The Building of a Landmark Known as "Turtle Rock"

Al Bissett, was born Allister Randolph Bissett, in Reno, Nev. on June 23, 1920. He grew up in Salinas, Cal. After graduation from high school, he moved to San Francisco where he worked as a parts man and automotive machinist.

In 1958, he, along with his brother Cliff Bissett, and their brother-in-law, Gene McClain, went in together and bought 240 acres in Capell Valley. (A later survey increased the acreage to 308 acres.) Al pitched a tent beside Capell Creek in June of 1958, which began his life at Lake Berryessa.

Barbara Erichson was born in Walla Walla, Wash. Her father was a missionary doctor and his work took them all over the world. Places like Scotland, South Africa, The Philippines, China. She attended nursing school and graduated in 1946.

Al and Barbara met at a barbecue at Lake Berryessa. They were married in 1959. Al had already started a house, which now is the Turtle Rock Motel office. The original house was made of tin. No electricity, but running water. Al said when he put in the plumbing he inadvertently hooked up the hot water pipe to the toilet. Quite a novelty having a steam toilet.

He built a work shop from materials he acquired from discarded buildings at an airport. From that shop he did boat and automotive repairs, and using the shop as a base, started building their boat sheds. All the buildings were put together with nuts and bolts and Barbara told me Al would go through the motions of putting the buildings together in his sleep.

The first four units of the motel and the bar and service station were started in 1962. They leased the business (bar and gas station) to Romaro Jolly. Over the years it was run by several people including Jim Haines and Gracie Shaut.

As a result of the recent storms, our cold mornings and beautiful afternoons make for a great day of fishing at Lake Berryessa.

The lake becomes very peaceful and shimmers like glass this time of the year. Not many boats out and those that are on the lake are people fishing.

I spent most of the week out-of-town attending a reunion in Las Vegas with friends whom I worked with prior to retiring. They came from various areas of the U.S.A. and we had not seen each other for 4 or 5 years. **What a great time!** Upon returning home, I spent the next few days at Berryessa doing what I love doing, "FISHING"....

Trout fishing has been good in between storms and when the winds aren't too heavy. Fish are in the top 5 to 10 ft. of water. Remember, if you come up early dress very warm as it is very cold in the mornings. Don't forget your thermos of coffee or hot soup!

Fishing at Spanish Flat

The fishing here at Lake Berryessa is pretty good for trout and catfish.

The trout are on the surface. Some anglers are having good luck fishing from shore in the coves. Most are using minnows under a bobber at 3-6ft.

Some are throwing lures and having success. Mostly silver lures such as silver phoebe, silver/blue kastmaster, silver blue fox, or silver w/red tip triple teaser. For those of you that like to troll use half fast silver/gold hammered flashers and a threaded minnow or nightcrawler. Also some anglers are using lures (use the same as for above). For trollers the best spots are the Dam, Neither cove, the mouth of the narrows, or the mouth of Skiers cove. For the shore anglers try Spanish Flat Marina and Launch Ramp cove's, Neither cove, or Oak Shores.

The catfishing is pretty good in the coves using chicken liver, nightcrawlers, dead minnows, or anchovies. Try fishing in about 12 to 15 feet of water in just about any cove. The top spots that I've heard are Kelly cove, Neither cove, Spanish Flat Launch and Marina coves. Jimmey Comer of Fairfield nailed 5 fat cats from 3 to 5 lbs. He was fishing in our marina cove using chicken liver. **Nice catch Jimmy!!!!**

The Bass fishing has slowed down this week. I've seen a few small mouth coming out of the narrows off the rocky points trolling with nightcrawlers.

Be sure to stop at the marina to discuss all the technics for catching trout at Lake Berryessa. Or call for information about reservations for camping or about our fishing boat rentals. (707) 966-7700.

