MONTICELLO SKI CLUB NEWS

The Monticello Ski Club held its annual Family Day Picnic on Sunday, July 16th, on the Big Island, between the Slalom Course and the airstrip.

There were two baseball games, sack races, frisbee, etc., with prizes for all of the winners. After the games, lunch and watermelon, some of the members had enough energy left to ski through the Slalom Course. A good time was had by all, due to the fine job that the Social Chairman, Mell "Sweede" Fisher did!

It was noted that five of the boats that were beached by the picnic, had been seen skiing at 6 a.m. in Wragg Canyon that morning, and if you looked real close, you would have noticed a couple of "bikinis" in the five boat loads of skiers. Skiing at that time in the morning, you not only get good water to ski on, but it clears the cobwebs, etc., in a big hurry!

"The Correct Way To Do It!"

The Monticello Ski Club maintains a Slalom Course in the cove on the south side of the Big Island. It consists of a series of under water cables, anchors, and lines, with buoys floating on the surface.

The Club has been working on repairing and remeasuring the cables, so that it is equal to a competition course. The work is

now complete, and we hope that everyone enjoys it!

A special thanks to the many non-club members who have helped with replacing buoys, splicing cables, etc. Without their help we couldn't keep ahead of people who seem to enjoy seeing how much damage they can do. Hitting an occasional buoy while using the course is unavoidable, but to see how many buoys you can cut up with the prop isn't going to improve your skiing at all! Also, the cables under water are stainless steel, and don't improve use performance of the prop if they happen to be snagged.

The correct way to use the course is for the boat to go between the center two buoys, while the skier goes around the outside. Be careful of the turn on the west end; it is getting tight. When you have finished a run, and another boat is waiting, give them a turn while your next skier gets ready. Don't cross the course or go around the perimeter fast, because your wake may cause a skier to fall.

The purpose of the course is to have fun and improve your skiing.

The next Slalom Meet will be held on August 20th. It is open to everyone - so start practicing!

BIKE PARK HERE REJECTED

A proposal to have a motorcycle park on 560 acres, off of the south side of lower Chiles Valley Road, about one mile north of State Route 128, was rejected by a 4 to 1 vote by Napa County Supervisors last Tuesday.

William Nichelini, owner of the proposed park land, along with Art Crowell and Raymond Atkinson, had filed an appeal with the supervisors, requesting that they overturn an earlier refusal by the Napa County Conservation, Development and Planning Commission.

Opponents of the proposal, residents from Pojo Valley, Chiles Valley and Sage Canyon, listed problems of increased traffic, fire hazards, environmental pollution, increased noise and possible damage to watershed as their reasons for being against the park.

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Vacaville Man Drowns Here

A 32-year-old Vacaville man, George Grockett, is believed to be the sixth drowning victim in Lake Berryessa this year.

Last Saturday, Grockett, along with friends, was riding in a 14-foot homemade wooden boat, driven by Tom Whitehead of San Francisco. They were returning to their campsite at Markley Cove Resort, where Grockett's wife and two sons were waiting, when he very suddenly disappeared. As soon as he was missed, Whitehead circled back and found the victim face down in the lake. Before he could reach him however, he disappeared below the surface. Although he dove several times, Whitehead was unable to locate Grockett, as were Para-Medic divers, as of this time.

7 ACRE BLAZE

Tell Me Why

The California Fish and Game Commission today announced the tentative selection of a split 46-day statewide dove hunting season and separate 30-day straight band-tailed pigeon seasons for the northern and southern areas for 1972-73.

Commission President Joseph Russ III of Ferndale, announced the proposed regulations within the framework set by the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Seasons and limits would be substantially the same as those for last year, with a dove limit of 10 per day, 20 in possession after opening day, and a band-tail limit of eight per day, eight in possession.

Final action on the 1972-73 regulations will be taken at the commission's July 28 meeting in Fort Bragg.

The dove season would open statewide Friday, September 1... the earliest date allowed by treaties and the migratory bird framework... and continue through Saturday, September 30. The season would reopen statewide Saturday, November 25, and run through Sunday, December 10.

Last year's season dates were September 1-30 and November 28-December 12.

White-winged doves would be allowed in the bag only in Imperial, Riverside and San Bernardino counties. The bag and possession limit would apply to the aggregate of species where white-wings are allowed.

