than by the Chamber members. Everyone was urged to help.

HOMESTAKE MINING
RELEASES FIRST
CONTRACTS

Homestake Mining Company today named Davy-McKee of San Ramon, CA, construction manager for the McLaughlin Gold Project, located at the juncture of Napa, Lake and Yolo counties near Lake Berryessa. The firm previously had been named by Homestake to do project design, engineering and procurement. Also named were TIC of Steamboat Springs, CO, as general contractor and McLaughlin Constructors, Inc. and Argee Corporation as earthwork contractors.

"A firm commitment to hire local workers, and to use local firms as subcontractors, was a key consideration in the evaluation of bids," said William A. Humphrey, Homestake executive vice president of operations.

TIC will construct the gold project's key plant features including a rock crushing and grinding facility, and the gold processing plant.

"All contractors named today have proven track records when it comes to hiring local workers and using local contractors," said Humphrey.

Homestake said the firms named today will be contractually obligated to use local firms as subcontractors and to conduct training programs for local workers.

Lake Has Sad News



IT IS WITH GREAT SADNESS THAT WE REPORT TWO SAD LOSSES THIS PAST WEEK.

First, the following was read on Tuesday, August 9th, at 10 A.M. when many, many relatives, employees, former employees, and many, many friends and neighbors attended a Memorial Service, outdoors, on Loop Road, with the Reverend and David Emery, Assistant Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Napa, officiating.

Following the comforting words by the Reverend, Rob Brown, longtime friend, former employee, etc. of San Francisco, read the following, written by longtime friends and employees Bill and Jean Barta. Since this so beautifully covers most of the details about Wes Plunkett, we want to share it with you. Here is that eulogy:

"Wes Plunkett born August 5th, 1919. Husband of Elsie, father of Mary Anne Plunkett of San Jose, and Wesley Fredrick Plunkett, also of San Jose, and brother of Gilman Plunkett of Ashland, Oregon, and Harriet Clark of Napa; uncle of numerous nieces and nephews; and FRIEND OF EVERYONE!"

"Wes founded Spanish Flat in 1959, and from that this community became a reality. He was very civic minded, being a chartered member of the Chamber of Commerce, serving as President and on the Board of Directors for numerous years. He was a member of the Resort Owner's Association. Wes supported, financially and physically, all Lake Berryessa community services from the Monticello School, to the Berryessa Lion's Club, to the Fire Departments, to the 4-H Clubs.

"The Berryessa Mutual Water Company was also created by him, and from it he formed the Spanish Flat Water District in 1963. He served as the President of the District throughout this time. The Water District was a source of pride to Wes, and he worked continuously to improve and maintain the best for all it served. He strove to give the Berryessa Pines subdivision the same type of service which they will receive after five long years of what he called

"Wes almost always walked from his home to the office, arriving with a hand full of litter which was sometimes saved, and sometimes thrown away. Litter was a pet peeve with Wes - wherever he was - the parking lot, the resort - you could always find him bending over picking up a cigarette butt, beer can, paper, or what have you."

"Wes' employees were his friends, and his offer of help in times of need was always there. Many of us were recipients of Wes' generosity. We could always count on his shoulder to cry on and his strength to pull us through a hard time. This strength was shown throughout the Spanish Flat Community and the lake as a whole."

"Wes enjoyed sports, with football his game, and the "Oakland Raiders" becoming the "Al Davis Traitors", but deep down in his heart they were still his team. You could find Wes up at the softball field on many hot summer evenings playing softball with his employees and friends - enjoying every minute of the friendly rivalry with hot dogs and drinks afterwards provided from his store."

Following the Memorial Service everyone was invited to gather at Spanish Flat Inn for food and refreshments, which were delicious and plentiful! Tom Turnpaw opened the lunge, donating all of the proceeds to the American Cancer Society in Wes' memory.

Arrangements were under the direction of Treadway & Wigger Funeral Chapel of Napa, with interment private. The family requested contributions to either the American Cancer Society or the American Heart Association.

Following that, many from there, plus many, many others, went to Napa, to attend 2 P.M. services at Richard Pierce Funeral Service for retired Chief Park Ranger ROBERT (EOB) EARLE PRITCHETT, 57, who also passed away last Thursday, August 4th, at Queen of the Valley Hospital in Napa.

Bob just recently, on July 1, 1983 retired from the Lake Berryessa Boat Patrol, where he served as Chief Park Ranger for many years. He was employed by Napa County for 15 years, and was also active in beef cattle raising.



Bob was born December 7, 1925. He was the son of James A. and May Pritchett. He attended elementary schools in Napa and Fairfield, graduated from San Rafael Military Academy, was accepted to West Point, but chose to enlist in the United States Marine Corps in November 1963. He saw action in Peleliu, Okinawa, and in the occupation of Japan. In recent years he was active with his father and brother in ranching, and in Pritchett Motors. He was also a life member of the Napa Elks Lodge, a member of the Napa County Peace Officers Association, and a member of the Napa Valley Horsemen's Association.