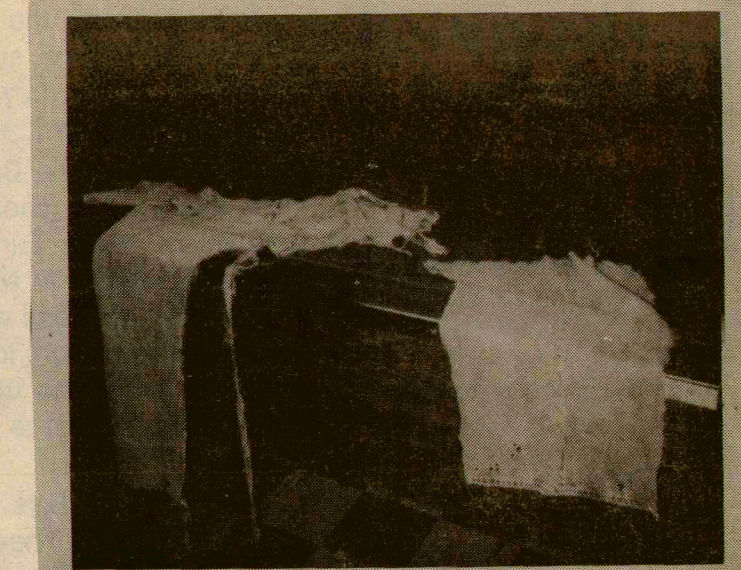
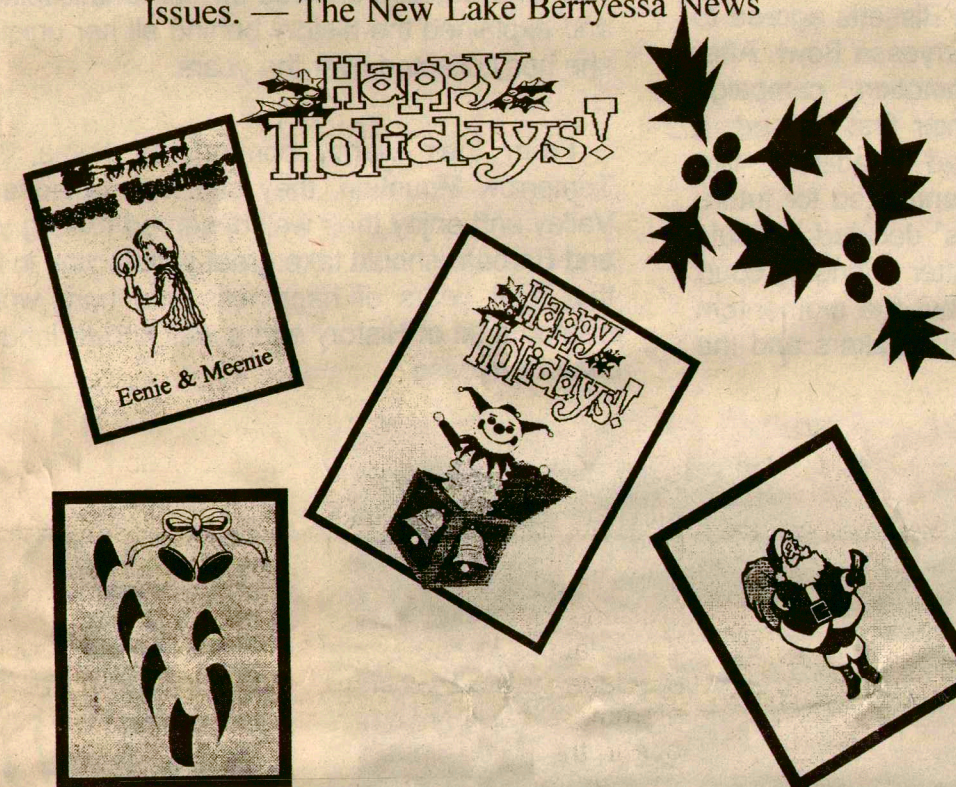