The band-tailed pigeon season would be Saturday, September 30, through Sunday, October 29, in the counties of Butte, Del Norte, Glenn, Humboldt, Lassen, Mendocino, Modoc, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, Siskiyou, Tehama and Trinity; and Saturday, December 16, through Sunday, January 14, 1973, in the balance of the state.

Shooting hours, for both doves and pigeons, would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Nearly one-quarter of a million California hunters bagged an estimated 4,248,300 doves during last year's season.

About 38,000 hunters took a reported 285,800 band-tailed pigeons, an increase of 59 percent from the figure for the previous season, during 1971-72.

ARCHERY DEER HUNT SEASON WILL CLOSE

California's early archery deer hunting season, which opened July 8 in the coastal area, will close Sunday (July 23), the Department of Fish and Game reminded bowhunters today.

The bag limit is two bucks forked horn or better.

About 31,000 archers hunted deer in California last year. Together they bagged 422 bucks. The top early season producer was Mendocino County, where 36 bucks were reported taken by bow and arrow.

NEW HUNTER SAFETY OFFICER JOINS DFG REGION 3 OFFICE

The Department of Fish and Game this week announced the appointment of Charles Monroe to the newly created position of Hunter Safety Training Coordinator for the 14 central coast region counties.

Monroe, a captain in the Department's 330-man force of wardens, will be responsible for supervising the selection and training of the more than 500 hunter safety training instructors in the central coast area and for insuring that the courses they teach meet the requirements of the Department.

Under California law, all persons who have not previously held hunting licenses must complete a course in safe hunting practices before they can obtain a hunting license. Principles of conservation and the need for sportsmanship also are emphasized by the instructors.

Last year 56,357 persons completed the DFG-supervised hunter safety courses. Since the program was begun in 1955, 578,083 people have been graduated from these classes, and the incidence of hunting accidents has fallen from 3.1 per 10,000 license buyers in 1955 to 0.93 per 10,000 licensees last year.

Captain Monroe's office will be in the DFG's Region 3 headquarters at the State Veterans Facility at Yountville in Napa County. He has been in the Department's warden's branch for eight years and served one year in the wildlife management branch before becoming a warden.

Who discovered radio waves? — Radio waves, like light and heat waves, are electromagnetic. Electromagnetic waves can be made and controlled by men, but we still do not know what they really are.

Like light and heat waves, radio waves radiate in all directions from their source. All electromagnetic waves travel at the same speed — about 186,000 miles a second.

Radio waves are sent out from a radio transmitter. Sound waves from the radio studio enter a microphone, where they make changes in the pattern of an electric current. At the same time, another current is produced. This second current is stronger and is called the carrier current. The two currents are combined, amplified (increased), and then radiated out in all directions from the antenna.

The existence of radio waves was predicted long before they were actually discovered. The prediction was made in 1864 by James Maxwell. In 1888, a German physicist, Heinrich Hertz, demonstrated that the waves actually do exist and that they travel through space.

The first man to send signals by radio was an English physicist, Ernest Rutherford. But the most successful of all radio pioneers was Guglielmo Marconi. Marconi was the founder of radio communication. On December 12, 1901, he succeeded on his first try, in sending and receiving messages across the Atlantic Ocean.

Marconi's wireless telegraph could send only dots and dashes, it could not transmit a spoken message. This was made possible by the development of the vacuum tube in 1904 by an English engineer, John Fleming. The first radio broadcast was heard on Christmas Eve in 1906. But it took another fourteen years before broadcasting became practical.

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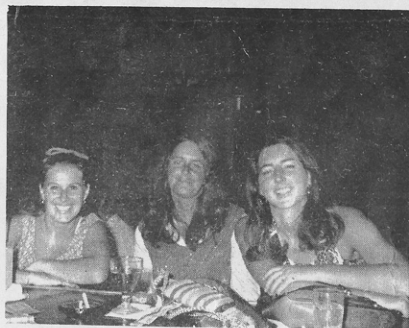

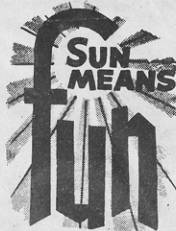

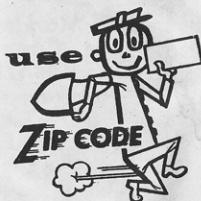

Bass and Trout, along with a few Catfish, are being taken.