Survivors include Bob's mother, May Berg of Napa; his wife, Dolly of Napa; one daughter, Ailene, also of Napa; one brother, Foster of Napa, and six nieces and numerous other relatives in Napa.

Following the service, where Reverend Frank White officiated, interment followed at Tulocay Cemetery, with Dennis Land, Paul Donovan Jr., George Abate, Dean Cullen, Gil Yates and Marvin Rothman serving as casketbearers.

Bob was a dedicated employee of the local Boat Patrol, being called out all night, many nights, to search for missing boaters, etc. He was a very sensitive, caring man, showing great emotion and sadness when there were unfortunate drownings, accidents, etc. on or around the lake. Dennis Land, who replaced Bob when he recently retired, had a big job to fill. Bob will long be remembered by many of us, and we all extend our deepest sympathy to his daughter and the rest of the family. Rest in peace Bob!

U.S. Health Care Studied

IRVINE—A physician and sociologist takes a critical look at health care in the United States in the book, *The Second Sickness: Contradictions in Capitalist Health Care*, published by Free Press. Author Howard Waitzkin, a University of California, Irvine professor of medicine and social science, uses Marxist and related critical perspectives to examine the economic, social, and political determinants of health. The causes of illness are traced to their sociopolitical sources, and the author analyzes exploitation of illness for profit. Waitzkin, who earned his medical degree and doctorate in sociology from Harvard University, calls for reforms in the health care system and, ultimately, change in society as a whole.

Riverside to get First Endowed Chair

RIVERSIDE—The University of California Board of Regents has given approval to the UC Riverside campus for a fund-raising campaign to establish the Philip L. Boyd Chair in Finance in the Graduate School of Management.

The endowed chair, honoring long-time UCR benefactor, ex-Assemblyman and ex-Regent Boyd, will be the campus' first in its history. Investment income from a \$300,000 endowment will support the teaching and research of a scholar with national visibility who will be recruited to occupy the Chair.




Trout fishing this last week has been great, with limits, and bigger fish showing up.

Salmon were common in the 2-1/2 to 3 pound size.

Trout are real clean, and running around 1-1/2 pounds, 14 to 16 inches.

If you like a lot of fight on a sunny, lazy day at the lake, now is the time to catch that "BIG ONE"! The trout have come up a little, with fish coming in at 45 to 55 feet. Now they are full of shad, from a shad hatch. This should keep the trout feeding for a few weeks. Some fishermen have said that they have caught fish at 25 and 30 feet, full of shad.

The best lures have been gold and silver Teasers, Abalone Demons, blue and silver Kastmasters, Dick Nites and Needle Fish.

The mouth of The Narrows, Skier's Cove, and the south end of the Big Island are the best areas.

Bass fishing is showing some signs of getting better, with more bass showing up. Minnows have been working well, and also Poppers and Shad Raps.

Cat fishing is still excellent, with the big ones coming in regularly. Clams, night crawlers and livers are the best baits.

HELPFUL HINT: Soak cucumber slices in milk for 30 minutes, then lie down with the slices on your face for 10 to 15 minutes. The effect should be smoother, toned-up skin.

HELPFUL HINT: To trim waistline: Raise arms straight overhead and lock fingers together. Bend sideways slowly as far as you can go, keeping head between arms and facing front all the way. Return to starting position and repeat to the other side. Do five times each day.

EARLY DEER SEASON
WILL OPEN SATURDAY

Conditions are expected to be close to ideal for the opening Saturday, August 13th, of California's early deer hunting season following an unusually wet spring and a mild early summer.

On the whole, said the Department of Fish and Game, the opener is expected to be about as productive or slightly less productive than last year's inaugural weekend.

The early season area extends along the coast and adjacent inland habitat, generally from the northern boundary of Mendocino County southward to the northwestern edge of Ventura County. The early season will extend through September 25th.

In the southern portion of the open area, which is designated zone A (specifically, San Luis Obispo, San Benito and Monterey counties), the buck kill is expected to be less than or about the same as that for 1982.

In the northern counties (Lake, Sonoma and Mendocino), good fawn survival over the past few years and an adequate carry-over of bucks should result in sustaining the annual increase in the buck harvest.

On the basis of zone A tag sales, as many as 50,000 hunters could be in the area on opening day. Sales of tags for the open area has topped 45,000 by mid-week and were expected to go beyond 60,000 by opening day.

As usual, fire danger will be high, and hunters are cautioned to use care with fire.

Fish and Game also reminded hunters to familiarize themselves with the deer tag law and to remember that any deer violation will cost them their tag privileges for the following year.