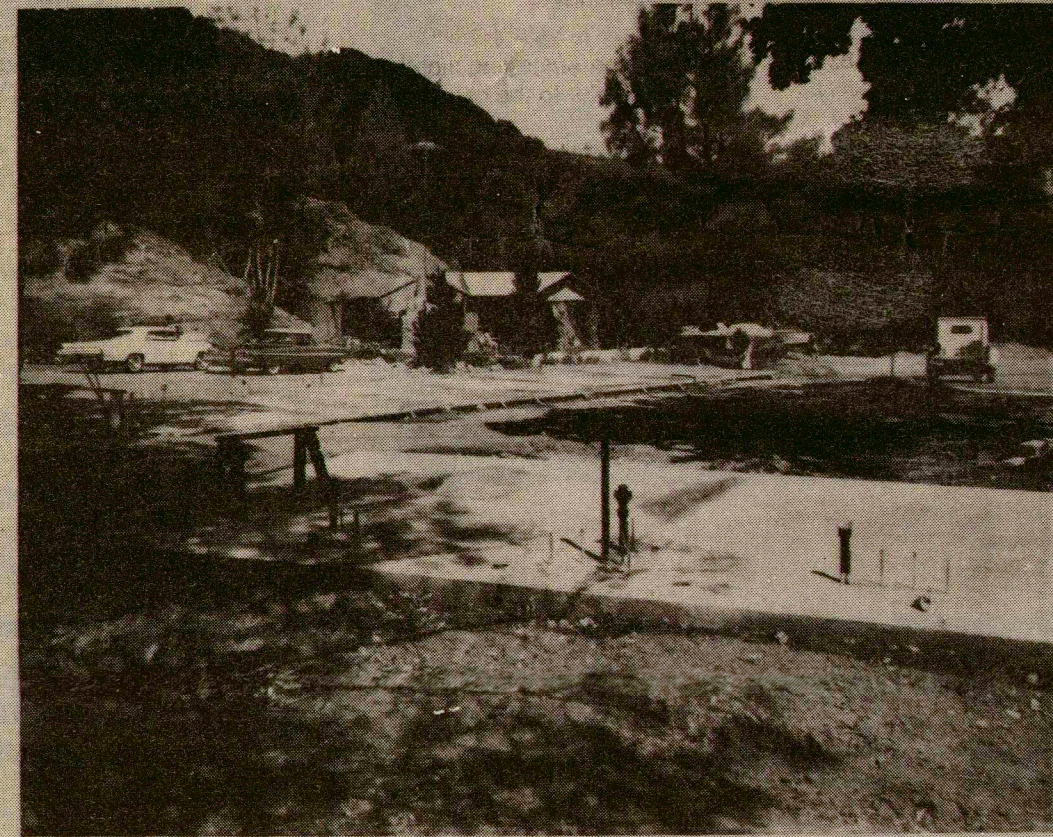

Barbara loved the song "Tomorrow Mountain" sung by Lena Horne, so that's the name she gave her new home. When they leased the business to Floyd Turtle, the name took and became "Turtle Rock."

Eventually Al and Barbara finished the motel and trailer park. They chose a site with a spectacular view, high above Turtle Rock for their homesite. Acquiring a house in Napa scheduled for demolition, they dismantled it and with the help of Clint Pridmore, painstakingly brought it to their new homesite in five pieces. After driving up their steep driveway, I can imagine what a next to impossible job that must have been.

In 1968, the Bissetts were approached by a promotion group. They wanted to bring big name entertainers for concerts to Lake Berryessa. They needed a place to perform so the Bissetts agreed to build what later was known as Berryessa Bowl. After tons of concrete and a promotion campaign sponsored by Pepsi, they held their first concert. It was a huge success. They had headliners like Santana and the Grateful Dead contracted for future events, when the "County Fathers" decided it would attract the wrong kind of crowd. After a lengthy court battle, the Bissetts won the suit, but the momentum was gone. The promoters lost their backers and the project was scrapped.



In 1977 the Motel-Bar and Berryessa Bowl was sold to Bob and Joy Dunlap. After operating the business for several years, Bob and Joy sold the Motel to Ed and Inez Crosby, the present owners, and the bar and Berryessa Bowl to Pete and Joan Leung.

Working for Kaiser Steel for many years, Al was forced to retire in 1982, due to work related injuries. Barbara retired in 1981 after 35 years of nursing. Since retiring they have traveled abroad to Australia and New Zealand. They have driven their motor home to Alaska and went to the Worlds Fair in Canada. They have gone on many hunting trips with their family and friends. They are enjoying their children. Kathryn, Bob and Richie, who blessed them with five grandchildren. Al still puts in a garden every year and Barbara showed off her landscaping ability, and explained the history behind all her unique rocks she has collected over the years.

From their warm, comfortable home, high on Tomorrow Mountain, they can look out over Capell Valley and enjoy their well deserved retiring years. Al and Barbara should take great satisfaction in knowing that their years of happiness and hard work have created a bit of History and a well known landmark at Lake Berryessa.



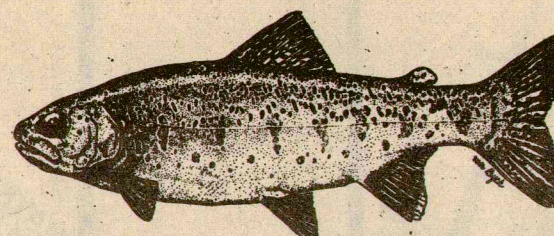

Honey Mustard Salad Dressing

Spinach with Strawberries and honey salad dressing. 1½ tblsp of honey or to taste

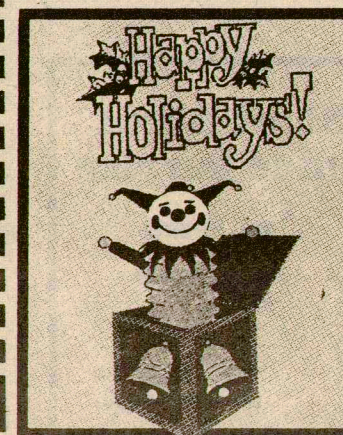
2 tsp Dijon Mustard, salt & pepper

½ small red onion thinly sliced.

