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Letters to the Editor

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LAKE BERRYESSA NEWS:

This is my response to the January 1st issue editorial and the letter from Mike Crean, Sports of Spanish Flat, to "speak out." Also, before that, to the report of studies on the problems connected with the management of Lake Berryessa.

Certainly there are problems. There probably are inequities and vast differences of opinion, but the thing that causes me more concern than anything else that I've heard or read is the threat or suggestion, that the management be turned back to the federal government.

This I oppose for several reasons. For one thing, I am very much in favor of private enterprise and individual initiative; and am opposed to the trends toward increased federal control. I do not believe that the federal government should control anything which individuals, or groups of individuals together can control.

I believe it would be abandoning the idea that we can do the job; that we can improve, and, that we have more competence, because of our on-the-job training, than any federal staff which could be sent here.

I would seriously question the failure, or even near failure, of the management so far. I believe the whole Lake project shows what private enterprise can do, and in a most realistic way. If it is a failure, why are people by the hundreds of thousands coming to it and then returning again and again?

We visited Lake Mead in the 1930's, and would be hard pressed to think of anything done for the visitors comfort, yet it has been federally controlled from its start. The first three years at Lake Berryessa saw more done for the visitors comfort than had been done yet at Lake Mead.

The criticism of the under-developed free access areas is based largely on the general unattractiveness of it — due to lack of various facilities, which is why it is free. If lawns had to be planted and maintained and the grounds more thoroughly policed, it would not be free. For that matter, what's so great about the ankle-deep dust in Yosemite, a federally owned park?

Another criticism was leveled at the Park Headquarters picnic area and the fact it could not be used by the general public. This is something else that seems to be a rather hasty complaint. The Park Headquarters is just exactly that — the office for the whole Lake. The picnic area could be called the Council Room, the Convention Center, the Conference Hall, or by any other designation of that order. The fact that Napa County has made this "Conference Hall" very attractive, isn't any different than any of the federally operated parks, projects and developments that I've seen or read about.

I'd like to urge Mike Crean to continue to support a Lake Berryessa Chamber of Commerce. It hasn't been perfect — but what is? The need here is so great that it must be done!

Before there was any thought or talk of a Chamber of Commerce, my husband tried to tell every resort owner that they had to work together. They had to promote the whole area, and it had to be a continuing process! He believed in it so strongly that he constantly talked with visitors, got little stories, took pictures of fishermen and their catches, events, camping, skiing and boating scenes, and then had them published in the Week-end Sporting News. In his own way, he tried to make the Lake of interest, beauty and order.

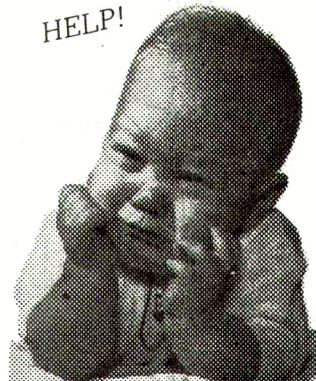

It was too windy for Sam Mitchel and Curly Driscoll and when THEY give up, it is really time to quit and go home!

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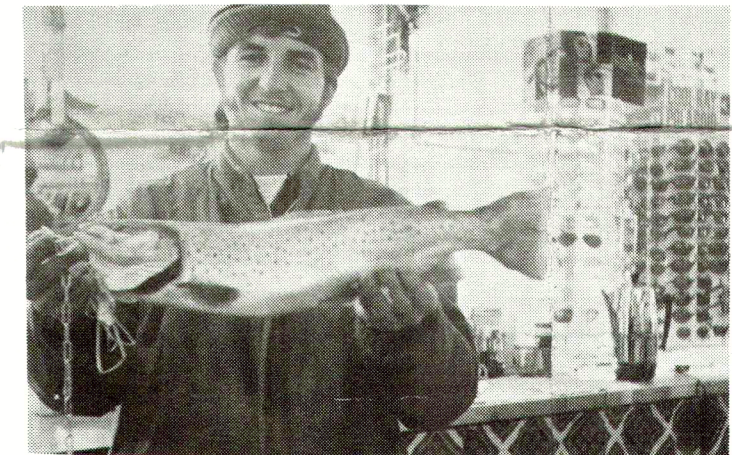

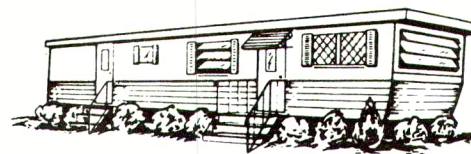