Bill Emmons from El Cerrito, fished the points just above the dam last week. He started at 9 a.m. The bite was terrific for 30 minutes, then the wind came up and the bite was off! He landed a 3-1/2 pound Large Mouth Bass, a 3 pound Small Mouth Bass, and lost several big fish due to snags on the bottom. A person watched Bill land the Bass, came over and borrowed 4 Crawfish, went to the next point and landed a whopper Bass, ran out of Crawfish, and went back into the resort to get more bait!

This is the pattern. If you are on a point, and fish the whole area, Bass are quite cooperative. The bite is at various times. From 9 a.m. 1 p.m. has been our best. Every day seems to be different.

Get down to 40 feet and small Trout are easy when you find them. The Abalone Demon seems best for me. Now and then a big Trout will spice your catch. Live Crawfish are also getting Catfish near the dam.

Keith Packer caught a 7.5 pound Catfish. William DeLong from San Pablo, landed a 2 pound Silver Salmon on the Bang-O-lure. B. J. Smith from Woodland, landed a 4 pound Bass while plugging.

Many fish are caught, but go unnoticed as everyone is in a hurry to go home after a tiring day of fishing.

Plugs like the Bang-O-lure are getting some nice Bass, very early in the a.m. or very late in the evening.

The Waterdog Bomber, Brawley's Bass Bug, Bagley's Spinner Bug and the Spring Lizard are also connecting.

Any kind of plastic worms, etc. will get fish every day. Locating the anxious fish is the problem. Try every point, in 25 feet of water.

Hints for fishermen: For summer fishing at Berryessa, take along a cooler with Blue Ice or regular ice for your catch. Do not drag your fish, unless you like rotten fish to eat! The surface water is too hot and the fish will spoil easily.

If you take a cooler, and cool your fish as soon as they are caught, you can clean them even the next day if necessary.

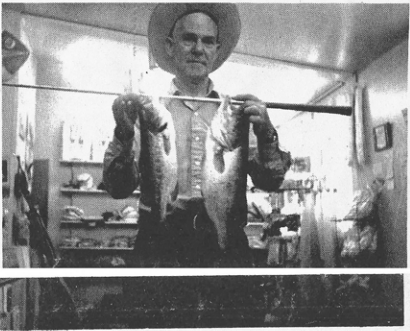
Take a big cooler for your minnows and Crawfish. Both can be put into the same cooler. Take another cooler with ice cubes. Every now and then, as needed, put a few ice cubes into the water with your minnows and Crawdaddies. Both will stay in good shape, even on the hottest days.

I have noticed fishermen dragging fish. Don't do it! If they are worth keeping — do it right!

Take plenty of drinking water, or whatever you like for beverages. Take a lunch along if you plan to stay. Be comfortable!

Lake Berryessa trout are deep, Black Bass are on the rocky points and catfish are in the shallows. The surface water temperature is 73 and weekday fishing is best.

Rainbow trout are on the old creek bed indicated on our Berryessa Maps. Trollers are trolling 30 to 60 feet deep, using the Pink Lady, attractor blades and the flo, red Triple Teaser or Dick Nite spoon. Other lures producing include Fishback, Kamlocker spoon and Ok-Dokie.

Black bass are in 15 feet of water off the rocky points. Areas such as the Big Island, Narrows, Oil Well Canyon, are all good bets for boat to shore plug casting. Lures such as Bomber, Waterdog, Arbo Gaster, Bayou Boogie, Brawley's Bass Bug, and Becan Jigmaster are top choices.

Catfish are on the bite in most coves, the Vineyards and Elkure Creek fill. Some nice limits have been produced. Clams and minnows on the bottom is the way to go. Fish in 10 feet to 15 feet of water. Bluegill are all over.

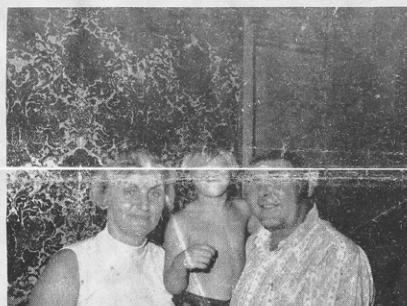