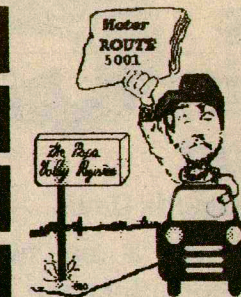

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Window on Wild life

We live in a special place, surrounded by wild neighbors — well, semi-wild. The deer just stand and watch my dog and me pass, now, before going back to grazing flowers and shrubs. Many of us are drawn to them, putting out food and drink so they will return often and we can enjoy their presence. but we've made them dependent. Who'll tell them, "Oh, didn't you hear? The Smiths went on a cruise this month," when the usual table scraps don't appear.

It's hard not to want to bond with them. I found the same problem when I started volunteering this last summer at a wildlife sanctuary, the one over in Suisun, under the auspices of the Suisun Marsh Natural History Association. One of the first things you are told is not to get too close to the animals. Don't stand and stare, talk to them handle them, coo over them. Our mandate is to rehabilitate injured and orphaned wildlife. Their destiny is to be released back to the wild. Our duty is to help them remain wild, wary of humans.

Yet, when I arrived, some 40 baby birds, all with their beaks raised skyward at the same time, chirped, "Feed me! Feed me!" And one became conditioned to push softened kibbles down gaping throats. As unlikely as it may seem, I became particularly captivated by the baby crows — big, clumsy babies. I watched them change from infants to toddlers. They had such personality, it was difficult not

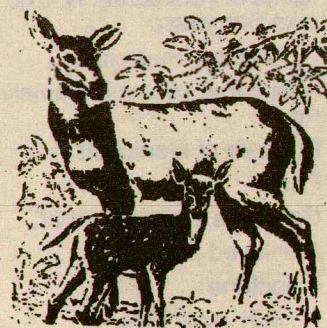
to bond with them. Finally, in mid-August, when they had become teenagers, they were released, and most of them flew away as a flock. But one, perhaps because of a bad shoulder, or perhaps because it had imprinted on us, was found walking the streets the next morning. It was brought back to the sanctuary. It'll probably never be able to be released to the wild.

Most of the work at the sanctuary takes place in the spring when the babies are born or hatched. That's when they really have need of reliable volunteers. However, they'll accept volunteers all year, because in the winter months there's more time to gain the necessary background on providing for these wild creatures.

And there's always a coterie of permanent residents — wild creatures who'll never be able to be returned to the wild. For instance, there's the beautiful coyote that was raised on the end of a chain as a pet for the first couple years of its life. It is used to confinement. If it were ever released, it would head straight for humans. And it would be shot. Therefore, it is doomed to a lifetime of confinement because of misplaced human intervention when it was a baby. Which is also the likely story for a great horned owl that lives there, too. It is a beauty, except it's head is at a permanent tilt — probably the effects of being raised by humans on the wrong diet as a chick. It will never be able to hunt for itself. And there are hummingbirds brought in with brain damage, possibly poisoned by drinking fermented sugar water from our feeders. the solution should be changed every few days.

The wildlife center's job is to try and mitigate the

problems we humans bring to wildlife. there is something satisfying in sharing our space with them, but we have to allow them their space, if we want them to survive.

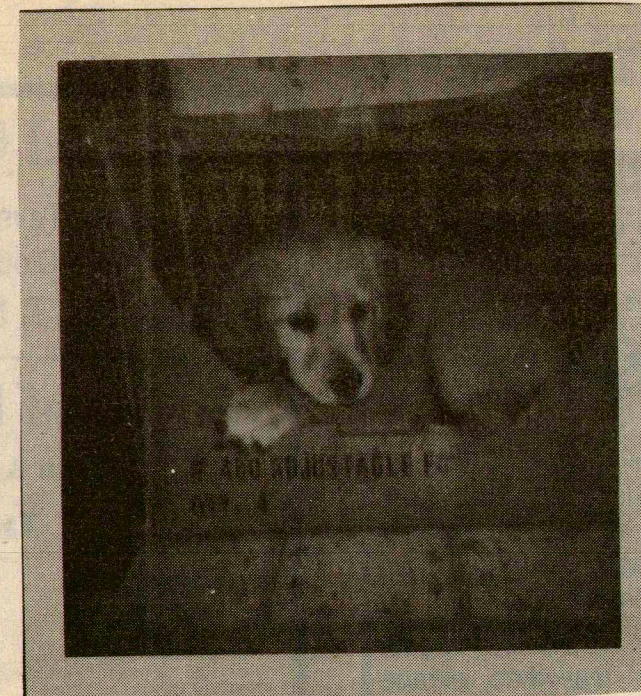

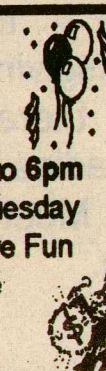
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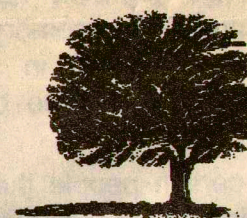
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
